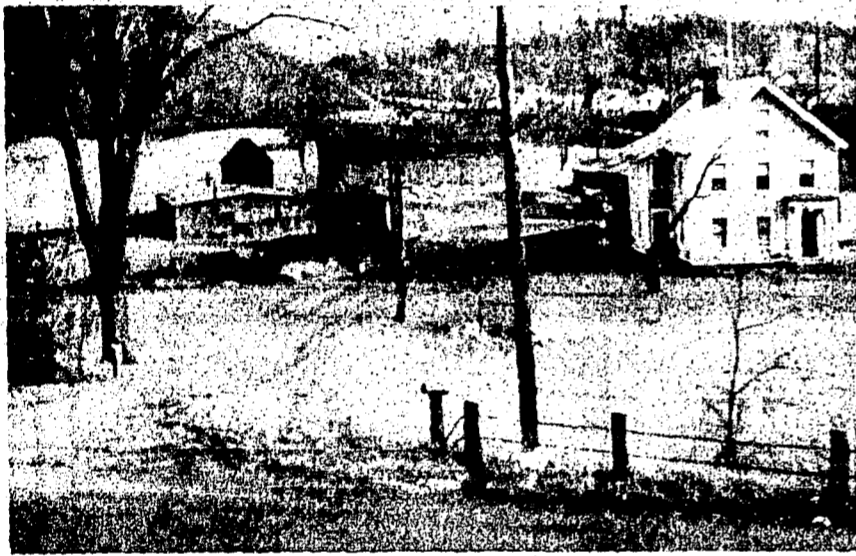
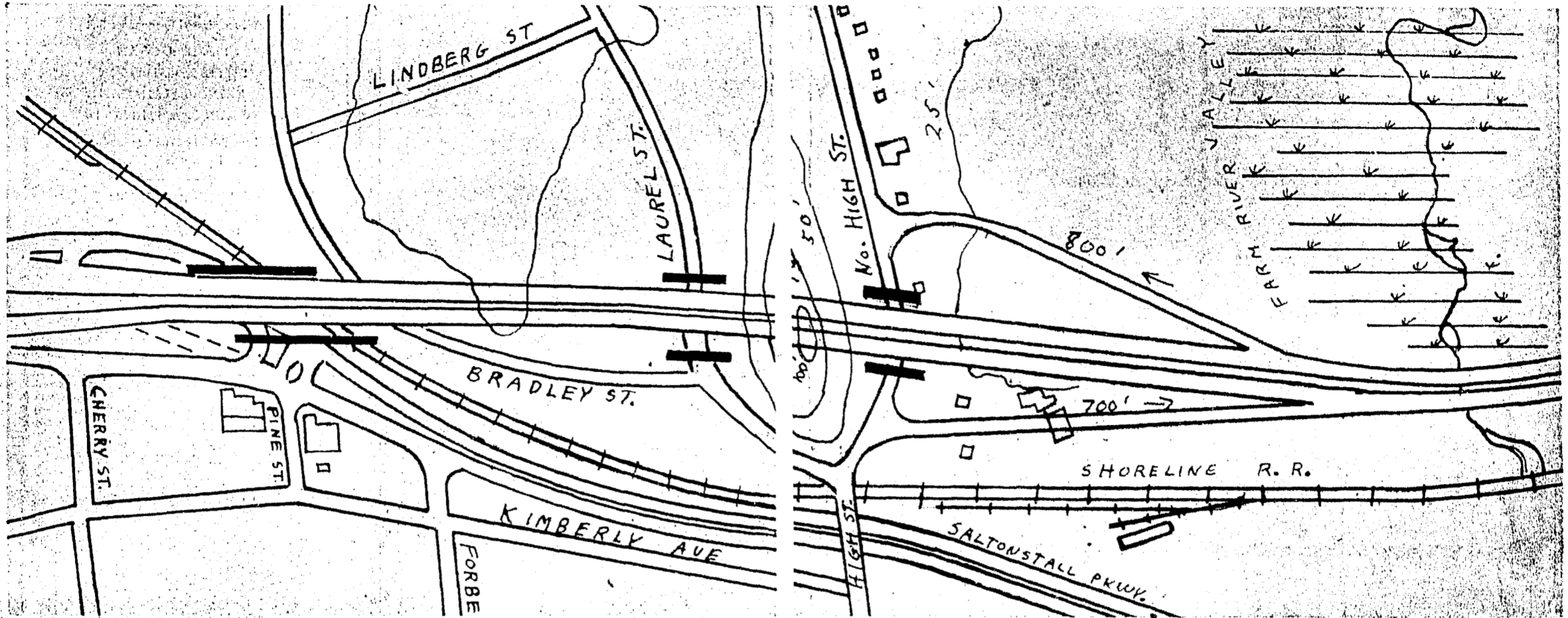

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Map Shows Route Expressway Will Take

The above is a free hand tracing of a portion of a State Highway Department preliminary map dated August 16, 1934 and showing the approximate route which the new cross-state Expressway will take through western Branford and East Haven. The portion shown starts in the vicinity of the Farm River on the east and ends in the vicinity of Pine St. on the west.

On the eastern (right) end the four lane highway will run parallel to, and north of the New Haven railroad tracks through the cut north of the water tower. The double highway will continue across the Farm River and westward over North High St. through the large outcrop between No. High and Laurel Streets.

The highway will be bridged over High and Laurel Streets but not over Bradley St. which will be reconnected with Laurel through Lindberg St.

The highway will go over the railroad tracks and over one connector road leading from the present Route One and connecting with it at Forbe Pl.

The new highway will connect just northwest of Cherry St. directly into that portion of Route One which has been rebuilt. The connectors for the old route, Saltonstall Pkwy. will run parallel on either side of the new highway connecting the new

and old routes at a point just east of the New Haven-East Haven line.

As shown in the map above there will be two connectors for the new highway: an 800-foot long exit and a 700-foot long entry leading to and from High St. on either side of the bridge-way over High St.

Both the new High St. and Laurel St. bridges will have sidewalks constructed on the east side of the underpass portion for pedestrian use, according to the map.

The connectors leading from the Saltonstall Pkwy. will have a rotary at what is now the Pine St. intersection to permit quick access or egress.

Contour lines for the outcrop between North High and Laurel St. are drawn at 25-foot intervals starting with an elevation of 25 feet on the west side of the Farm River valley.

Zoning Bd. Holding Up Develop'ts

Priority Given To Approval Of Plan And Zoning Codes

Proposed re-subdivisions of several parcels of land which would not meet the new zoning requirements are being held up for consideration by the Planning and Zoning Commission pending a final "hearing" on the new town plan and zoning regulations.

The commission appeared to be in general agreement on this at its regular monthly meeting last night in the assessor's office in the Town Hall.

Jerome Grady, newly-elected chairman of the commission, suggested that February 1 would be the deadline by which the new plan and regulations were to be adopted.

Stricter Regulations

Edward L. Reynolds, Republican member of the board, joined expressions by two Democratic colleagues in favor of drawing a hard and fast line on lot requirements under the new regulations. All three said, in effect: "It's time to start thinking about the general interests of the town as against the special interests of the relatively few property owners."

A "hearing" on these regulations affecting the commercial areas in the center of town and elsewhere is scheduled for Monday, Jan. 17, with representatives of the local Chamber of Commerce.

Plans for the reduction in the new stringent requirements on lot sizes were advanced for four different proposed subdivisions.

Ask For Lots

The largest bid for a proposed subdivision off Rock Rd. and lying partly in the towns of North Branford and Branford. Of a total of 73 building lots, about 60 would be in this town. The lots approximate dimensions of 80 feet frontage, by 100 feet deep and would meet the so-called R-2 requirements under the new plan. Under the new plan it would be zoned for R-3 requiring a minimum of 100 by 200 foot lots.

William Beazley, real-estate agent representing the owner Anthony Seaman, of North Haven, said that under the new zoning plan the property is surrounded by property zoned for R-2. Hence it constituted "spot zoning."

He said that James J. Canna, local builder, had agreed to buy the land under certain conditions. Beazley remarked that Mr. Seaman was about to retire and that the lot requirements would affect the amount which he would receive for the property.

Studying Improved Road Specifications

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The new regulations will provide for eight-inch deep paving consisting of four inches of broken stone for sub-grade and four inches of crushed stone and filler with a bituminous binder and seal coat on top.

The regulations will require an 18-inch high concrete curb extending six inches above the crowned road surface and a five-foot concrete sidewalk five inches thick.

Regulations and specifications would be patterned after those used in North Haven. Their use, it was said, would result in lower maintenance costs for the town since the new road surfaces would not need attention so soon as the type of roads being built under existing specifications.

At present roads consist of several inches of bank washed gravel bound with heavy road oil.

The plans were introduced by Jerome Grady, new chairman of the commission, and were prepared by Roy Lurie and by Edward L. Reynolds, another member of the commission.

Gathering Data

D. Charles Beausoleil, director of the Redevelopment Agency, is gathering additional data, Mr. Clancy said, to present before the meeting.

Mr. Beausoleil has been an avid proponent of securing a system of sewerage for East Haven, particularly in that section of Momaugun which would be affected by the proposed redevelopment of the shore area.

The report by Bows-Albertson presented cost estimates for the center of New Haven and for the Momaugun section. The first would amount to \$2,425,000 while that for the shore section would cost \$618,000 more. This would be exclusive of the cost of installing connecting pipes between the

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Purpose of the conference will be to permit such groups and individuals as the Board of Selectmen, the Board of Finance, the Planning and Zoning Commission, the Town engineer and the Town health officer to discuss the report and to review it.

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Survey Of Route For New Expressway Nearly Done

Survey of land and design of highways and approaches for 5.9 miles of roadway in East Haven and the western portion of Branford for the projected cross-state expressway is moving toward completion, officials of the State Highway Department said this week.

The survey work and design for what is known as "Section 19" of the new highway is being done by the New York engineering firm of Sedye, Stevenson, Value and Knecht. According to a progress report, most of the work has been done, and a new map will be issued to show the exact route of the roadway.

Specifications are being readied for segments of the cross-state highway by 24 consulting firms who are expected to have them completed by the end of April. At that time the entire section lying between the Connecticut River and the New York State line will be put out for bids.

If these bids conform, with original cost estimates calculated by the engineering firms, the remainder of the highway sections will be put out for bid.

December, 1937

December, of 1937 has been set as the tentative and over-all completion date, with usable portions of the road expected to be completed before that time.

A preliminary map of plans for the highway show the general route to be taken. Prepared with the aid of aerial photographs of the area, it will be replaced by a power map which will define the exact route and which will be based on the survey and designs now being prepared.

Notices have already been sent to 16 property owners on High, Laurel and Bradley Streets which will be crossed by the new highway. The road will go over High and Laurel Streets while Bradley St. will be closed off.

The homes of five property owners will have to be removed. These

are Andrew Coppola and Velma Quick of Bradley St., and Harriet Hauptman, Frank Stoddard and William Pommer, of High St.

The fate of D'Andrea's Diner located off the present Route One through-way and smack in the middle of the projected route is indeterminate at this stage.

A manager at the diner said that, to his knowledge, nothing new had been stated by the Highway Department regarding the diner's future. The diner is located on what is now state-owned land, and the state is required to give the owners 30 days notice to move the building.

Those persons who are now being warned are owners whose property obviously falls within the path of the new roadway. Upon the completion of the survey other owners may be notified.

Others who have been notified include: Pasquon Dionis, James Donato, Joseph Paulumbo, Salimone, Cilliotti, Gio Volardi, Wallace Renty Company, Maria Mena, James Barlomeo, Michael Andreucci, Joseph DeLuca, the New Haven Railroad and the New Haven Water Co.

New Outlet For Phillips St. Is Sought By Town

Negotiations for a strip of land to provide a new outlet for Phillips St. to replace that portion which will be closed off as part of the Momaugun School yard were revealed this week by First Selectman Frank Clancy and by the Elementary School Building Committee.

Clancy said that the piece would permit Phillips St. to be connected with Holston St. It would permit access should the approach from Casey Beach Ave. be blocked off by floods.

The first selectman said that Roy Lurie, a member of the building committee, was in charge of the negotiations. When completed, the town will build a roadway over the short stretch.

Once this is done, he said, the Phillips St. portion will be closed off with a heavy wire fence. In the interim, means will be explored for signing traffic using this children for the protection of school children.

Clancy said he could not understate previous announcements regarding the matter since the building committee and his office were in close touch with each other. The Board of Public Safety had no jurisdiction on this matter or the building of sidewalks on Casey Beach Rd. as also proposed by the building committee.

Chamber Commerce Postpones Meeting Date Until Jan. 18

The East Haven Chamber of Commerce will meet on Tuesday the 18th instead of next week in order to provide proper notice for a change in bylaws. It was announced this week.

Next Tuesday a group of members of the chamber will visit with the Milford Chamber of Commerce and will hear a speaker on promotion.

Education Study Head To Address High School P.T.A.

John Braslin, chairman of the Education Review committee for greater New Haven, will speak on "Trends in Education" before a meeting of the High School P.T.A. on Wednesday evening, Jan. 19. The meeting will open at 8 o'clock in the High School cafeteria.

Braslin who was appointed by Mayor Richard Lee of New Haven to study the educational picture in greater New Haven area, is a Yale graduate. He is affiliated with the Educational Film Company.

Mrs. Anthony Panagrossi will preside at the business portion of the meeting which will precede the speaker. Refreshments will be served.

Fog Nozzles Needed But Economy Pinches Fire Dept. Budget

The Fire Department is beginning to feel the pinch of economy by last October's budget reductions. Fire Chief Thomas J. Hayes was told that an order for three fog nozzles for fire hoses must secure Finance Board approval.

Chief Hayes requested permission from the Board of Public Safety to buy the nozzles at a total cost of \$200. A fog nozzle at Volunteer Fire Company three had been damaged and was no longer useful. In addition, two nozzles had been included in the original budget but were knocked out by the economy cut-back.

The board directed Hayes to take the fog nozzle off the "grass wagon" equipment and temporarily turn it over to the Foxon volunteer company until "and if" the Board of Finance approves purchase of the fog nozzles.

Zoning Board's Surface Harmony Is Disturbed By Undercurrents As Miller Hits Back At Criticism

Assumption by Jerome Grady of the chairmanship of the Planning and Zoning Commission on Wednesday evening in the midst of a hour-and-a-half long executive session was marked by surface harmony among the five members of the board.

Expressions in favor of giving priority to the adoption of the Town plan and zoning regulations to be followed by hearings on, and enactment of, stricter requirements for subdivisions were voiced by commissioners on both sides of the partisan fence.

To this end, too, approval of subdivision plans submitted by various contractors is to be held up pending further action on the town plan.

But underneath the agreement which was expressed was an undertone of disharmony.

For one, Charles Miller, who resigned as chairman in the closed session, released a statement of rebuttal to an announcement last week by Mr. Grady. In a letter to the NEWS, Mr. Miller remarked that he was surprised over claims of disagreement on the commission's policy. The letter was given the NEWS early Wednesday morning.

He defended his own actions as chairman stating that the commission had been following the proper procedure in first advancing the comprehensive plan for approval, and then the zoning code revisions.

He also reiterated his claim that it was the Board of Selectmen and not the zoning commission which should regulate the final acceptance of new roads and to require curbs and sidewalks.

Mr. Miller disputed Mr. Grady's claim that he (Miller) was ready to submit subdivision plans for a

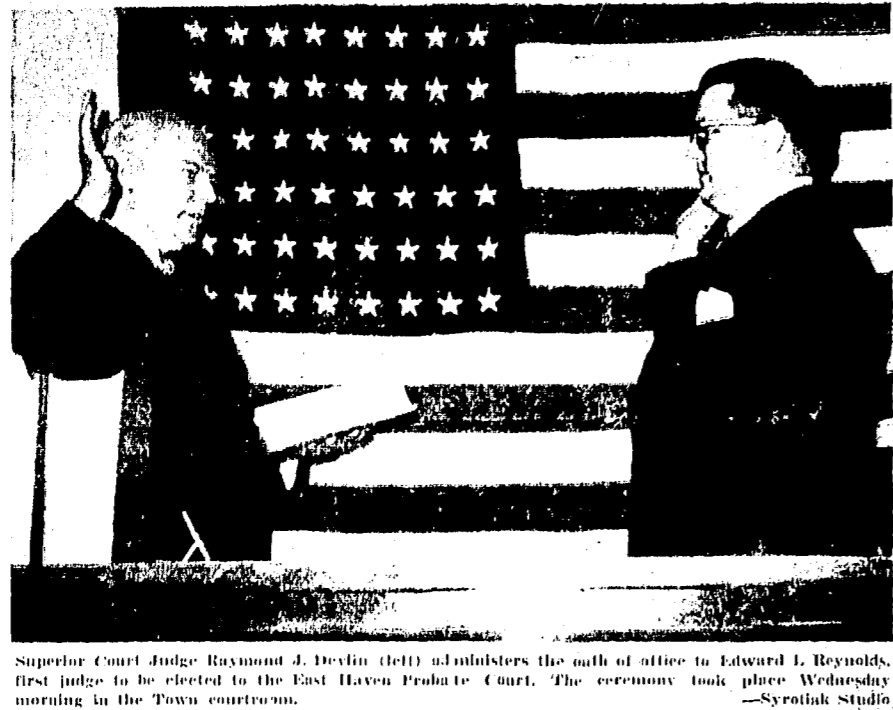

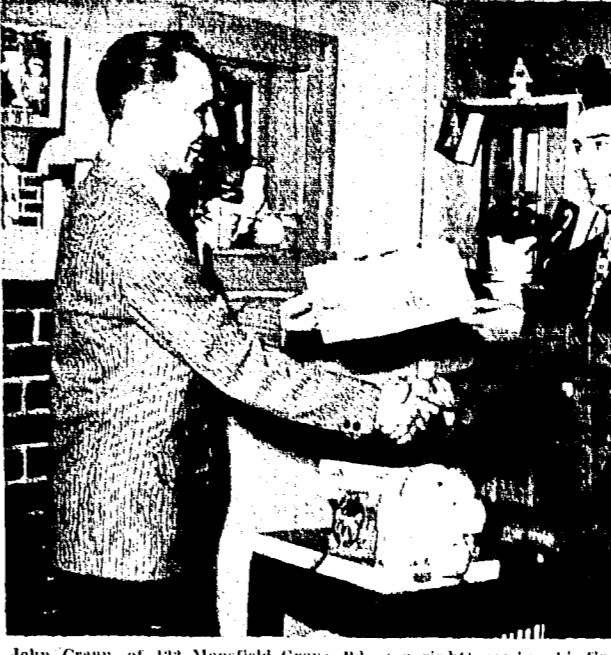
