Re-Appoint Ernest Hansen To Post Of Fire Marshal

As a "faithful, efficient, public servant" and pledged continuance of the office.
Fire Marshal Ernest Hansen was appointed to his present office in 1950 by the first Clancy administration. He then had been serving as fire chief, a post he had held for about 17 years. The present Fire Chief Thomas J. Hayes was appointed to succeed him.
Hansen has served with the voluntary and regular Fire Departments of the town for the past 45 years. His salary was rated at \$3,300 per annum.
He was eligible for a pension at the age of 65, but state law does not make retirement compulsory until the age of 72. Hansen, who is in good health, has indicated he would like to continue his work.

Bertel Klockars Undergoes Surgery After Leg Injury

Bertel Klockars, a member of the Board of Public Safety and of the Parking Authority, returned to New Haven Hospital Monday for surgery after he twisted his knee in an accident Friday. He was due to be operated on yesterday. Hospital authorities said his condition was not serious.
Klockars, who had previously undergone surgery after injuring his leg about two months ago, suddenly twisted his knee while in his home. He had recently just aside a cane he had used while recovering from his first operations.
The local public official is an employe of the U-I Company, as well as being the operator of a local oil dealer business.

School Bd. Advances Meeting To Tonight

The Board of Education, slated to meet in regular session Friday night, will meet tonight instead. In order to permit members of the board to attend a meeting in San Francisco, the meeting date was advanced by the Board majority to attend the Democratic state convention.

Gerrish School Progresses Most, Others Come Along

Of three separate school construction projects in town, the new school on Gerrish Ave. has shown the greatest progress to date. Workmen this week were pouring, or preparing to pour, floors in four remaining classrooms. By Tuesday afternoon, seven classroom floor sections had been poured and had already set.
At the same school, the high walls of the all-purpose room neared completion. White brick and other facing had already been laid along the interior walls and casements for the windows high on one wall were already installed.
Supporting steel uprights were in place in the classroom portion of the building and brick and cinder block columns erected.

At Foxon School
Progress at the Foxon School was also notable. Steel uprights have been erected and brick and cinder block columns have been built along one side. The walls of the all-purpose room and boiler room are gradually rising.

At Monauglin
At the Monauglin school where work on a four-room addition has been slowed by excavation difficulties, pouring of outer foundation walls continued. By the end of this week, the contractors hope to have most of this work done.
Huge stones in the filled area, together with flooding, made it necessary to excavate large pits into which were built piers and footings. Some of the footings at the front measure five feet square by two feet deep. They rest on sand.
Workmen are now busy preparing forms for the pouring of the concrete walls which will rest on some of these footings and will constitute the base of the new classrooms and all-purpose room.

Before this work can continue, however, a clam shovel will be employed to carefully place the excavated fill back round the new piers without disturbing their position.

C. Of C. Executive Committee Seeks To Crack Apathy 'Nut'

The executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce will meet on July 20 at the home of President Elwood Scoble, at 15 Elm Ct., for the purpose of acting on several matters. One will be an examination of means of instilling the interest of merchants in the activities of the local businessmen's group.

Although the five-year-old Chamber has a membership of approximately 80 business and professional people it has rarely been able to get the active participation of more than a dozen. Members of the Chamber who have a good record of attendance in the past few years include: Scoble, Dayton Well, Donald Bartlett, John Kmetz, Robert Schirmer, Henry Griswold, D. Charles Beausoleil, Harold Kimball, Herman Scharf, Michael Como, William Ginnell, Bertel Klockars and East Haven News, Mathew Anastasio, a new member, has been a regular attendee since he joined a few months back.
For the rest, some have had fair attendance while others have had very spotty records. In their absence, the Chamber has been unable to formulate policies with the full backing of a sizeable segment of the Chamber.
How to crack this nut of apathy will be the number one consideration of the executive committee.

Miss Anne D. Mascola, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Mascola of 95 Bradley Ave., left by plane Friday to attend the conference.

Miss Mascola is with the Department of Preventive Medicine of the Yale Medical School. She will deliver a report on progress made in Polio research being conducted by her department.
The local woman is co-author of an article on Polio research appearing recently in National Medical Magazine. She is a graduate of East Haven High School, class of 1947. She received her B. A. in bacteriology from Albertus Magnus College in 1951 and her M.S. in bacteriology and serology from the University of Connecticut in 1952.
On her return trip from the conference she plans to visit Los Angeles, the Grand Canyon, Chicago and New York.

Dunn & McCabe Named To DEM State Central Com'ee

In keeping with their announced policies of rotating the 12th congressional district seats on the Democratic State Central Committee among the towns, State Central Committee members James F. Gartland, of East Haven, and Committee woman Nellie Drinkwine, of Wallingford, stepped down to be replaced by two other Democrats at a caucus Tuesday night in North Haven.
Named were David Dunn, of Hamden, former state trooper and a member of the sales staff of the Dolan Steel Company in Bridgeport; and Mrs. Barbara McCabe, of North Haven, secretary of the Democratic Town Committee here.

Their nominations were voted unanimously by the district caucus and will be presented for formal election at the Democratic state convention in Hartford this week-end.

The absence of a contest for the committee posts, the first in 14 years, signifying that both were bowing out. It read as follows:
"Two years ago when I was elected state central committeeman from the 12th senatorial district my platform was based on a rotation system within the 12th district in order to give each town an opportunity at a future date to be represented in the state organization."
"At that time I stated I would be happy to serve two years and to find that the expiration date will be at the state convention in Hartford on June 25 and 26, Miss Nellie Drinkwine of Wallingford, state central committeewoman, also placed her candidacy on the speak in her behalf at this time. We wish to go on record that we will not be candidates for the committee posts in the 12th senatorial district at this time."
"We feel that we have handled the position to the best of our ability. Reports have been made to the chairman of the various towns after each state central committee meeting. We have had meetings with the town chairmen, registrars where at all possible on a monthly basis."

"The expressions and suggestions from these individuals have been reported to the state central committee. We have continually responded with the town chairmen so that they would be aware of the situation in the state and within the various towns."
"We take this opportunity to thank the town chairmen and registrars for their excellent cooperation during the entire two years we have been in office and we are sure that the committeeman and woman who will be elected at the coming state convention will carry on and continue to do everything in their power to keep the 12th senatorial district unified. In our humble opinion we have achieved the fulfillment of this district's duty. It has been exemplified in this caucus tonight."
George Kirkham, observing 95th birthday Friday.
George Chisley Kirkham, of 6 Kirkham Ave., who could lay fair claim to being the town's oldest resident, will observe his 95th birthday tomorrow. He is presently a patient at Grace-New Haven Community Hospital and it is not known whether he will be able to celebrate the birthday at home.
Kirkham, who can claim to be East Haven's oldest voter having been 72 years on the voting list, was taken to the hospital in Monday. Attendants there reported today that his condition was "good."
Although hampered by loss of most of his sight, the old-timer remained quite active until very recently. He was able to do his own shopping around the Town center just a block from his home, where he lives with his wife.
Kirkham, who has a colorful personal history, was born on Chapel St. in New Haven. As a boy of four he had the experience of being detained with his parents as a prisoner-of-war. That was in 1863 during the war between the states.
A resident of East Haven since 1860, he organized the first independent telephone exchange in town. Later he served as a special agent for the Southern New England Telephone Company.
The long-time resident also helped arrange for the operation of the first trolley line in town which ran from New Haven to Lake Saltonstall, and was instrumental in the sale of a large Hill and New Haven to the city of New Haven.
He served as one of the organizers of the first East Haven Volunteer Fire Company and during the first World War was secretary of the Connecticut Council of Defense and as fuel administrator for East Haven.

Gartland Seen Leading In DEM Congress Race With Elm City Backing

Four Candidates Listed In DEM Race For State Repr.

At least four names have been entered for consideration for the Democratic nomination for state representative, James F. Gartland, chairman of the Democratic Town Committee, revealed this week.
In the Republican ranks, on the other hand, indications were strong that Mrs. Elizabeth Crowley and Adolphe C. Mautice, will run for reelection to the lower house of the General Assembly.
Democrats mentioned for the two nominations for state representative are: Harold LaPointe, William Buckell Jr., Jerome Grady and Arthur Riccio. LaPointe, who has been considered for some time as a likely nominee, is a health counselor for the Southern New England Telephone Company.
Riccio, local contractor who has constructed the Mapleview development, is a member of the Board of Public Safety. Grady is a former president of Glenwood Civic Association and is now publicity director for the Gartland for Congress movement.

GOP Rep's Decline Comment
State Representatives Cromney Mautice has won the endorsement to discuss any plans for running for reelection at this time. However, it was generally conceded by key Republican leaders that both would be re-nominated to run again if they desired.
Mautice has won the endorsement of the local GOP organization for the party nomination for high sheriff. In the event that he would step aside and allow some one else to run for the state House of Representatives.
There is a long stretch of time between the county convention and the local GOP caucus scheduled for September 20 when the party will name its candidates for the state house. Appearances are, therefore, that there will be no rival candidates until after the July 17 convention.
As for the Democrats, their caucus for selecting candidates for

state representative will be held on August 24. At both parties' local caucuses candidates will also be selected for judge of the local probate court. Among the Democrats, so far, the name of former town court Judge Charles Copeland has been most prominently mentioned for this post.

Jaspers Up For Re-Election To GOP Central Com.

William Jaspers, former state senator, will seek remaining state central committeeman from the 12th district at a Republican district convention to be held Saturday afternoon at the Woodlawn Inn in Madison. Indications were that Jaspers who is also treasurer of the GOP town committee here, will go unopposed.
The convention which will be attended by delegates from the eight towns in the district will also make plans for the forthcoming state convention slated for July 8 and 9 in Hartford.
Mrs. Marie P. Moore, of Northford, is the state central committeewoman from this district.

Delegates Elected

On Monday Mrs. Marie B. Kronberg, primary secretary for East Haven, cast a single ballot electing a slate of delegates to the various conventions this summer.
Delegates who will attend the district convention on Saturday and the state convention next month are: Mathew Anastasio, town chairman; Mrs. Charlotte Miller; State Rep. Adelbert C. Mautice; and State Rep. (Mrs.) Elizabeth Crowley. Alternates are Judge Vincent J. Fasano, Selectman Frank Barker, Mrs. Ruth Barker, and Robert M. Taylor Jr., town prosecutor.

Local Police Team Up With F.B.I. To Convict Burglar

Some modern sleuthing by the local Police Department coupled with a direct assist from the Federal Bureau of Investigation produced evidence which led last Thursday to convict a New Haven man in a burglary committed in an East Haven Restaurant last January 4.

Joseph Esposito, 34, of 143 Wallace St., New Haven, pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary before Judge Samuel Melitz in New Haven Superior Court and was given a one-year county jail sentence with six months suspended for good behavior, and two years probation.

Local police, headed by Assistant Chief Joseph Pollo, investigated a break at Florio's Country House Restaurant on Route 80 in Foxon Park last January. The burglar had broken into a coin-operated cash machine and removed some \$150 in change.
"Find Prints
Police Officer John Leary and Pollo found several finger prints in the metal change receiver which did not correspond with those of any employees who had access to the interior of the machine. A cigarette machine and a juke box also had been tampered with.
Investigation by Joseph Casper, a former employee of the restaurant, was being held by New Haven police on a criminal charge in New Haven.

In cooperation with Joseph Casper of the New Haven F.B.I. office and acting through the office of J. Edgar Hoover in Washington the local police had the several unidentified prints lifted from the coin-box checked with the prints sent to Washington by the New Haven police. The F.B.I. identified the coin box prints as Esposito's, about three weeks ago Pollo had brought to East Haven to face new charges brought against him in the Town Court. On view was presented by Town Prosecutor Robert M. Taylor Jr., Esposito was bound over to Superior Court by Judge Vincent Fasano.
Esposito first denied that he entered the restaurant but last week changed his plea to guilty before Assistant State's Atty. Arthur T. Gorman.
Assistant Chief Pollo praised the F.B.I. for its promptness in working with his staff and said that without its co-operation the case would have been difficult to prove.

Pick Recreation Supervisors At Interviews Wed.

The Board of Park Commissioners will meet next Wednesday evening for the purpose of interviewing candidates for four posts of supervisor in the summer recreational program. The board met Monday to discuss the program.
First Selectman Frank S. Clancy revealed that about four candidates had registered but indicated he expected that others would apply. He said that two men and two women may be selected for the program which opens July 6.
At its meeting Monday the board outlined a general plan under which facilities will be used at the Memorial Park, the Massachusetts Ave. park and the playgrounds of the Gillis Monauglin, and Foxon schools.
According to Clancy, a system of supervised recreation is planned with the supervisors rotating among the several playgrounds. A schedule of activities will be set up for given days of the week for each playground. He said the central playgrounds would be maintained throughout the week while the outlying areas would be used on certain days.
"We are trying to get the best program we can out of our limited budget," Clancy said. He predicted that the program would be the largest that the Town has ever had.

The first selectman discounted reports that personnel for the summer program had already been selected.

Backers Setting Up HQRS At Hotel Bond In Hartford

Local backers of James F. Gartland, town chairman, were jubilant this week over his prospects as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Congress from the Third District. The campaign for the 42-year-old state central committeeman got underway this week as preparations were made for the establishment of a campaign booth Friday at the Hotel Bond in Hartford—meeting place of the Democratic state convention.
Reports from inside Democratic circles gave Gartland's backers plenty to cheer about. From one confidential source has come word that the local candidate is virtually assured of solid backing by the New Haven delegation at the Congressional convention to take place July 31.
Needs 120 Votes
With ten votes of the East Haven delegation pledged to him, added to the 90 votes commanded by the New Haven group, Gartland would not be far short of the 120 votes needed for the nomination. A total of 257 votes will be cast in the district convention.

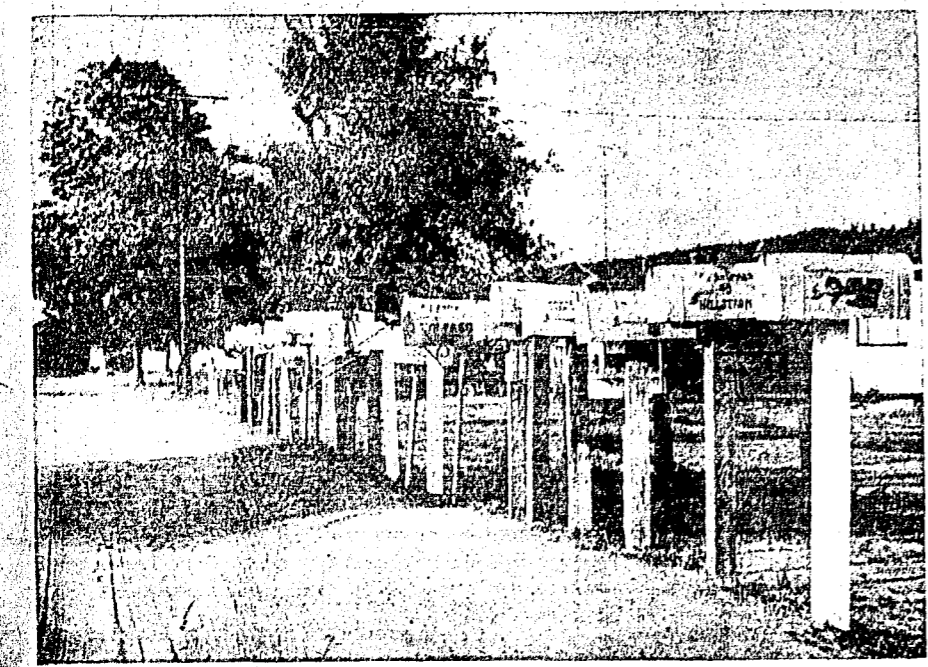
The setting up of the campaign headquarters, in conjunction with headquarters for the Third District appears to have been a report from a "reliable source" that the Gartland forces were given the "gold ahead" sign and handed a thousand-dollar to set up the headquarters.
The booming of Gartland appears to be coupled with a reported eclipsing of former Congressman John A. McGuire, of Wallingford, by his failure to win support of National Committeeman John M. Golden, usually viewed as the commander of the New Haven delegation.

Conflict Reported
Reports of a cooling of relations between McGuire and Golden have prevailed for many months, although several months back it was reported that the two had come to an agreement. However, a McGuire backer polemized the often-hard claim that Golden was at odds over McGuire's appointment of former Postmaster William Higgins.
The former Congressman has promised a fight for the nomination.

Ten delegates and ten alternates headed by Town Chairman James F. Gartland will attend the two-day Democratic state convention in Hartford starting tomorrow evening.
The local delegation, commanding ten votes in the balloting for state officers, has pledged those votes in support of former Congressman Abraham Ribicoff, of Hartford, who is the leading contender for the nomination for governor.
According to Gartland, who is also attending as honorary vice president of the convention, the local delegation will vote on the unit rule principle. More exactly, it will be governed by the majority sentiment.
The delegation will occupy headquarters in the Bond Hotel and will participate in the nominating convention on Saturday morning. The convention itself will be conducted in the Bushnell Memorial Hall.

Civil Defense A Flop

If an H-bomb of the obsolete Eniwetok variety (model 1952) were dropped mid-way it would do severe damage to large portions of New Haven and Bridgeport and additional damage to the remaining sections. That's what a brief consultation of ruler and map along with some statistical information tells us.

But suppose the enemy was a little more economical than that and used the old-fashioned A-bomb, in a rocket head dropped directly over New Haven. What would be the result? Extinction of most of the population of New Haven and East Haven.

Looking this stark reality in the face, how can the recent Civil Defense air raid drill be called a "success." In this age of atomic warfare it was a great, resounding flop. We were simply kidding ourselves if we assumed that this kind of exercise would have helped us in an atomic raid.

We do not mean to slight the efforts of those who have given their own time to provide East Haven with some semblance of protection. The support that they have received from the public hasn't amounted to a row of pins. What they have managed to accomplish is every bit to their own personal credit.

The fact is plainly this: The American public is going along on the day-to-day assumption that we simply aren't going to have an atomic war. This assumption rests solidly on the hope that the retaliatory power of the United States is such that our "natural" enemies, Soviet Russia, would not dare to launch an attack upon us.

It is a great hope, one in which we all share, or fervently. However, it is lying in the face of factual reports that the Soviet Union has been methodically dispersing its industries and developing its air raid defense system EVER SINCE WORLD WAR II. Have we done anything similar? Only in the slightest degree.

The totally unexpected attack upon Pearl Harbor would have served as an eternal lesson. But it would hardly seem that we have learned it.

Who is at fault? Our Civil Defense officials? Our government? Perhaps, the fault is generally shared. Although we would certainly hesitate to blame the individual who voluntarily gives up his own time and energy without compensation to participate in the local CD organization.

Town Topics

There's a phenomenon known as "Bully's Beach" which gets its name from the view of the sun's outer edge as the moon rises, full eclipse. This irregular edge is due to the mountains and depressions on the moon. However, this will probably be seen only in the area of total eclipse.

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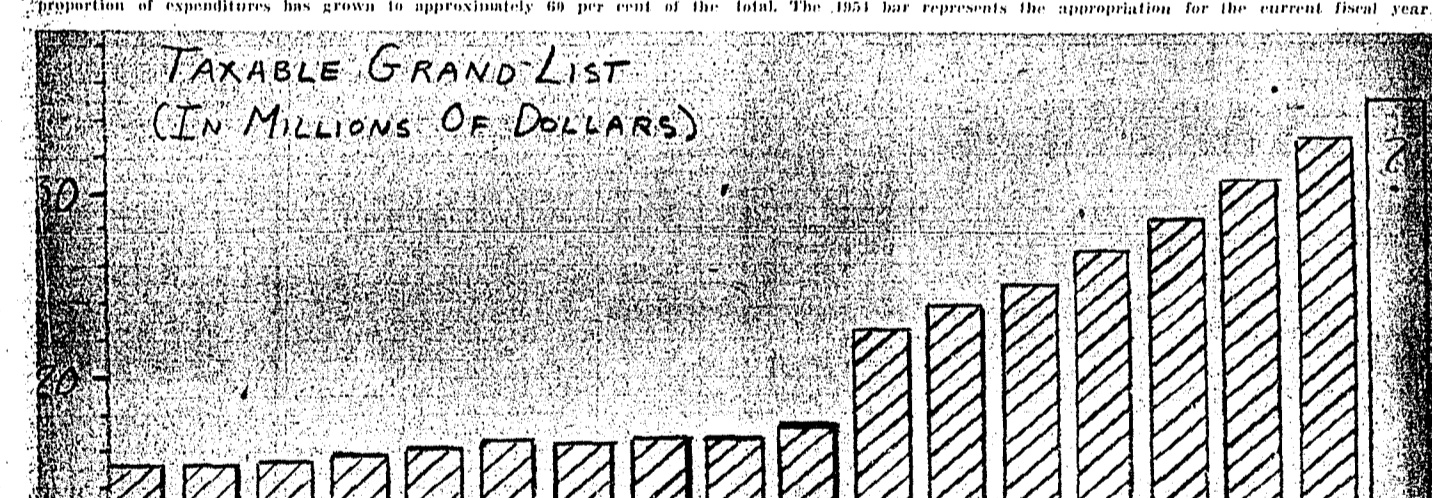
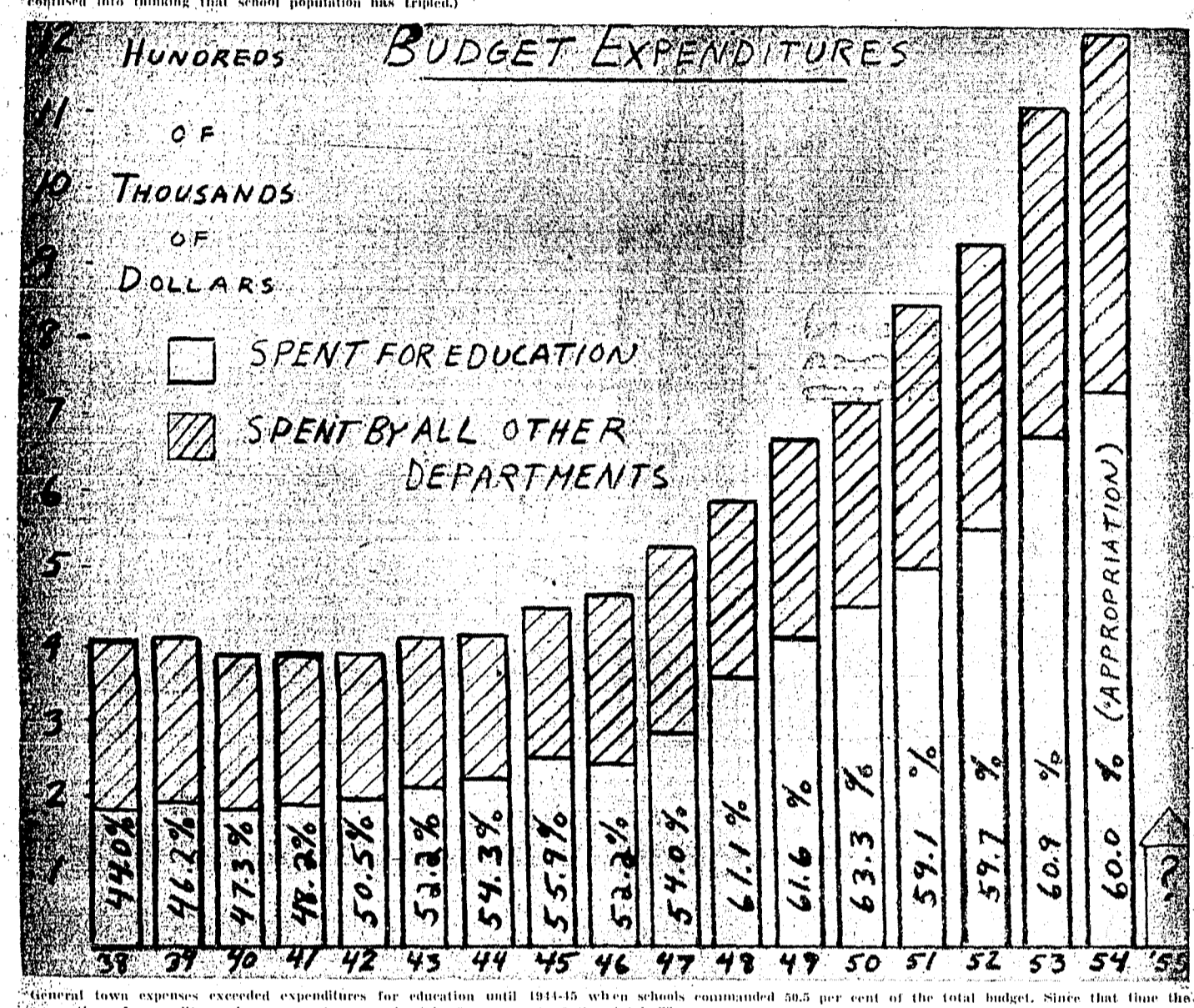
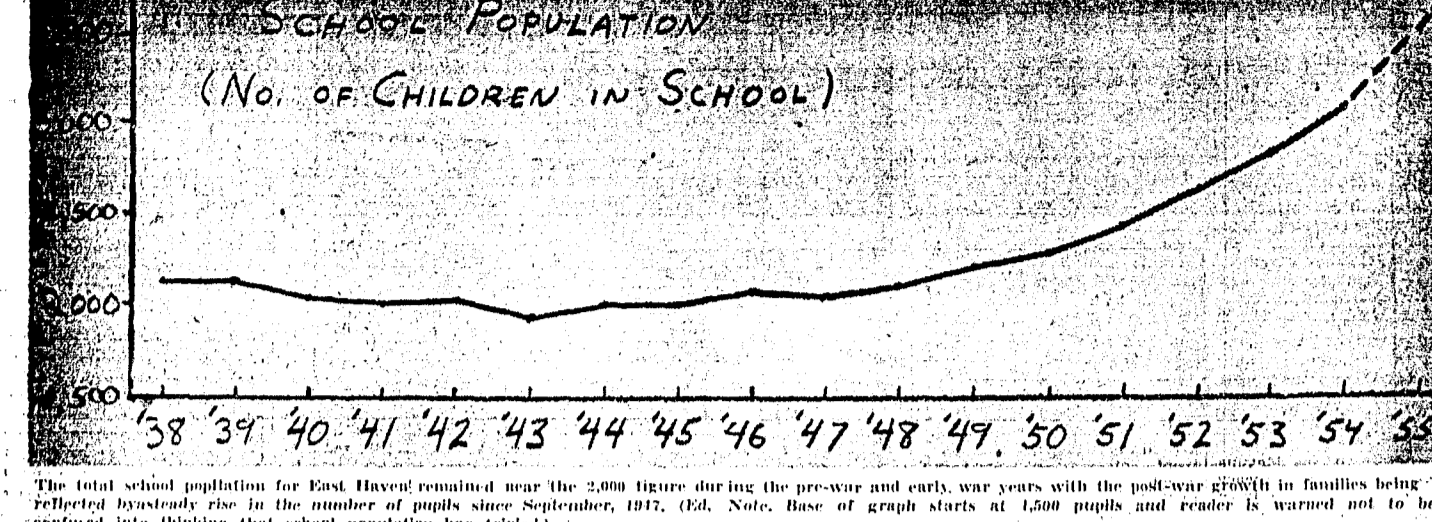

Cost Of Increasing Fire Insurance Cited By Clancy

More exact information on the actual cost of bringing fire insurance protection up to recommended levels was released this week by First Selectman Frank Clancy.

Exact cost of increasing insurance on 17 buildings by a total amount of \$1,872,500 would be \$16,552.90 for a five year period. Broken down into annual payments it would mean an additional \$2,876.55 for the current year or next year, and \$6,008.01 per year for the following years.

The total value of insured property would be raised to \$3,449,100.

The Insurance Commission met last week with the Board of Finance to discuss the changes recommended by an insurance company report. The raising of the fire insurance was approved by the Finance Bd., Clancy said.
