First Selectman Salary Compares With Other Towns

The salary of the first selectman of East Haven is exceeded by that paid his counterpart in North Haven, but otherwise compares about equally with other towns in the New Haven area when the size of these municipalities are taken into account. In addition to his new salary, which was upped from \$3,700 to its present level in the 1953-54 budget, the first selectman is provided with use of a town car. (Former First Selectman Frank Barker used a Chrysler which was traded in this year for a 1953 Buick now being used by First Selectman Frank Clancy.)

A survey was made by the EAST HAVEN NEWS to determine the annual salaries paid town chiefs in surrounding towns. Here is how they compare with population sizes indicated by population figures of the 1950 census.

EAST HAVEN: (pop. 12,212) — \$5,500 with use of town car.
WOODBURGE: (2,822) — \$3,000 plus \$600 for expenses.
NORTH HAVEN: (9,444) — \$6,500 plus \$500 for expenses.
BRANFORD: (10,944) — \$5,000 plus \$500 car allowance.
HAMDEN: (29,715) — \$9,500 plus use of town car.
WEST HAVEN: (32,010) — \$7,500, Mercury town car plus \$300 a year traveling expenses.
NEW HAVEN: (164,443) — \$10,000 (mayor's salary) plus use of Cadillac town car.

Cold weather combined with the phenomenon of a shock-wave emanating from the leading edge of a jet-plane traveling at supersonic speeds to give East Haven the jolt of a life-time last Thursday afternoon. Reports were never very clear, but it was believed that a jet-plane was responsible for the concussion which reverberated about the East Haven area like a thunderclap to rattle, and even shatter, windows and blow open doors. The concussion wave was mis-taken for an explosion, bringing the police switchboard with more than a hundred calls, so that Police Chief Edwin Priest later had to protest.

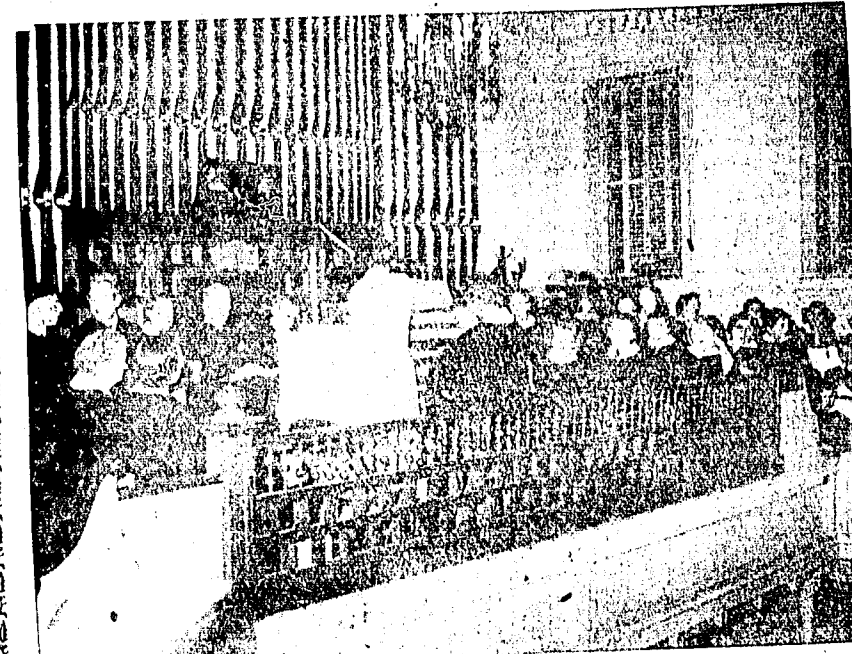
Babe Ruth League To Sound Out Local Parents On Plans

Health, Wealth and Love It is a Polish custom at Christmas time for members of families, relatives and friends to join in a quiet ceremony of dividing their little wafers known as "Opłatki" (pronounced O-pwat-kee). About the size of a standard blotter, these thin wafers, pale white or colored and impressed with scenes of the Nativity, are usually distributed by the church elders.

Customarily, on Christmas Eve, around a simple table laden perhaps with the many special dishes that the people in this country rely so greatly, and brightened by candles and other traditional Christmas decorations, comes the joyful ceremony that recalls the breaking of bread. Even without the customary setting, special pastries and holiday decorations, this little ceremony requires one's warmest participation.

It is customary for the parents to begin, dividing one large opłatka with a sharp crack as the brittle wafer separates. The children, seated around the table, follow suit, each holding firmly, wishes the other the fulfillment of his fondest hopes, and those gifts, requisites of well being: Health, Wealth, Love and Happiness.

Next, the parents turn to each of their children, and again divide their wafers, resting those general and special wishes in each, and so on, until all present are divided, and each is left with a minute wafer which is finally eaten.

On Christmas morning, visitors are invited to participate in a similar division of the opłatka and to exchange good wishes. Families seated more in the background of the "Opłatki" as they family members, the Polish method of their parents, grandparents, partake of a similar and simultaneous ceremony of dividing food, such as a hard-boiled egg. This having been accomplished, the meal or the round of friendly drinks begins.

If no accident that this custom has a wider central part, the custom is observed, as a winter, of food, of the warm joy of love and

Friendship. For, in addition to the celebration of the birth of Christ, it is not Christmas a sharing of all those good things of life, Christmas alone, without someone to share, is not Christmas at all.

The story of Christmas is the story of the entry into this world of the Divine love which in which human love, itself, was born.

In the approaching Christmas-tide, the editor would like to extend the opłatka of good will and of good wishes to all the people of East Haven. He wishes them: Health, Wealth, Love and Happiness.

Shocking Waste The recent revelation by a New York state legislative committee that a respected organization as the Disabled American Veterans was guilty of permitting the squandering of most of \$2,450,000 collected in the past three years was shocking, to say the least.

It is almost unbelievable that of such a large sum, donated by the American people sympathetic of the plight of the disabled veteran, that 98 per cent of it was spent on fund-raising. Not one penny went to the aid of a disabled veteran or his family!

Such gross mismanagement of funds is inexcusable and even criminal. Furthermore, the activities of the D.A.V. Service Foundation generally without authorization exceeds the absolute limit of responsibility of those in charge. They have betrayed not only the American public which had given gladly, but the needy veterans or anyone else who might have received the aid that money could have provided.

This week State Senator Bernard Tompkins held the hearing that at least 100 other charity organizations in New York state are guilty of fraud or objectionable expenditures. Truly, with so many groups devoted, professedly or genuinely, to so many worthy causes, the time has come when the public must be assured that its gifts are not used to line someone's pockets.

Senator Tompkins has proposed some general recommendations for amendment by the New York legislature. His list might be used by every state in the union as a guide to the establishment of a more or less uniform regulation of all charitable organizations.

Atomic Weapons A and NATO The Eisenhower administration's decision to back renunciation from Congress to share United States atomic weapons with members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization is a gesture of confidence in the ability of the NATO members to handle the atomic bomb.

However, other things were not equal, and the time had come when it was necessary to face the task of overcoming inherent congressional resistance to supplying atomic weapons to NATO members.

Reason 1 is that since the United States, Britain and Canada were their separate ways in atomic development, the British and the Canadians have secured developments which have become much wanted in Washington.

William H. Dunham, Jr., Professor of History at Yale who recently returned from a year of study in England, pointed out that government control of universities and colleges in Great Britain is not a result of the structure of the University Grants Committee.

He compared the British government's present support of higher education with that of the United States. "If you look at Britain as a single state, or three or four states, it is not unlike the United States," he said.

As for the men in grey, they send their share of Christmas cards, too. Ask one and see.

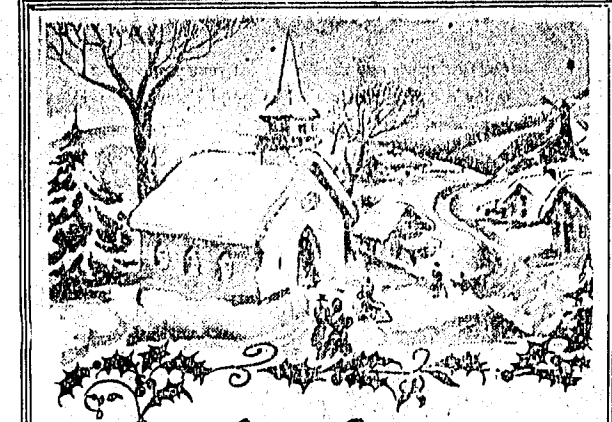

Hold on there! His practical advice exclaimed: "I'll check the even-tenor file. Himm. This year they've had us to four dinners and an anniversary party, and we only asked them to one mixed party given before we sent them a fifty-center, and go on to the Brantys."

Mr. Schuyler agreed and began whistling "White Christmas." After some study he granted, "I've always liked Brady, but the record shows they only sent Christmas cards in even years. Since 1953 is an odd year, I'll just stay in at his office and slap him on the back."

Needless to say, the Schuyler system will not win friends and influence people. But common sense will. Good taste in selecting, mailing and keeping your Christmas cards attractive is a more important goal at which to shoot.

Start with your address book. Bringing it up-to-date is the first step. That means checking for the full name, street and number, city, zone and state. The zone number is especially important, when Christmas cards are mailed at the eleven-hour hour.

With this done, you'll at least know how many Christmas cards are mailed at the eleven-hour hour.

Nothing fancy is expected. Just write or print as neatly as you can. Abbreviations and hasty, legible scribbling often cause delays in delivery. Col. for California may be read as Cal. for California. Nicknames are another bottleneck, for they seldom appear on mailboxes.

Etiquette and postal authorities agree that "First class friends deserve first class mail." Translated literally, this means that Christmas cards will be forwarded or returned, if necessary, if they carry the brief written messages so many people like to add.

Really — let's face it — there's nothing to this business of signing a Christmas card. Unless you're married or would like the signature implored. And that leaves quite a chunk of the nation for whom it's perfectly proper to sign Tom or Mary.

What's more, the exceptions noted need trouble no one. Among married couples the correct name is for the one signing to put her or his name last. When implored to engrave, the signature properly begins with the wife's name.

If there are children, however, Dad's name should come first, with the youngsters listed according to age. Last names should be omitted, but may be given in family signatures, whether printed or written in ink, or when identification is needed.

Titles such as "Mr." and "Miss" are used today only on formal

engraved cards — and naturally the envelope address. The trend is overwhelming towards a key but thoughtful informality.

To make your Christmas greetings even more personal, there are family-style cards. The designs may picture a Gay Nineties couple or Mr. and Mrs. Stone, accompanied by one, two or three children. One picture is a snow-covered house with a space for printing your own address. From cards and countless other notable touches the 1953 Christmas cards give new meaning to Charles Dickens' familiar words — "Christmas messages are a great accumulation of friendly recollections."

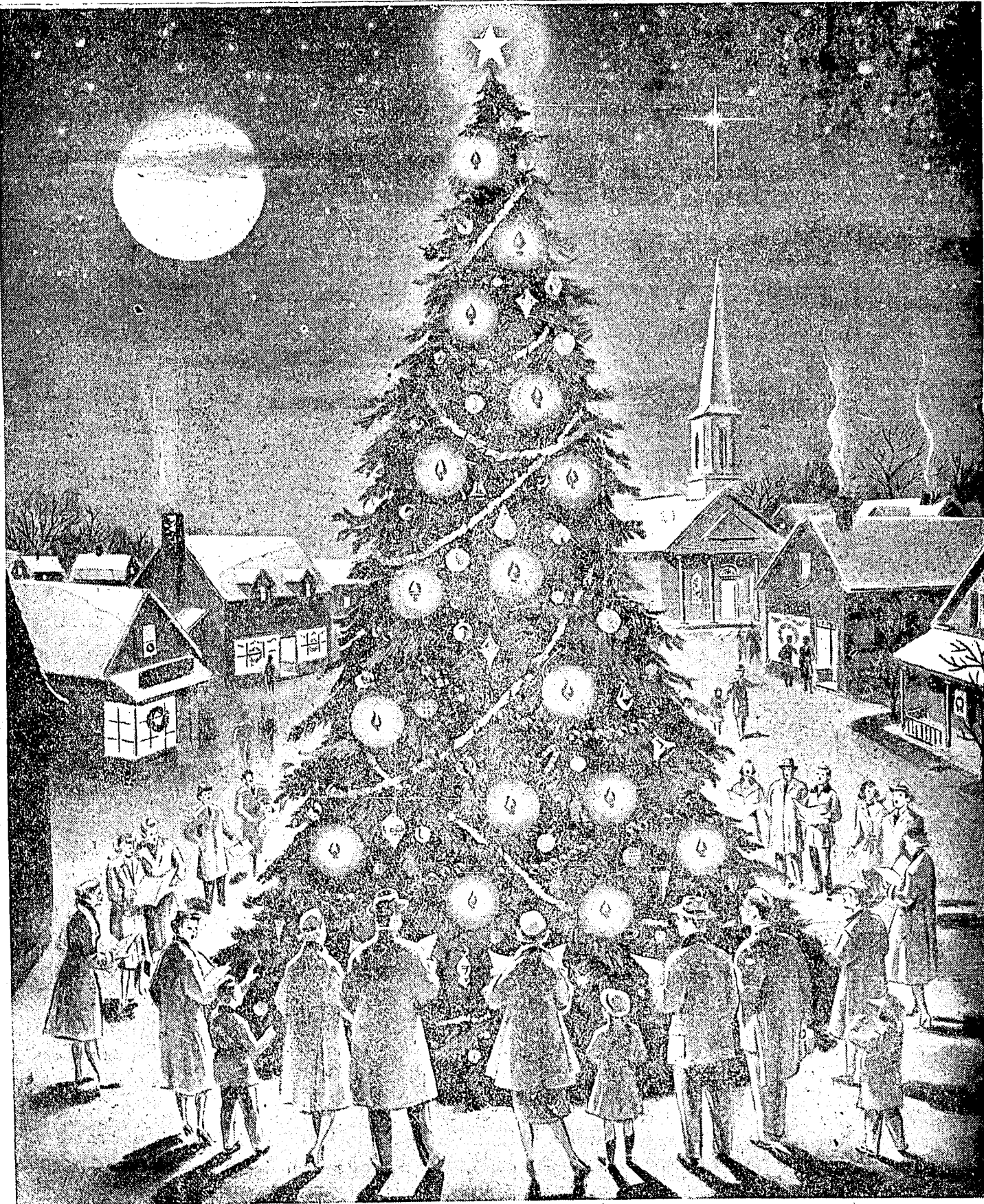

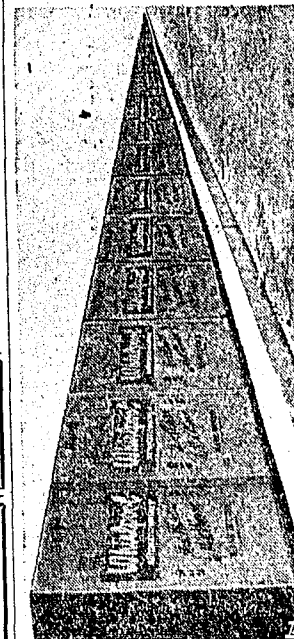

No matter how you look at it this is a lot! Actually, it is only 1,292 feet long. It consists of 500 home automatic washing machines and dryers, side by side. This represents just two hours output of the 4,000 home laundry units which was the daily rate of production when this picture was taken at St. Joseph, Mich., home of Whirlpool Corporation, world's largest manufacturer of home laundry appliances.
