A warning that tax liens are be-ing prepared for issuance January 15 on tax-delinquent properties was posted this week by Salvatore Longobardi, tax collector. Owners of property on which the liens are issued will be charged the additional cost of each lien, which will

amount to \$3.75.

Longobardi reported that taxes in amount of \$35,000 remained to be collected on the 1952 list. These taxes were due last March 15. The iax collector reported that, although he has had considerable success with securing back taxes, the outstanding amount slightly higher than for the same

period last year. Property owners who have delayed payment since March 15, face an interest charge of one-half per cent per month on the amount of taxes due.

Filmer S. C. Northrop, Profes sor of Philosophy and Law at Yale, said that many Republicans running for Congress next year already have accepted "Senator McCarthy's thesis that President Elsenhower, as well as former President Truman, and their ap-pointees are to be subjected to charges before luncheon groups

and by innuendo."

If President Eisenhower is to If President Elsenhower is to spare himself and the country from the "degrading experience of having another living president tried by innuendo and headlines, and if he is to uphold the orinciples of American justice, he must call a stop to the McCarthy-Velde-Brownell methods," Pro-Northrop asserted.

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United States. "Never should anyone being investigated be charged or judged in public by the people making the investigation," he said. "Such a procedure violates American and democratic principles by turning the detective and the accuser into the judge,

"The recent as sumption of so many editors that, after Attorney General Brownell's charge at a luncheon meeting, it was Mr. Truman's immediate responsibility to prove himself innocent" was labelled by Professor Northrop as "unqualifiedly un-Ameri-can and un-democratic."

It is a "basic moral and philosophical principle" of American democracy he said, "that any and every citizen is assumed to be innocent until he is proved guilty and the burden of proof of any charge of guilt rests on the ac-cuser, not on the accused."

A second basic American demi-ocratic principle, he continued, "is that no citizen ever charged with anything by anyone is to be judged by the accuser or by the police inspector who gathers the

President Elsenhower, he said, must call an end "to all un-American and un-democratic ways of judging free Americans," and should dismiss his Cabinet appointees "who have violated the

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also insist, he continued, that "all further judging of possible criminal charges will henceforth be done, as our founding fathers prescribed, by the courts and the

courts alone. Finally, Professor Northrop concluded, President Eisenhower must insist that "any further Professor Northrop judging that is necessary of the findings of any additional invesitgations of the public service be done also in the American way by a commission which enjoys a reputation for unquestioned integrity in the public mind."



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
