## Contractors Will Pay Cost Of Supervision On Road Building

### Sub-Division Codes To Get Overhauling

Who is going to pay the cost of the Town's supervising the construction of roads, sidewalks and curbing and other improvements in new developments? That question was asked by First Selectman Frank S. Clancy.

An answer was provided immediately by Jerome Grady, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission. Contractors will be billed for the cost of such supervision, he said, under a provision that will be written into the sub-division codes.

To Overhaul Codes

Mr. Grady indicated also that a complete over-hauling of the zoning codes is in order and will be undertaken soon.

The question on who will pay the cost of supervising construction of roads, etc. came up after new regulations approved Monday night by the Zoning Commission passed over the desk of the first selectman.

The Commission voted that in future developments builders must lay down a road consisting of a base of either eight inches of bank run gravel or four inches of crushed stone. On top of this is to be laid four inches of crushed stone and penetrating macadam paving.

Also to be installed is concrete curbing 18 inches high, and extending six inches above the crowned road surface, and sidewalks four- and one-half feet wide and five inches thick.

"After each specification come these words, 'Installation shall be under supervision of the Town Engineer and final approval shall be required by the Board of Selectmen.'"

"Good idea"

"These specifications are a good idea," said Mr. Clancy, "but the commission has slipped up on one thing: who's going to pay the Town for all this supervision?" He said he would ask a meeting with the Zoning Commission on this.

Mr. Clancy's question was also prompted by a reporter's inquiry as to whether he had any comment on criticism aimed by contractors at the Town government.

This criticism came at the Monday night hearing of the Zoning Commission. Several contractors agreed that the type of road being built in East Haven wasn't very good, but said that if roads were satisfactory it was the Town's fault for not supervising and inspecting these before accepting them.

"All right," said the first selectman, "but who's going to pay (Continued On Page Two)"

In the meantime, Mrs. Ralph Hurder, co-director of the drive, announced this week that three parents of North Branford children attending the High School are raising funds for the purchase of one uniform. They are Mrs. Fred E. Harrison, Mrs. Eugene N. Benson and Mrs. Leslie Bean.

Mrs. Bean is also sponsoring a card party in her home for North Branford residents on Monday to raise additional money for uniforms.

Goal of the drive is enough money to buy 50 uniforms at a cost of \$55 each. To date, enough funds have been pledged to provide 17 of these.

## New Development Rejected For Lack Of Second Exit

The Planning and Zoning Commission last night rejected by a three-to-one vote a plot plan for 59 building lots between High Ridge and Maplevale because it did not provide a second entrance close to High St.

The plot plan was submitted by the Yedlin Construction Company, builder of High Ridge.

The plan was returned with the recommendation that the builders find an additional means of egress into either High St. or Hellstrom Rd. to guarantee the safety of the occupants of the new development.

### Suits to Insistence

The Commission majority stuck to its insistence on a second means of egress through almost two hours of argument by officials of the Yedlin Company that finding means of such passage was "impossible" or so expensive as to make the building project unprofitable.

Moody, engineer for the builders, argued that access into the rear of the development through the old Proprietor's Rd., would provide suitable access to the proposed development. Also, he said, it would serve to provide a second means of access into Maplevale into which entry could now be gained only at the northern end.

The developers, he said, were actually reducing a hazard by opening up this second means of egress into Maplevale in the event of a catastrophe.

However, when James Malone, Democratic member of the Commission, argued along with Chairman Jerome Grady and Edward L. Reynolds, Republican member,

that a second means of access to the proposed development was necessary because of such possibility.

Rosenberg told the Commission: "You gentlemen are obliged to honor the commitments which I thought I had from the Town."

### Cost "Prohibitive"

He insisted that cost of a bridge over the Farm River to gain access to North High St. would be prohibitive. And buying back a home and lot in High Ridge to gain access to Hellstrom Rd. was also impossible, he said.

Robert Decker, town engineer, who sat in on the meeting at the Commission's request, said he was opposed to the erection of another bridge which would impede the flow of the water and flood residential land. Also he said it would mean additional maintenance.

Mr. Decker preferred a connecting road between Hellstrom Rd. and the central road in the new development, but did not agree with the Commission that a second entrance was necessary in view of the access from the rear. (The development would connect at one point with a road in Maplevale.)

However, Chairman Grady stuck to his guns: "We're going to look over the over-all situation. In all good conscience, I cannot see this (development) unless we have full access."

Mr. Rosenberg offered to clear the remainder of Proprietor's Rd. which, he said, would permit access to Maplevale but this was (Continued On Page Two)

## Finance Bd. To Meet With Auditors Tonight Barker Hits Redfield

### Police Union To Meet With Public Safety Board On Sat.

Officers of the newly-organized Police Union will meet with the Board of Public Safety Saturday morning at 11 o'clock. First Selectman Frank Clancy said that the board and representatives of the union will discuss the later's aims.

At a meeting Tuesday evening, Frank Backus, acting president of the union, was elected president of the group. Albert Fige was elected vice president; Walter Malanus, secretary; and William Hubbard, treasurer.

Ten of eleven regulars in the Police Department voted for the formation of a union. Spokesmen for the group announced that the officers in the department had no quarrel with the Board of Public Safety. At the same time, it was indicated that a more effective means of liaison between representatives of the police force and the public safety board may be needed.

### May Meet On Appeals Board

Mathew Anastasio, Republican town chairman, has indicated the possibility of a meeting in the near future between Democratic and Republican leaders to discuss the setting up of an appeals board for the appeals of fine and police personnel who have been subjected to disciplinary action by the Board of Public Safety.

Mr. Anastasio had noted several weeks ago that members of either department now must resort to the courts for redress against action affecting their employment, and that such recourse is an expensive matter since it involves legal costs.

Proposals for the enactment of a merit system have been laid aside for the time being, after neither party showed enthusiasm for such a system.

However, legislative action is not needed for enactment of either a merit system or a personnel appeals board. Under Section 301c (1953 Supplement) a merit system may be adopted under the method of the referendum at either a special or the next regular election.

Under Section 303 c, "Any town, city or borough may by ordinance of its legislative body create a personnel appeals board which shall consist of five members who shall be electors of such municipality holding no salaried municipal office and whose term of office and method of election or appointment shall be fixed in the (Continued On Page Two)"

### East Haven Man Celebrates 35th Year With SNETC

James N. MacKinnel, of 125 Main St., chief toll supervisor for the Southern New England Telephone Company, recently celebrated his 35th year of service with the company.

Mr. MacKinnel began his telephone career in 1919 as a clerk in the accounting department. The following year he was advanced to ledger supervisor and in 1923 became toll supervisor.

Mr. MacKinnel transferred to the commercial department in 1924. He remained there until 1936 and during that time had extensive experience in various positions in that department.

He returned to the accounting department in 1936 as billing supervisor and was made supervisor of customer billing the following year. In 1941 he was advanced to chief accounts supervisor and in 1950 was appointed to his present position of chief toll supervisor.

### Barker Criticizes Redfield On Budget Defense

A meeting between the Board of Finance and members of the town auditing firm of Weinstein & Funn was scheduled for this evening (Thursday) in the Town Hall with an invitation to reporters to be on hand for a review of the Town's fiscal picture at the end of September 30, 1954.

In a "let the chips fall where they may" gesture, the invitation was issued by Leslie Redfield, Republican member of the Board of Finance, as an answer to criticism being leveled by Republican Selectman Frank Barker.

Barker Attacks Redfield

In the meantime, Mr. Barker issued a statement criticizing Mr. Redfield's defense of the Clancy administration which had incurred a deficit last year. He also labeled as near ridiculous a claim that because his administration had never-estimated the grand list \$13,000 less taxes were collected than was anticipated.

Mr. Redfield stuck by his action in defending the budget. "I am not defending the Administration," he said, "but I felt that Mr. Barker's (previous) remarks were aimed at the Board of Finance and I felt free to answer in defense of the board for which I am a member."

"I know there is a deficit," he said, "but I do not think it is as high as Mr. Barker says regarding the figures that he plays with. Furthermore, I do not have my information from newspaper reports, but directly from the auditors' report."

### Gives Collections

In support of his claim of an inflated grand list, Mr. Redfield again cited a figure showing 94.1 per cent collections by Tax Collector Salvatore Longobardi compared with 94 per cent collected by his predecessor under Mr. Barker's administration.

Rather than bat the figures around at long range and through the medium of the newspapers, Mr. Redfield said he preferred to have the auditors, themselves, report on the picture of Town finances at the end of last fiscal year.

First Selectman Frank Clancy declined to comment on Mr. Barker's attacks until the Board of Finance had prepared his own answer, he said.

Mr. Barker's Statement

Following is Mr. Barker's latest statement:

"As much as the statement of my recent newspaper articles, concerning the Town's finances, were not directed at Mr. Redfield, I was somewhat surprised to read his remarks as published in (a daily newspaper) of Friday, February 3, 1955.

Contrary to common belief, Mr. Redfield is not Chairman of the Board of Finance. Mr. Clancy, by virtue of his office, holds that position. However, Mr. Redfield, as usual, seems to be acting as spokesman for the board, and also seems to have taken on the job of defending the administration.

Mr. Redfield should be well qualified, but it appears that he is slightly mixed up.

Redfield disputed the figures of my article as being "incorrect." The deficit figure I referred to was as published in the New Haven Register, on Monday, January 31, 1955, and not once I simply dreamed up.

Mr. Redfield next declared that back taxes were available to cover the deficit. Though back taxes total \$107,466.95, Mr. Redfield, himself, stated at the Town budget meeting of October 27, 1954, which had a record attendance, that "uncollected taxes could not be considered as actual surpluses, since the Town cannot spend uncollected taxes." Why the about face, Mr. Redfield?

Mr. Redfield claimed that my administration had over-estimated the grand list, so that \$13,000 less taxes were collected than anticipated. This statement not only is not supported by the auditors' report, but borders on the ridiculous. For this to be possible, my administration would have (Continued On Page Two)

### Gartland Defends Action On Bill

James Gartland, Democratic town chairman, defended the joint committee action against what he called "pressuring" by the CCG group.

He said that if legislation is introduced it must be done through a member of one party or the other. Objectors who disagree with legislation may voice their opinions, he said, at a hearing in Hartford. "A hearing will be announced and anybody in Town has the prerogative to go to the hearing and tell how he feels."

Two members of the Citizens for Good Government were present in the persons of Mr. Anastasio and Mr. DeMayo, said Mr. Gartland.

He added that he "objected to pressuring of the two town parties" and said he thought the CCG was going to be a non-partisan group.

To objections that Hartford hearings were too remote, Mr. Gartland said that "if he (Mr. Hall) is that much interested in this bill, he should find time to put in an appearance." "The rest of us can find the time to go in and fight for the things we want. I don't see how he or his group is any different," he concluded.
