### Cold Snap And A. Diving, Chap Give E.H. Nasty Rap

Cold weather connived with the phenomenon of a shock-wave emanating from the leading edge of a jet-plane traveling at supersonic speeds to give East Haven the jolt of a life-time last Thurs

day afternoon. Reports were never very clear but it was believed that a jet plane was responsible for the concussion which reverberated about the East Haven area like a thun derclap to rattle, and even shatter, windows and blow open doors

The concussive wave was mis-taken for an explosion, bringing the police switchboard with more than a hundred calls, so that Police Chlef Edwin Priest later had Shock-waves generated by the

leading edge of airplanes flying at the speed of sound are capable of continuing on independently of the craft if it should change direction. They occur when the plane hits the speed of sound, which latter speed is determined by altitude and air temperature. Similarity between the local phenomenon and those experience ed quite frequently in other areas might lead one to believe that the craft responsible was headed downward in a dive at the speed of sound and pulled out leaving



No matter how you look at it this is a lot! Actually, it is only 1,292 feet long. It consists of 500 home automatic washing machines and dryers, side by side. This represents just two hours output of the 4,000 home laundry units which was the daily rate of production when this picture was taken at St. Joseph, Mich., home of Whirlpool Corporation, world's largest manufacturer of home laundry appliances.
