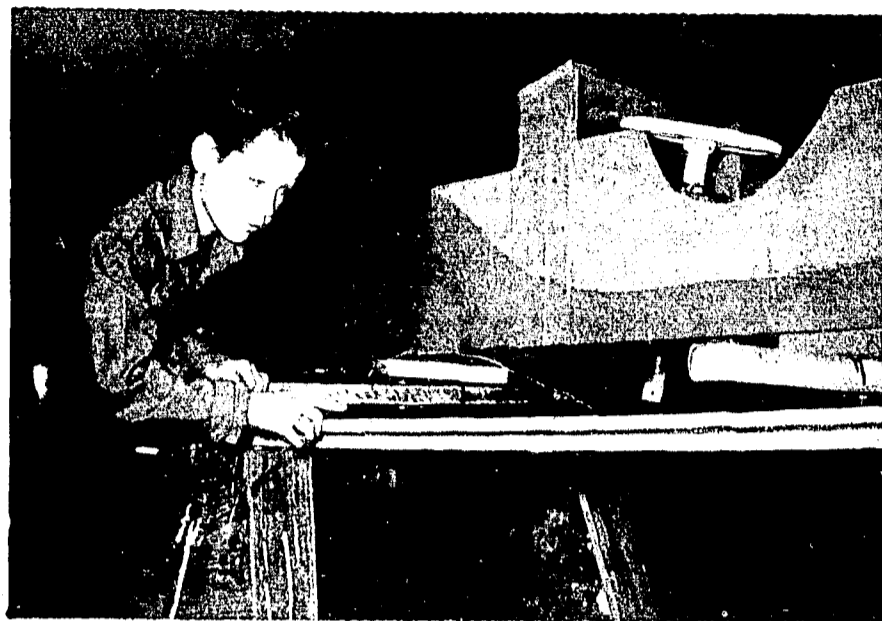

Legion Junior Auto Derby Set For Sunday

The second annual East Haven Junior Auto Derby will open Sunday on Hill St. off Short Beach Rd. in Momaugun with the first starting gun sounded at 1 p. m. The derby is being conducted by Harry Bartlett Post 89, American Legion.

Some 48 East Haven youngsters, ages 11 to 14, will enter four-wheeled "soap-box" racers, powered by gravity, and constructed by themselves with the financial assistance of sponsoring merchants and friends.

Cars Displayed Saturday
The cars will be displayed Saturday afternoon from one to three p. m. at the front of the Metaseal Company. Their drivers are requested to report to the building at one o'clock.

While the starting time has been set for 1 p. m., all drivers are instructed to be at the starting line on Hill Street at 12 o'clock noon Sunday for the purpose of receiving their final instructions. If the weather is rainy, the event will be postponed until the following Sunday.

Members of the American Legion committee in charge of the event, will report to the quarters of the Metaseal Company at 199 Main St. at 8 a. m. Sunday in order to make preparations for the races, according to Walter Link, chairman.

All the entering cars have been collected at the Metaseal Company building for storage this week. During the week members of the derby committee have been in-

specting the various models to see that they are safely constructed and designed for use in Sunday's contests. A starting ramp will be set up which will insure added speed and assure a fair start for all entries.

Committee members have chosen the new site of the races with the protection of the young derby drivers and of spectators in mind. Not as steep as the hill used last year, Hill St. is expected to be safer for all concerned.

Trophies To Be Awarded
Handsome trophies will be awarded to the first, second, and third place winners, fastest time down the track, and the best appearing car. The winner of the fastest time down the track will not necessarily be the winner of the race as all winners will race against each other in following heats until all but one are eliminated.

The East Haven High School PTA will operate refreshment stands and the proceeds will be used to publish a general information booklet to be presented to all high school students. Adequate parking facilities will be available along Short Beach Rd.

The racers have been presented with "T" shirts and attractive brassards and before starting down the raceway they will be equipped with special safety helmets. A medical doctor and nurse will be on hand should any accident occur. Dr. Rocco Bove.

Re-appointment Of Wolfe Gets Democrats' Approval

Re-appointment of Fred E. Wolfe Jr., to a four-year term on the Board of Finance received the stamp of approval of the executive section of the Democratic Town Committee Tuesday night leaving the way open for favorable action by the Board of Selectmen later this week. Wolfe's present term as a successor to George Wood expires at the end of this month.

The selection of Wolfe, not a member of the regular party organization, by a unanimous vote of the executive committee represented a concession to the wishes of First Selectman Frank Clancy who nominated the Finance Bd. member at Tuesday night's meeting as a candidate for re-appointment.

Zoning Selection Postponed
However, action on another candidate favored by Clancy for re-nomination to a town governmental post was postponed "for further consideration." This is George McManus, Republican member of the Planning and Zoning Commission, whose five-year term also expires at the end of this month.

According to reports, there are no personal objections to the re-naming of McManus. In fact, Democratic leaders admit that no members of their party have been advanced as candidates to succeed McManus.

However, there is the matter of party control of the board. Re-appointment of McManus would mean a preservation of the existing 3-2 Republican majority on that board which has been under GOP control for about 14 years.

Also at stake is the chairmanship of the board, presently held by Charles Miller, who has headed the committee for most, if not all of the 14 years of Republican rule.

In actuality, Democratic interest and participation on the board has been feeble. However, the body is presently engaged in preparing a plan for the town. The project is vital to the success of plans for the redevelopment of Momaugun. These plans have been almost strictly under the aegis of the Democratic party, although not all segments of the organization have been fervid proponents of the proposed redevelopment.

Highway Department Working In Foxon

The Town Highway Department was busy this week in the Glenwood and Maplevale developments patching and cleaning roads. Martin Halloran, supervisor, said that oiling would not be required this season.

According to First Selectman Frank Clancy, as soon as this operation is completed the crews will proceed to armor coating on several roads in the central section.

May Petition County To Get Road Repaired

A petition to the commissioners of New Haven County requesting an inspection of road conditions on a portion of Bradley St. is now being considered as a means of forcing the town to undertake repairs on that street, Anthony De Mayo, local attorney, told The East Haven News this week.

De Mayo, who lives in Bradley St., said that he was prepared to secure the signatures of six area property owners on a petition as required by state law in order to force some action. He charged the Clancy administration with failing to live up to promises to repair the road.

Repair Postponed
De Mayo's dispute with the town administration concerned with that section of Bradley St. lying between McMay's farm and the middle of the Lynwood development. Earlier this year the Highway Department resurfaced the upper section of the street. The town left off repairing the lower section until construction in that area had been completed and heavy equipment was no longer in use on the roads.

The local lawyer, who heads the Lynwood Civic Association, said that his petition to the county commissioners, if taken, would indirectly represent the Lynwood group since protesting residents are members of the association. He admitted that his action would be "extraordinary" but said that "I feel that's the only thing left to do."

De Mayo claims that he has been after the town since last March to have the Bradley St. section repaired. The road surface has been torn up on both sides for the installation of utility pipes and in addition the central pavement has deteriorated.

Wants Compensation For Town
Three weeks ago, Clancy told De Mayo that the town would not undertake a repair of the road until it collected some compensation from the utility companies and E. L. Bowles, Inc., New Haven contractor who built the Lynwood development. Both the utilities and contractor are held responsible for damage to the road.

Clancy denied that he had made a series of promises, as De Mayo claims to fix the road. He confirmed De Mayo's claim that he had taken the stand that no repairs would be undertaken until the private companies came across with some assistance for repairing the roads.

De Mayo does not object to this, but says he sees no connection between the town's efforts to collect compensation from private companies.

McGuire May Take Battle To Floor

While preparations were under way in the Town Hall to make room for more than 300 delegates and alternates to the first Democratic Congressional convention to be held here in years, the party organization headed by National Committeeman John M. Golden rolled restlessly on to its announced objective: the nomination of James F. Gartland, East Haven town chairman, as the Democratic candidate for Congressman from the Third District.

And despite reports of frantic behind-the-scenes efforts by ex-Congressman John McGuire to capture the nomination just one more time, indications were that Gartland would be nominated by an overwhelming majority among the 251 votes to be cast.

Adoption of a unit-rule resolution by the New Haven delegation over the voced protests of a single man appeared to spell doom for the chances of McGuire Monday evening. The key 90-man delegation will be bound to support on bloc its majority choice - and all indications were that the choice - Golden's choice - was "Timmy" Gartland.

"Surprise" Unlikely
Only a last-minute change of plan of the magnitude of a miracle or what the more cynical would call a "double-cross" could blunt the Gartland tide. Hopeful backers of McGuire cited the possibility of a "surprise," but at this late stage it seemed as unlikely as a snow storm this time of the year.

Pressure was being reported from a number of quarters, and it is known that several prominent Senators and Congressmen have sought to persuade Golden to endorse McGuire. Latest reports are that heads of the American Federation of Labor and C.I.O. organizations in the state are prepared to announce "No McGuire, no union contributions to campaign funds" at a cocktail party to be staged in the Fitzgerald's Restaurant in New Haven tomorrow (Friday) afternoon.

James Kavanaugh, business agent for the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers Union in New Haven, is reported to have told John Golden as much at the Democratic city convention in New Haven on Monday. Pressure is reported to be coming from outside the state.

No Effect On Golden
These intercessions for McGuire are falling on deaf ears as far as Golden is concerned, according to reports. The New Haven party chieftain has anticipated all this and is undeterred. Golden isn't mad at McGuire, some observers say. He is simply opposing McGuire because the Wallingford borough warden has refused to be pressed in the organizational mold.

McGuire backers are hinting at a last minute coup. In the key New Haven delegation they purport to command 32 votes pledged to McGuire with hopes of picking up 14 more. This bare majority of 46 votes may stay away or walk out of the convention preventing a vote under the unit rule. Where the alternates enter into this is not explained.

One Gartland backer claims the possibility that the Wallingford delegate, normally expected to back McGuire may show a split. Several token candidates are in the field by convention time but are expected to withdraw quickly. One, Hamden Town Chairman Dennis Garvey, who commands 22 votes, has withdrawn. Kenneth Wynne Jr., of North Haven, also may be placed in nomination, but is likewise expected to withdraw.

Geographical and nationalist background of state and Congressional candidates have played an important part in their selection this year. For that reason, it is reported, the nomination of Anthony Grillo, of Hamden, for treasurer cleared the way for the nomination of a candidate of non-Italian extraction in this district for the Congressional nomination.

Winner of the nomination will face Republican Congressman Albert Cretella, of North Haven, a candidate for re-election.

Harold E. LaPointe, of 39 Elm St., and William T. Hackett, Jr., of 101 Hotchkiss Rd. Ext. were selected as the Democratic executive committee's choice for state representatives at a special meeting Tuesday evening. They will be passed on by the full town committee next Tuesday.

Charles M. Copeland, of 57 Catherine St., former deputy judge in the town court and former member of the Board of Education, was selected as the committee's choice for the nomination for judge of probate in the newly created East Haven district.

All nominations were unanimously voted by the executive segment of the Democratic town committee and will be presented to a party caucus to be held here August 24. No opposition is expected to these candidates who likely will be nominated by acclamation.

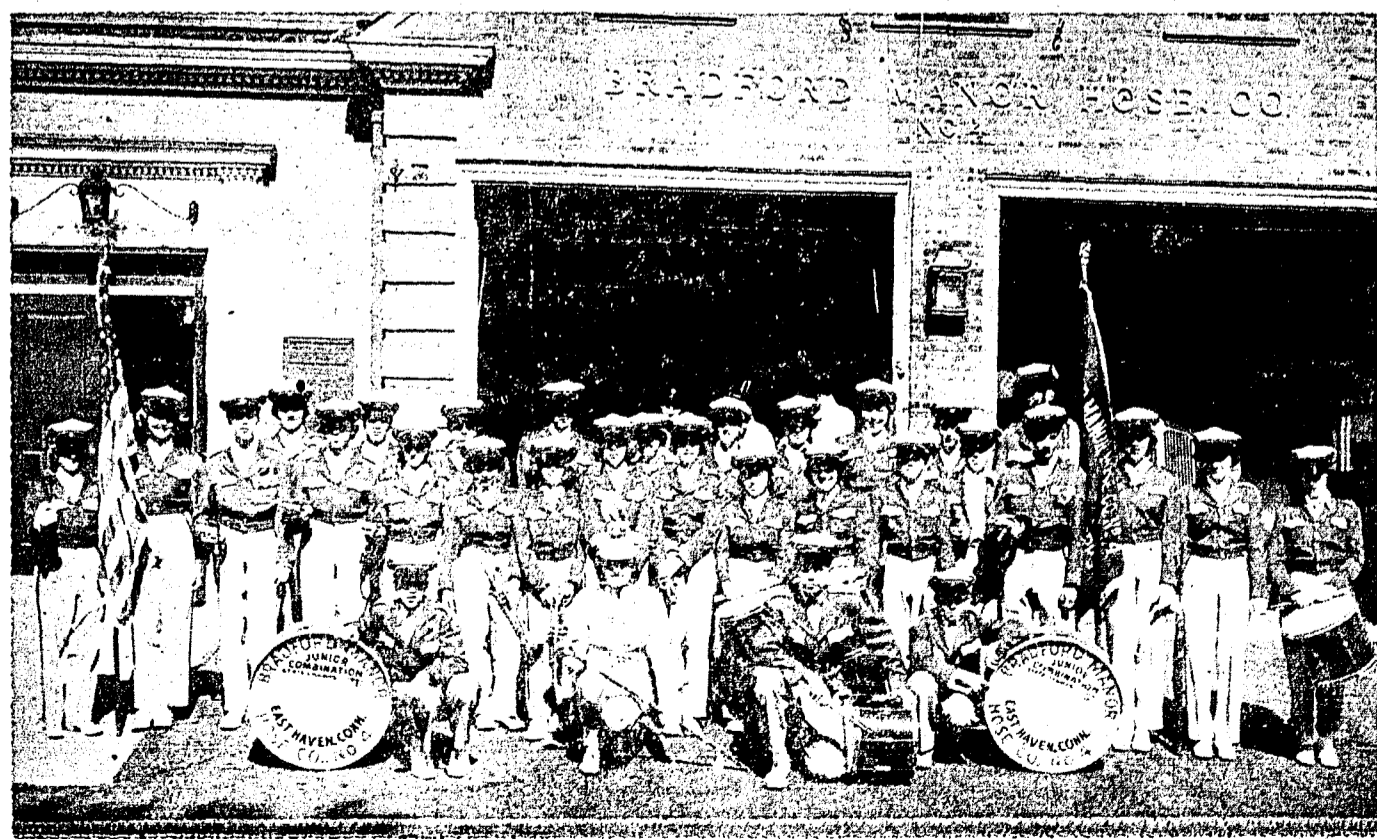
Local Men Attend National Guard Maneuvers

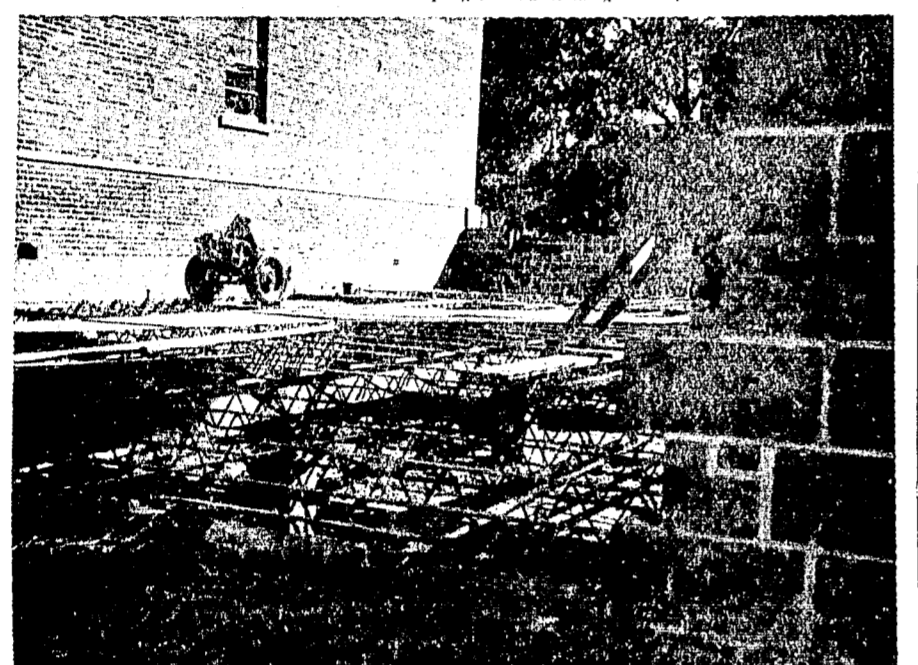

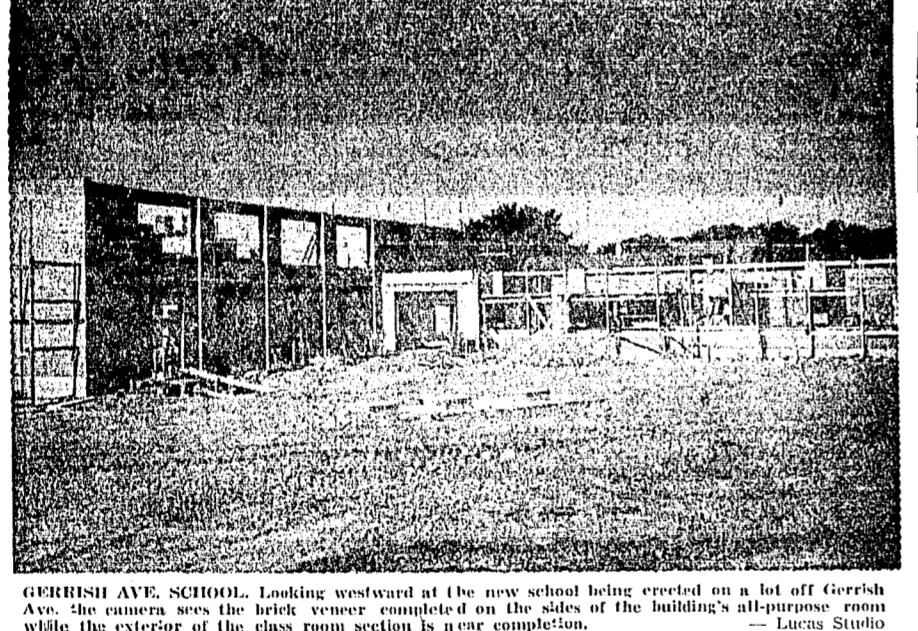
