Under the Selective Service Law every youth must register with his local board within five days after he reaches his 18th birthday

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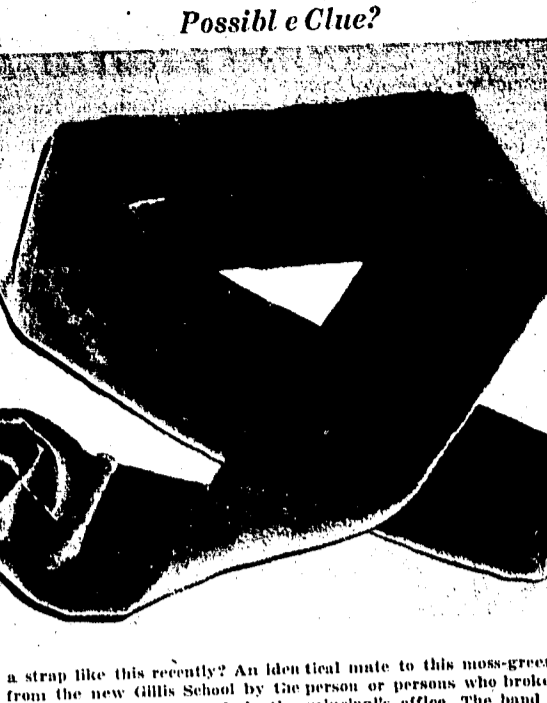

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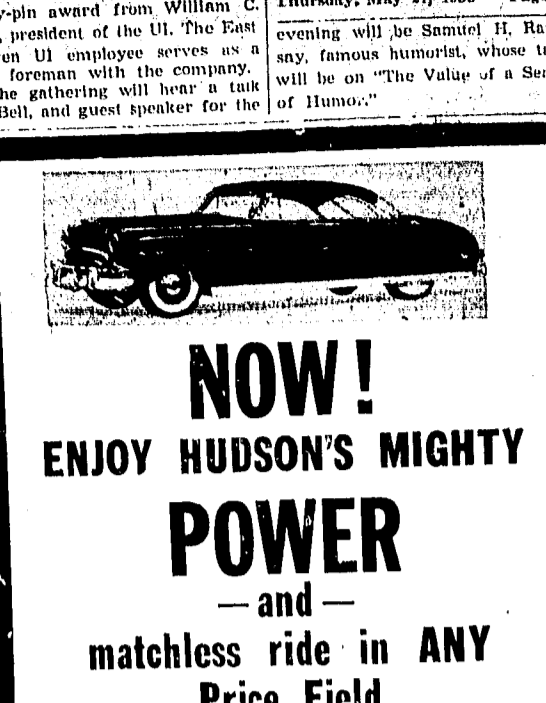

Personal Problems in an Age of Anxiety II Pulling Ourselves Together

"I've got to pull myself together"—this is the voice of modern man. These words reflect his bewilderment at the complexities and the incoherence of his existence. They reveal his longing for a unifying and integrating power for his life.

How is it that each of us—at one time or another—senses such divisions and tensions within ourselves that we feel the necessity to "pull ourselves together"? For one thing we are subject to a multitude of pressures and impulses. Some of them come from our outside relationships. Some come from within ourselves.

Consider the numerous outside relationships that would have to be included in a description of any one of us. John Smith, for example, is the head of a family, the father of three children, chairman of the Board of his church, teacher of a Sunday School class, owner of a drug store, member of the Republican Party, secretary of his social club and member of the neighborhood planning council.

Every one of such outside relationships, and many more, make their demands upon John Smith and upon all of us. They seek our time, our resources and our loyalty. Each one would pull or push us in a particular direction—often in opposite directions—in our thought and action. When one impulse would take us one way, and a second impulse would take us another way; when we are caught in the tensions between inconsistent demands, we are inclined to divide our loyalties and split our personalities. In moments when we most strongly feel the pressure and tensions and sense our inner division, we say to ourselves: "I've got to pull myself together."

Worse still are the conflicting impulses that find their origin within the self. Each individual is a veritable constellation of inner drives, desires and needs, a complex array of loves and hates. There is the need for the response and affection of others. There is the desire for knowledge and for pleasure. There are the demands of conscience, the attraction of love, the search for praise. In the face of the many conflicting impulses within the self we are like Stephen Leacock's famous rider who "flung himself upon his horse and rode madly off in all directions." We can't seem to get going in a specific direction because we are not just one self with a single goal; we are composed of a complex arrangement of selves each with its own idea as to where we are going.

Thus, in a turbulent age which calls for steady hands and minds to pull together an unstable world, we find that we too are unstable and must ask: "How can I pull myself together?"

Josiah Royce has said that the only way in which we can pull ourselves together is to choose a cause by which to live—a cause strong enough and enduring enough to give purpose and direction to all of life.

The leaders of Fascism and Communism have recognized the need for an inner unifying force and have made loyalty to fatherland or a political or economic system the basic cause, the supreme affection. There are those in this country who would follow suit and make Americanism or Capitalism the

supreme loyalty and the ultimate cause of our devotion. But our loyalty to the very best in American democracy and economy must be subordinate to and judged by the Divine Source, the Basic Ground of our being. This is the cause to which we owe our ultimate and final loyalty. It is only by making the Divine the dominant, central objective of life, our ultimate purpose, our supreme devotion can we bring into unity the conflicting drives and urges, pulls and pressures that fragment our lives and cause us to exclaim: "I've got to pull myself together!"

Garden Notes

The Branford Garden Club will hold its 25th anniversary Flower Show Tour, Friday, June 19th from 2 to 5:30 p. m. Horticultural classes will be shown at the Trinity Parish House from 2 to 5. Also educational exhibits, conservation exhibit, special exhibits and arrangement of flowers in favorite containers for children — a. age group from 5 to 9 years, and b. age group 10 to 14 years.

Program tickets may be purchased at Betty's Studio, Montowese Street or at Trinity Parish House and homes opened for arrangement classes, the day of the show, June 19.

Containers, trays and plants will be on sale — Mrs. Frank Connor and Mrs. Clarence Farnsworth in charge.

Begonias, Semperlorens that has been growing on windowills all winter, may be used now to stock plants for cuttings. These will develop into sturdy plants for summer bloom.

With a razor or sharp knife cut off growth three to four inches long and insert in damp sand or vermiculite. The slips will root in less than a month. After the middle of May the young plants will be ready to set out in a shaded part of the garden.

When pondering the problem of edging a surround and set off your garden give thought to the

colorful low annuals in size, form and service there are few plants that can surpass them in a border. Bedding-petunias may be secured in flats from nearby nurseries or greenhouses. These are readily grown in red, white, purple or several shades of pink. Dwarf marigolds grow easily from seed, develop into plants about a foot high and bloom profusely. Red, bronze, orange and yellow may be found.

Butterball is extremely popular. This is a gay yellow brushed with maroon and stops rising at six inches. Pigmy, also a favorite, is two inches taller, producing a wealth of pale yellow double blossoms.

The multi-colored flowers of phlox drummond and portulaca thrive in summer heat and are a good choice for sowing around summer cottages. Where white is wanted: nothing is lovelier than sweet alyssum Carpet of Snow Cannard, red cedar (Juniper Virginiana cannard) is noted for its tufted foliage. This hardy evergreen holds its rich green color through the year blending with other varieties of lighter shades.

Because of the pyramid form it is a great favorite for landscaping, reaching over 15 feet at maturity. It is time to plant Comanche petunias which can be bought at nurseries and are large beautiful red shade. The pink and white dogwood has been a glorious sight — you do not need to go outside of Branford to view its beauty. Every thing is later at the shore and my pink magnolia and pink dogwood are in blossom at the same time.
