Tax Increase Inevitable But Extent Still Unknown

First Selectman Frank S. Clancy emerged from behind a voluminous stack of reports and budget requests this week and admitted that an increase in the tax rate is inevitable. He could not hazard an estimate, since at least three days more intensive efforts will have to be devoted to studying requests from all town departments.

Operating expenses will remain about the same in many instances, he ventured, with the bulk of the increase being attributed to salary raises. Substantial increases can be expected on at least three items, Clancy stated. They include civil defense, which is "building up" its program; recreation where a request for a full time director is being included; and insurance. Clancy explained that last year's budget included an appropriation of \$12,500 for insurance. Reappraisal of property values plus coverage of new buildings has resulted in a suggested appropriation of \$37,755.16 this year.

Town Hall Budget About Same

Town Hall expenses will run about the same, he stated, with slight increases requested for clerks' salaries. Due to the intensified road repair and maintenance program now in progress, an expected increase of \$4,000 has been included in the Highway Department request for 1954. The Building Department budget request includes an additional \$2,000 over last year's, Clancy revealed. The Board of Education budget is \$107,559.63 over last year's. Substantial increases are shown in the police and fire departments' estimated requirements. The police are asking for \$33,876 as against \$76,708 allotted last year. The fire department hopes to receive \$97,812 opposed to \$85,174 in the previous year's budget.

Met With Public Safety Bd.

The First Selectman reported that a session with the Board of Public Safety was held on Monday night, with more meetings with the various departments scheduled for tonight and the balance of the week. He emphasized that no definite figures have been arrived at as yet. "We're studying every single request carefully," Clancy stated. "Whenever possible, we hope to include all essential items in the budget."

The Health and Sanitation Department's request will be approximately the same as the previous year, he went on. A final figure will be reached as soon as a bid is accepted on the rubbish and garbage collection costs. A slight reduction on the balance of last year's total can be attributed to the fact that the previous budget included an item covering the cost of a sewer survey, he pointed out.

In addition to new teachers hired by the Board of Education, the only other department adding to its personnel is the police force, added.

While mushrooming growth of the town has added to the grand list, it will not be sufficient to absorb all of the budget increases, with a jump in the tax rate a certainty. Hopeful of keeping it to a minimum, town authorities will be "whistling and whittling" for some days to come.

Eighth Graders May Take Make-Up Exams At High School

A make-up examination schedule for eighth graders was announced this week by Carl H. Garvin, principal of the High School. The examinations will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 7.

Students who have failed major subjects and have been tutored this summer will be granted the examinations. In addition, evidence of tutoring "in writing" must be presented at the time of examination. Following is the schedule of September 7:

Mathematics, one hour, starting at 8:30 a. m.; Social Science, 22 minutes, starting at 11 a. m.; and English, one hour and 20 minutes, starting at 1:30 p. m.

Youth Gets Suspended Sentence & Probation

Joseph M. Hydock, Jr., 16 Henry Street, was presented in Town Court on Monday charged with breach of the peace, wound up with a 10 day jail sentence, suspended, and was placed on probation until December 31, 1954. Prosecuting Attorney Robert M. Taylor, Jr., told the court that "this was not the usual breach of the peace charge," and recommended a substantial fine. The records disclosed that young Hydock had been involved in a melee on the porch of the Momauglin Colonnade recently among a crowd of boys and girls.

The court heard testimony that when Officer John Giordano attempted to "break it up," most of the youths left, but Hydock started using abusive language to the officer, finally threatening to "have my old man split your head open." Officer Joseph Pascarella assisted in making the arrest, which took place at 10:15 p. m.

Since this was the boy's first appearance before the court on this charge, Judge Fasano cautioned him sternly about any repetition of the offense, which would result in his having to serve the 30 days' sentence, plus any added penalty imposed by the court.

Clancy Asked To Intervene On Family's Behalf

At Monday's session of Town Court, Henry J. Istas, New Haven attorney, made an urgent plea for added time to secure housing facilities for the family of Joseph St. Hillaire, 39 First Ave.

Records disclosed that Health Officer Rocco Bove had asked Prosecuting Attorney Robert Taylor, Jr. to swear out a warrant for St. Hillaire's arrest after reported warnings concerning unsanitary conditions had gone unheeded.

Specifically, the charge were: 1. Failure to obey health officer's notice to abate or remove nuisance or filth; 2. Failure to comply with health officer's order to vacate premises; and 3. Allowing filthy water and noxious matter to collect on surface of land occupied by him.

Prosecuting Atty. Taylor admitted that much of the blame could be placed on the actual owner of the property who refuses to take steps to alleviate the conditions described.

Attorney Istas told the court he had appealed to First Selectman Frank S. Clancy for help in securing living quarters for the St. Hillaire's. He revealed that the family had had an application on file with the New Haven housing authority for some time. However, his investigation revealed that showing a new house in the area of the low-rent projects, preference would be given to a New Haven resident despite the length of time the St. Hillaire's had been waiting.

Upon learning this, Istas went on, he checked into the possibility of securing tenancy in one of the so-called "veteran" projects. While New Haven is in the process of eliminating this emergency Quonset hut housing, which was recently turned over to the City for management by the housing authority, there is a possibility that permission could be secured from Mayor Richard Lee to allow the St. Hillaire's to move into one of these buildings.

Due to the urgency of the case, Attorney Istas had contacted Clancy, but no response had been forthcoming over the weekend. Judge Vincent J. Fasano, granted a continuance until August 30th to allow all avenues to be explored.

Judge Fasano disclosed that should the case come to trial, he would have to disqualify himself due to previous familiarity with the case.

Says Field House Plumbing Fixed Within 3 Days

Claims that a section of Memorial Field house were closed for about a month were disproved this week by Frank Clancy.

The first selectman, who could not be reached for comment last week, said that claims that toilets in the field house had been left out of repair for about a month were untrue. He said that the toilets in the boys' section had been out of order about three days, but that they had been restored to working order last week. A check at the park confirmed Clancy's statement.

He said that repairs of a faulty fountain on the field were delayed by the fact that an extensive repair job is in order. The drain of the fountain has been clogged and had been shut off to keep from flooding one play area in a corner of the field.

The first selectman said that a new well likely would have to be dug for the fountain before it could be restored to operation. He blamed the antics of mischievous children for the plumbing problems, and revealed that for a time the locks on the doors of the field house had been plugged up with match sticks, adding to the troubles of the repair men.
