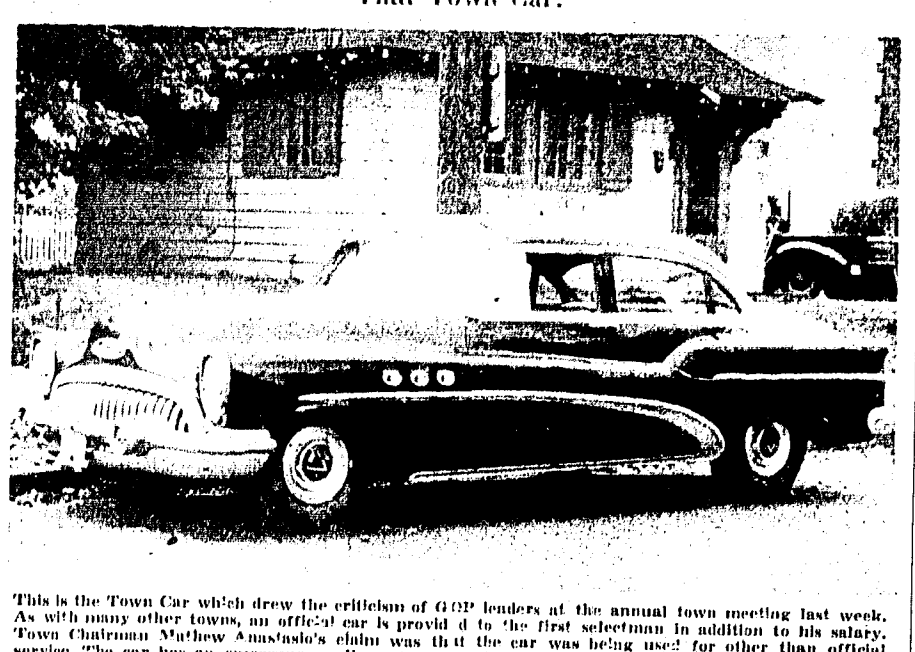

Luzzi Scores Four Times, Gives Easties 24 - 13 Win Over Shelton

Win Puts Easties Top Of Housatonic League Heap

Despite a sore heel, Henry Luzzi, 150-pound half-back and co-captain of the East Haven High football team carried the ball over for four tallies Friday evening to pile up a 24 to 13 surprise victory over the hitherto unbeaten Shelton Gaels.

The game was played beneath the lights on Lafayette field in Shelton. Besides putting the Yellow-Jackets into first place in the Housatonic League the win served as a kind of proof that they had the stuff for another very successful season.

Slow Start The Easties started slowly against the Gaels, who started off the game with a 65-yard drive which capped with a 10-yard pass from Paul DiCaro to Gilbert LeBranche. A good placement by DiCaro put Shelton ahead 7-0 in the first quarter.

However, East Haven didn't take this one sitting down. In fact it was the standing Statue of Liberty play, a great favorite of Coach Frank Crisaffi's, which enabled Luzzi to run 18 yards to his first touchdown of the game. The conversion try was no good.

The Shelton team, which displayed a powerhouse assault the Easties couldn't stop, returned with another 65-yard march which ended with a score by Dom Margano, another Shelton one-man team.

Thus it was that the East Haven team went into the second half trailing by 13-6. But not for long. Third Quarter The third quarter was Luzzi's opportunity. Paired up with Ralph "Yoni" Stretto as a hot passer, Luzzi staged a red-hot series of running and passing plays which took the ball 50 yards, to within 25 yards of paydirt. A pass by Stretto to Luzzi did the trick, but East Haven still trailed 13-12, since the conversion try was no good.

Not too much later, Luzzi set Shelton back on its heels when he pushed and dodged his way through the center of the line and swerved around the right end behind some beautiful blocking to race across for another score.

With East Haven leading 18-13, the Gaels were demoralized. Unable to counter with any effectiveness, they were helpless against a renewed Blue and Gold assault which went 52 yards under a set of plays staged by Stretto and Luzzi who capped it with a scoring drive from the two-yard line.

Stretto tried the extra-point kicking as a change, but was unsuccessful on all four tries.

Clifford Fritzell Receives Plaque From Lions Club

An East Haven boy who risked his own life to rescue two fishermen from Long Island Sound after their rowboat foundered in rough waters was the guest of honor at a meeting of the East Haven Lions Club Thursday in Florio's Country House Restaurant in Foxon Park.

The honored guest was 15-year-old Clifford D. Fritzell, of 3 Morgan Terrace. He was presented with a plaque by the Lions Club as a commendation for his rescue.

The club also observed press night and reporters from East Haven were present as special guests.

Also invited to be on hand were the two North Haven fishermen rescued by young Fritzell: Robert Harrington, 32, of 88 Morgan Ter, and Warren Anderson, 31, of 342 Quinlan Ave.

The two men were returning from a fishing trip when their boat was swamped in heavy waves a half mile off Morgan Point near Gull Rock. A shore fisherman spotted the two men clinging to their boat and notified the Fritzell family.

In order that his boat could ride the heavy waves better, young Fritzell set out in an outboard powered rowboat to tow the two fishermen to shore, at considerable risk to his own safety.

Only Three Dwelling Permits Issued By Town In September

Only three building permits for dwellings were issued during the month of September for one of the lowest totals in several years, figures released by the Building Department show. Of 31 building permits issued all but three were for construction other than complete dwellings.

In comparison, during the same month in 1953 a total of 74 permits for dwellings were issued by the Building Department.

Other permits issued included 16 plumbing permits at \$5 each and 26 septic tank permits at \$2 each.

The total revenue received from permits and licenses during the month amounted to a total of \$951. This compares with a total of \$2,641 for the same month in 1953.

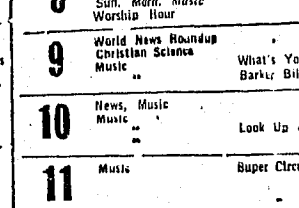
