

Map Shows Route Expressway Will Take

Highway Department preliminary map dated August 16, 1954 and showing the approximate route which the new cross-state Expressway will take through western Branford and East Haven. The portion shown starts in the vicinity of the Farm River on the east and ends in the vicinity of Pine St. on the west.

On the eastern (right) end the four lane highway will run parallel to, and north of the New Haven milrond tracks through the cut north of the water tower. The double highway will con-tinue across the Farm River and westward over North High St. through the large outcrop between Not High and Laurel Streets.

Bridged Over Two Streets
The highway will be bridged over High and Laurel Streets but not over Bradley St. which will be reconnected with Laurel through Lindberg St.

The highway will go over the milrond tracks and over one

connector road leading from the present Route One and connecting with it at Forbes Pl.

The new highway will connect just northwest of Cherry St.

directly into that portion of Route One which has been rebuilt. The connectors for the old route, Saltonstall Pkwy, will run parallel on either side of the new highway connecting the new

As shown in the map above there will be two connectors for the new highway: an 800-foot long exit and a 700-foot long entry leading to end from High St. on either side of the bridge-

Both the new High St. and Laurel St. bridges, will have sidewalks constructed on the east side of the underpass portion for pedestrian use, according to the map.
