"Attendance at that meeting was so small that the originating group could foresee no way of turning the organization into a representative and independent movement. Subse quent recruiting efforts met with little response.

"It seemed clear to the founders that popular disconten with present conditions in Eas Haven did not imply a general energy to civic improvement The organization as originally conceived was abandoned.

"The concerns which -moti vated the original group were not dissipated by this disap pointment. The problems which produced them have continued to grow in number and proportion. Consequently some of the
