Appeal Issued For Staffers To Assist At Girl Scout Day Camp

An appeal was issued this week for volunteer staffers to help pre-pare and operate a Summer Day Camp for Girl Scouts. The day would be operated on property lent by Mr. and Mrs. Allan II. Bonwill near their home at II. Bonwill near their home at 48 Grannis St. opposite Lake IIu-

making the appeal, Mrs. Bonwill said that the operation of the day camp would be dependent on assistance from volunteer staff In addition assistance would be needed in preparing the day camp for the season and in arranging a system of transportation, by bus or otherwise.

A "day camp", Mrs. Bonwill ex-lained, usually would be operated four days per week for a two-week period. The cost would be about \$8 per week and the camp day would be from 10 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. Day camping is the Girl Scout program "moved out of doors," she said.

The Bonwill property is located near the corner of Granniss and No. Tigh Streets. Permission has been obtained from the YMCA to swim in adjoining Lake Hubinger at specified times during the camp
