Barker Demands Additional Information On Sewer Costs; Effect On School Program

Backers Of Junior High School Say Education Going Down The Sewer

Beausoliel Claims Will Not Cost The Taxpayers Anything

After weeks of seeming apathy on the part of the townspeople regarding the issues involving the costs of putting in a sewer system and financing a junior high school, the first eruption regarding these projects happened yesterday.

First, backers of the junior high school program wanted to know if the proposed sewer was the death knell for additional school buildings in the town.

Then D. Charles Beausoliel, who is pushing the sewer plan, defended the costs of the sewers, stating the taxpayer would not pay anything, after new industry located here.

This morning, Third Selectman Frank A. Barker, made a demand on the backers of the sewer project to explain more fully the costs of the proposed project to the town and what effect, if any this would have on the school building program.

Barker's Statement
In a statement, issued to the NEWS this morning, Barker said: "I am very much concerned about the fact there is to be a town meeting within the near future for the purpose of financing the construction and financing of sewers in East Haven and that there seems to be a general lack of information as to just what effect this program will have upon the finances of the town."

"I am aware," Barker continued, "neighborhood meetings have been held and the accounts of these meetings have been published. Judging however, from many inquiries I have received about the effect of this program upon school building, I feel that the general public is approaching this meeting without sufficient clear information."

"In requesting that more complete information be published, I am not attempting to take a stand on either side of the issue. The Town of East Haven badly needs both sewers and schools. If we can have both, that is fine, but if the town can have only one, that fact should be made very clear so that the voters can decide which of the two they want."

"I am, therefore, presenting five questions, with the request that those who are in charge of the sewer program answer them well in advance of the town meeting date. I also ask that the answers to these questions be positive and legally accurate."

Barker asks: 1. Will money borrowed for sewers reduce in any way the money that can now be borrowed for school building?
2. What will be the immediate and yearly cost to the home owners? (a) those who will be served by sewers and (b) those who will not be on the sewer line?
3. It has been inferred sewers can be built with but little additional cost to taxpayers. If \$1,000,000 is borrowed now, and more millions borrowed later, just how is this money to be repaid? By whom? And at what rate?

4. If low costs to present taxpayers is dependent upon voting of millions of dollars of industrial buildings is there sound reason to know that the sewers can attract that volume of industry to our town?
5. If incoming industry is essential to keep costs to present taxpayers from being high, is there enough available land near the sewer line to provide sites for the industry needed?

"The answers to the above questions," says Barker, "are information that every voter must have before a decision how to vote can be made. I again request that answers to these questions be published at an (Continued on Page Four)

From Defeat To Freedom Riding With The Four Horsemen Of Apocalypse

(Ten years ago, Aug. 14, 1945, the Japanese Imperial Forces laid down their arms in surrender, after 44 months of fighting in the Pacific. This brought to end the global conflict started in September, 1939. This brought freedom to a little more than 1,200 survivors of the 28,000 American troops captured at the fall of Bataan and Corregidor. In commemoration of the 10th anniversary of that occasion, the NEWS begins the first of four installments, of the ordeals suffered by those survivors, as they were freed by the van of the infamous Four Horsemen of The Apocalypse, Famine, Plague, War and Pestilence.)

Chapter I
There was something different in the air that August 15, (August 14, East of the International dateline), in 1945.

The men who had hoped to see the dawn of peace, were now afraid to conjecture. No word had been said by our captors, that hostilities had ceased — yet there was a new feeling prevalent among our guards, that spoke of tension, and yet of relaxation.

You could tell they were tensed, as are all who face a future that can either be dreadful or joyous. They were relaxed as men who had gotten a reprieve from death.

After three years and five months of captivity the prisoners could sense the moods of their jailors. Although purportedly "inscrutable Orientals," actually the Japanese were childish in their display of emotion, and there flat faces quickly betrayed mental disturbance.

On the eve of that fateful day, our prison doctor, a U.S. Navy Lieutenant, had just given me some bad news. I had been hospitalized three days prior to this after I had collapsed while working in the copper smelter, due to a cardiac block caused by beri-beri. That evening of the 14th, Doc Green told me that he was giving me the last of the digitals that remained in the camp. As for vitamins, they too, were exhausted.

After the doctor had gone, I prayed and prayed hard for some miracle that would keep me alive. It's hard to die when you have survived through the greatest of ordeals and feel that the end of the war is near and within months you will be returned to your country.

However, as I lay there that night, staring at the lit electric bulb that hung suspended by a cord from the ceiling of the hospital ward, I never thought, and I am sure no one in camp thought, that the hours of peace was at hand.

The next morning that lit electric light was to be of great significance in strengthening my belief the war was over.

However, on that specific night, I thought of the hardships encompassed, not as a young man is said to review his past, but rather in frustration at the possibility of leaving this life after having endured so much to stay alive in it.

At that particular moment I was lying on a flea-ridden straw mat of the hospital ward, of prison, Camp IO-B, Kosaka, Japan, an hour's ride by train to the seaport of Sendai.

My mind reviewed the events and circumstances that had occurred since the night of April 8, 1942.

That day the lines had broken; reformed; broken again only to reform at a new point just a few miles north of our Peninsula capital, Little Baguio. All that day stragglers poured into our camp site, seeking first, aid and food; giving tales of overpowering odds being thrown against us.

My own outfit, which consisted of 236 men, was hardly able to fill the breach. Of the roster total, 77 were strong enough to answer "Here" when their names were called, five could carry their rifles. Sickness and starvation had whipped us!

As dysentery laid its hot grip over my aching intestines, malaria chilled and burned my blood by turns. Resigned to the fact that it was to be my last night on earth, I laid down and slept the sleep of a weary (Continued on Page Four)

Several gallon-club membership pins will again be distributed this month, Mrs. Sanford said, to those donors who have contributed eight pints of blood.

Name New Pastor For St. Vincent's

The Most Rev. Henry J. O'Brien, Archbishop of the Hartford Archdiocese, announced today, the appointment of the Rev. Leo W. Weston, pastor of St. Joseph's church, Canaan, as pastor of St. Vincent De Paul's church, East Haven.

Father Weston, pastor of St. Joseph's for the last 10 years, was born in New Britain, in 1901.

He studied at St. Thomas Seminary, Hartford, and St. Bernard's in Rochester, and was ordained in St. Joseph's cathedral, Hartford, by the late Bishop John J. Nilan, in 1927.

He has served as assistant at St. Michael's in Waterbury, St. Peter's in Danbury, and St. Augustine's in Bridgeport, prior to being appointed pastor of St. Joseph's.

Father Weston succeeds the late Rev. William F. O'Brien, who died May 31, at St. Raphael's hospital after he was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage at the Racebrook Country Club. Father O'Brien had been pastor of St. Vincent's since 1939.

East Haven Ranked Third Safest Town In Connecticut

East Haven was ranked third among state towns and cities of over 10,000, having the most consecutive fatality-free days, the Conn. Safety Commission announced this week.

"In spite of increase in traffic fatalities from 116 last year to 147 this year for first six months," the Commission reported, "the change in the number of fatality-free towns is altered only slightly."

"As of July 1, for both years, 12 towns of over 10,000 population were fatality-free," the Commission remarked. "Five of which were 'repeaters.' In the next group embracing towns from 5,000 to 10,000, 13 towns were not charged with traffic deaths, an improvement of three towns over last year."

However, despite the 31 death-increase over last year, the Commission pointed out there were only 19 more fatal accidents, "but every traffic error counted — and then some."

The C.S.C. commended Derby's fatality free record of 2316 consecutive days "as remarkable," and a fact which won Derby special recognition by the National Safety Council, as the sixth largest city in the country to achieve such an unbroken record.

Stonington was second with a record of 690 days, followed by East Haven with 571 consecutive fatality-free days. Danbury, Winchester and Watertown, were also runner-ups.

Aug. 1 Set For Vote On Sewers

The East Haven Board of Selectmen set August 1, as the date for a town meeting to vote on the proposed \$1,000,000 sewer construction requested by D. Charles Beausoliel, head of the Redevelopment Commission.

Beausoliel, who has led the fight for the installation of sewers, made the request that the town meeting be held so that a vote may be taken to set up a sewer commission and that a \$1,000,000 bond issue be divided between the five districts of the town.

The sum asked for to be voted on at the coming town meeting is not the full cost of sewer installation, nor does it cover the cost of residents connecting from their property to the sewer main.

Jehovah' Witnesses To Attend Assembly At Yankee Stadium July 20

The East Shore congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses will be represented by 52 delegates at the religious assembly to be held in Yankee Stadium, New York City, July 20 to 24th, James Haywood Jr., presiding minister here, announced this week.

Mr. Haywood, who will head the local delegation, said that a total of 50,000 members of the religion are expected to attend from the Mid-Atlantic and New England States.

In describing this assembly as one of 11 "world-sweeping series of Christian conventions," Mr. Haywood said, "In 1953, we had one international gathering of ministers at Yankee Stadium, that drew a peak attendance of 165,829 from 979 lands. This year we hope our combined attendance will double that."

Other cities, than New York, named as convention sites in the United States and Canada are: Chicago, Los Angeles, Dallas and Vancouver. In Europe: London, Paris, Rome, Nuremberg, Stockholm and The Hague.

Arrangements are already under way, Mr. Haywood said, to send over 4,500 delegates from the United States and Canada to the European assemblies. Delegates from Latin America, Africa, Australia and the Far East will attend the European conventions.

Harold LaPointe Dies Suddenly

Harold E. LaPointe, 50, of 39 Elm Street, East Haven, died at his home suddenly yesterday, of a heart attack.

Active in the Democratic Party, Mr. LaPointe ran for the State Legislature last November, but was defeated.

Prior to this he served on the East Haven Board of Education during the war years and for several years after.

He was a member of the East Haven Lions Club and the Red Cross.

At the time of his death Mr. LaPointe was plant health counselor for the Southern New England Telephone Co., by whom he had been employed for the past 27 years.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward LaPointe, with whom he lived, and two brothers, Raymond, of Natick, Mass., and Wesley of Ridgely, N.J.

Incumbent Tosses Hat Into Ring; Faces Party Fight

Gartland Mum As To Names Of Other Possible Candidates
The possibility of an intra-party fight for the East Haven Democratic nomination for First Selectman increased, following a meeting of the party's nominating committee Tuesday night.

Tuesday morning Frank Clancy, the First Selectman, announced his candidacy for re-election. The purpose of the announcement was two fold.

One reason was to scotch rumors that appeared in a local paper claiming that Clancy was stepping out of office due to ill health; the other was to notify the party of his intentions, before the nominating committee convened.

The first rumor was believed to have started as a result of the fact that Clancy did not feel well several weeks ago, when he suffered from high blood pressure. However, at no time did the first selectman indicate that he was thinking of stepping out of the political picture.

On the contrary, the morning after Third Selectman Frank Barker was nominated as the Republican candidate, for that office, Clancy, when questioned by the press as to his political future regarding running for office against his old political foe, smiled and indicated he would be campaigning against Barker in the Fall.

Foreman Possible Fight,
Ever since James F. Gartland, Democratic Town Chairman, announced the names of the nominating committee, Clancy indicated that he would probably have to fight to get the nomination. He felt many on the committee were not favorably disposed to him.

"Too, Clancy has known for some time that Second Selectman Dominic Ferraro, would like to head the party's ticket in the Fall.

Gartland, who has not come out with just what candidate he prefers, has not as yet given Clancy his backing in seeking the nomination.

Gartland would not divulge what candidates have been named for town posts, with the exception of incumbent tax collector Salvatore Longobardi, who was unopposed for re-nomination.

However, the minor posts are not considered to have the bearing on the coming election that the fight for the top spot on the ticket will have. Clancy has let it be known that he will fight every step of the way to stay in office.

"Will Seek Renomination"
In the First Selectman's letter announcing his candidacy, stated: "I am making the statement to 'quell politically inspired rumors that he did not intend to run again for office... due to ill health.'"

"I will most certainly seek the nomination," Clancy told the members of the press, "for re-election to the office of first selectman despite rumors to the contrary, now being circulated."

"I am going to stay in this battle for continued good, sound town government and fight to the last for the right of our townspeople to have a town government that will take care of the needs of the many instead of the political demands of a few self-seeking political hacks who have never had the welfare of our people at heart."

"I am going to enter this contest and fight for the continuation of the splendid projects and the great work that this entire Democratic administration has accomplished during the past two years. I am going to stay in this battle to fight for the (Continued On Page Four)

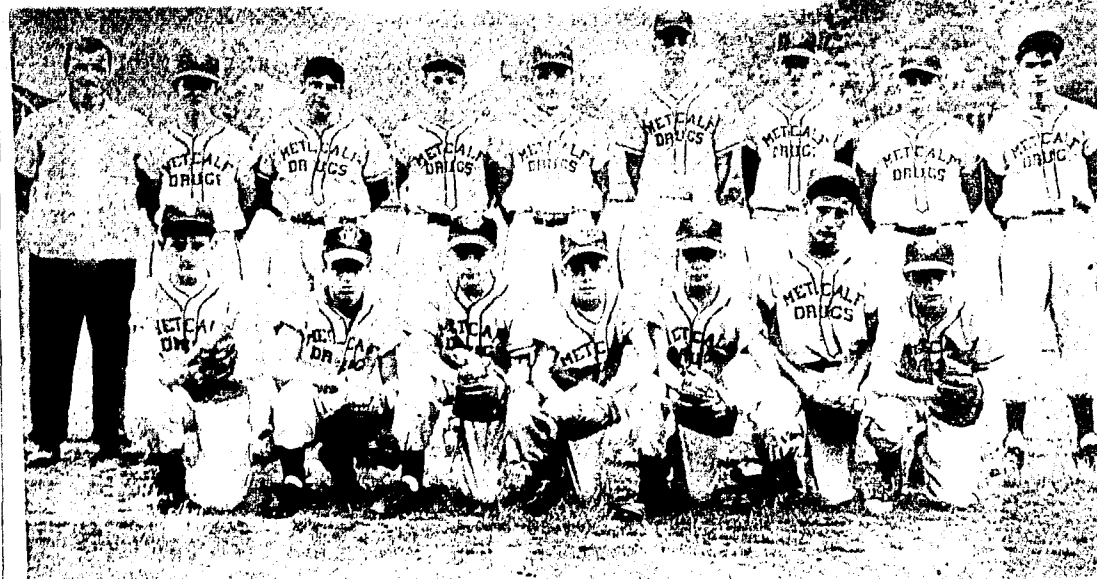

Children's Hospital Receives Elks' Check

To provide a year-round activity for cerebral palsied patients, Edwin J. Maley, chairman of the Connecticut State Elks' Association's crippled children's committee, has presented a check for \$10,000 to B. E. Foss, director of the Newington Home and Hospital for Crippled Children. Two years ago, at a cost of \$4,500, the State Elks' Association paid for the construction of a large porch between the two cerebral palsy wings at the hospital.

The added activity space proved so valuable in the treatment of the boys and girls afflicted with cerebral palsy that members of Newington's medical staff requested that part of the porch be enclosed for year round use. "A large part of the treatment for cerebral palsy calls for as much walking activity as possible after the children have been fitted to their braces," Mr. Foss points out. He continued, "the two cerebral palsy wings provide bedrooms and a dining area with little space for activity. With the new colorful and attractive quarters which will be equipped with parallel bars, standing tables, and with circulation heat and ventilation throughout the year, the progress of the patients is insured." There will be plastic skylight to let sunlight in through the roof and jalousied windows for fresh air.

A gift made by the Elks' Association seven years ago to the Newington boys and girls was a bus which is used constantly at the hospital and at Camp Oak Hill.

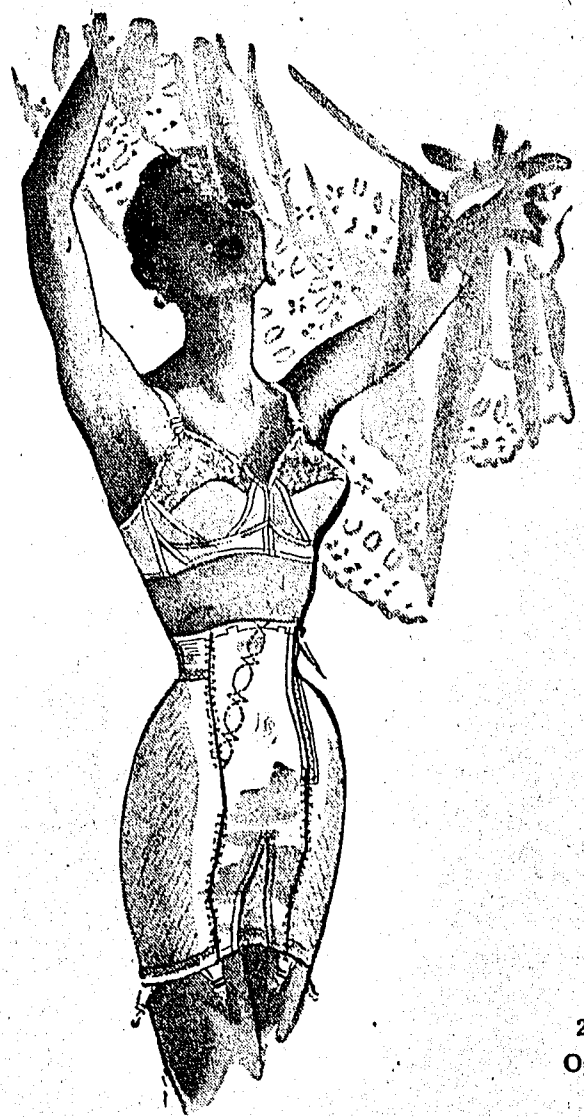
