Voice Of America

Every day radio listeners in such far distant places as Bombay, Paris, Tokyo and Buenos Aires turn on their radio receivers and hear a familiar voice speaking in English or Spanish or Japanese or French. This is the Voice of America. In 46 different languages, over 800 shortwave transmitters at home and abroad more than 350,000 words are spoken every 24 hours as our Voice circles the globe.

For the United States this is a new experience. Not until 1942 did we undertake to promote understanding and trust among the peoples of the world by means of government sponsored broadcasts. This has long been the practice of other nations. The words "This is Radio Moscow" and "This is London Calling" are familiar to shortwave listeners the world over. Now in keeping with our new major role in world affairs we have begun to inform the world how we interpret this new responsibility and how we view our relationship with our neighbors overseas.

It is clearly a necessary task and yet a very difficult one. Many of our broadcasts are being heard in areas where the broadcast are in the hands of people who are not familiar with the broadcast. Above all we must never forget that we are speaking to the people on the street. We cannot be sure that the listener will be able to understand the broadcast. We are not, at all certain that a lot of people will be listening to this overseas broadcasting. We cannot take a poll, or a Hopper rating, or have a box of letters and awards find out how popular, how effective, how useful these programs are.

Big Business Seen Having Easier Times Under GOP

A Yale economist predicted tonight that "big business" will get its long-awaited "breathing spell" under the GOP administration. He said that the new administration will be more sympathetic to business than their predecessors, he stated. Added to this are the increasing signs on all sides of a re-evaluation of the place of big business in our society, most of it favorable to the businessman, he pointed out. The contributions of big business to the war and defense efforts are being re-evaluated, he said. "The criticisms fired at the big industries during the '30s, he said, were largely unwarranted. "But the Yale speaker went on to stress that a changing attitude toward big business and the anti-trust policies can have both good and bad results. On the positive side, big business will be given greater credit for the "miracle of American industry" in raising American standards and meeting the demands of war and peace, he said. "But on the other hand, Professor Miller declared, "the vigorous enforcement of the rules of competition has been an important element in stimulating the aggressive creativity which brought on these miracles."
