## Sewer Authority Voted Out; Junior High School Okayed At Town Meeting This Week

In two separate town meetings held in the past week, the townspeople voted down the creation of a sewer authority and approved of the setting of a building committee to prepare plans for the erection of Junior high school on North High Street.

Interest in the two meetings was evidenced by the turnout. At last Thursday night's meeting an estimated 700 people showed up to take part in the final vote; at Monday's meeting exactly 169 residents took part.

At the latter meeting, the townspeople approved of the items on the call for a new junior high school fundamentally as they were set forth in the notice.

One exception was the creation of a seven man committee instead of a six-man committee as asked for in the call, another was that "not more than three members of the Board of Education," be on the committee.

Each member of the board of education introduced an item on the call as far as the items pertained to the proposed junior high school.

In essence the voters approved of using the North High Street site; the selection of a seven man committee by the Board of Selectmen, which is not to have more than three members from the Board of Education and that the Board of Finance appropriate not more than \$90,000 to cover the costs of architectural fees and the cost of accepting bids and other preliminary work adjunct to getting cost estimates and plans for the new 1,000-pupil school.

Sewer authority voted down In a heavily attended session Thursday night, attended by more than 700 interested townspeople, voted down the proposal to create a sewer authority to install sewers in the West End and Monauguin.

Perhaps interest in this project was fanned to a height by a flyer put out Wednesday evening by some of the anti-sewer members of the town.

The anti-sewer element came to the meeting well prepared for battle and scored heavily in getting their points across.

John Corbett, business manager of the East Haven School system, attacked the resolution on the grounds it would be too expensive, and that the powers granted a sewer authority under chapter 35a of the General Statutes were almost without restriction.

Anthony DeMayo, local attorney and D. Charles Beausoliel who headed the sewer committee spoke in favor of the project. However, in the final analysis only a few present voted in favor of the sewer project.

## Barker Blasts Z-Board In Melillo Case

The action of the East Haven Planning and Zoning Commission in referring the complaints of Strong Street residents against the alleged dumping of garbage on a 100 acre tract by Pasquale Melillo, to Town Counsel Richard Reilly, drew a strong verbal attack from Frank A. Barker, candidate for First Selectman on the GOP ticket.

Barker's condemnation of the Commission stemmed from Tuesday night's meeting when, after a heated debate about the "misuse" of the land by Melillo, Jerome Grady, chairman of the commission, decided to put the matters in the hands of the town counsel.

"The decision of the Zoning Board, in reference to the pig farm and garbage nuisance in the Strong Street area, was totally unfair to a whole part of our town," Barker stated.

"I was disgusted, but not surprised to learn that the Democratically controlled Zoning Board has given a decision which will permit the Melillo pig farm on Strong Street to operate almost as usual. Apparently the only concession made was to order Melillo to stop dumping excess raw garbage, bottles and tin cans on an open 100 acre tract which he owns there. This sort of decision is the worst sort of pussyfooting. All Melillo will have to do is plow the garbage under. The worst of the trouble, the pig farm and its foul odors will continue to operate at the expense of hundreds of East Haven residents and taxpayers, while Melillo continues to live in Hamden, far, far away from it all."

"The public is entitled to know how an out of town man can continue to be given more consideration than these hundreds of local people. It is simple enough to understand. Melillo is closely associated with Dominick Ferrara, present Second Selectman, and the Garland gang choice for First Selectman. Melillo buys many things from and through Ferrara's garage. It was Ferrara who was front man in preventing the Board of Selectmen from passing

## Beausoliel Claims Separate Sewer Districts Costly

D. Charles Beausoliel who led the unsuccessful fight for sewers in the town of East Haven, said today, that if the town goes about setting up a number of sewer districts this can lead to "many commissions operating" independently of each other to the extent that the citizens would be faced with a multiple of tax and property assessments.

"The recent vote against setting up a Sanitation Commission," Beausoliel said, "at the town meeting would lead to serious complications if the townspeople decide to have sanitary sewers."

"What the Republican leaders do not realize, in projecting independent sewer systems, is that any number of districts can be instituted by small groups of citizens and within 30 days become virtually municipalities within the town."

"This could lead to many commissions operating under an enabling act containing practically all of the powers of the sanitary commission proposed by the sanitation committee, which was rejected."

"It is possible that the town may end up with four or five commissions each operating independently of each other, hiring different engineers, floating separate bond issues, all with a multiple of tax and assessment methods. What advantage would there be in having a decentralized government?"

"This is for the leaders responsible to answer."

## Donegan Off Dem. Town Committee

Tom Donegan, of 9 Damon Dr., East Haven, notified Clancy Dr. East Haven Wednesday night, of his decision Wednesday night, and forwarded his resignation to Garland today. However, Donegan stated that this action was not to be interpreted as meaning he was also resigning from the Democratic slate, on which he is a candidate for the Board of Assessors.

Thus the war between the two factions goes on unabated. Although quite on the surface both sides are worlds apart under the surface.

It was learned this week that Ray Cooper, former custodian of Town Hall, who sided with the Garland group, was refused a position as a custodian within the school system. Cooper's petition was voted down by a combination of Democrats and Republicans.

## Hey Kids! East Haven Teachers Set For 3,943 Pupils Expected On First Day

A day that has been dreaded all summer by pupils (and possibly many teachers), and one that has been looked forward to by many parents, finally will arrive Wednesday. That is the day parents can start looking for a vacation as 3,943 youngsters start back to school.

With the exception of kindergartens and four rooms on double sessions at the Foxon School and two at Monauguin, all other students will attend full session. Also no transportation will be provided for the Kindergarten pupils.

The first day of school for the kindergartens pupils only will be a shortened session. Full length session for these pupils will start on Thursday.

The following is a general outline of pupil assignments throughout the town, as released by Supt. of Schools R. Vernon Hays. Where necessary, Supt. Hays said, the parents will be notified by mail.

Foxon School  
Grade 1 pupils will attend the 8:00 A. M. to 12 Noon session.  
Grade 2 pupils will attend the 12 noon to 4 P. M. session.  
One section of grade 3 pupils will attend a full day session (8:00 A. M. to 3 P. M.) These pupils will be notified by mail between September 1st and 5th.  
Grade 1 pupils on the Half-Mile-Toloket Road — Route 80 run will take the High School bus to the 8:00 A. M. to 12 noon session.

Deer Run School  
All rooms except Kindergarten will be on full day (8:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M.) sessions.  
All pupils in grades 8, 7, 6, 5, 4 and 3 that were in attendance in the East Haven Schools when the schools closed in June and who live in the Foxon, Half-Mile, Edgell, Glenmore, Maplevale and High Ridge areas will attend the Deer Run School, except that one section of grade 3 will attend the Foxon School as notified by mail.

New pupils registering since the close of school in June and who will be in grades 7, 6, 5 and 4 will attend the Highland School.

Highland School  
All rooms except the Kindergarten will be on full day (8:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M.) sessions.  
Grade 8 will attend the Deer Run School.  
Grades 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 will attend at Highland.

Laurel School  
All rooms except the Kindergarten will be on full day (8:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M.) sessions.  
Grade 8 will attend at the High School and will include all 8th graders who live on North High Street south of High Ridge, in the Bormann area, and in the Laurel, Cravins and Bradley Street areas.  
Grade 7 will attend at the Deer Run School.  
Grades 5 and 6 will attend the Highland School.  
Grades 1, 2, 3 and 4 will attend at Laurel.

Gerrish School  
All 8 rooms on full day (8:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M.) sessions.  
Grades 1, 2, 3 will attend the Gerrish School. One section of Grade 4 that attended the Gerrish School last year in Grade 3 will be transferred to the Overbrook School and the parents will be notified by mail. One section of grade 4 will remain at the Gerrish School due to overcrowded conditions at the Overbrook School.

Overbrook School  
All rooms except the Kindergarten will be on full day (8:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M.) sessions.  
Grades 5, 6, 7 and 8 will attend this school. Grade 4 pupils that attended this school last year in grade 3 will remain there and a second section of grade 4 pupils will be transferred from Gerrish School to Overbrook, as per notification to parents.

Union School  
All rooms will be on full day (8:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M.) sessions.

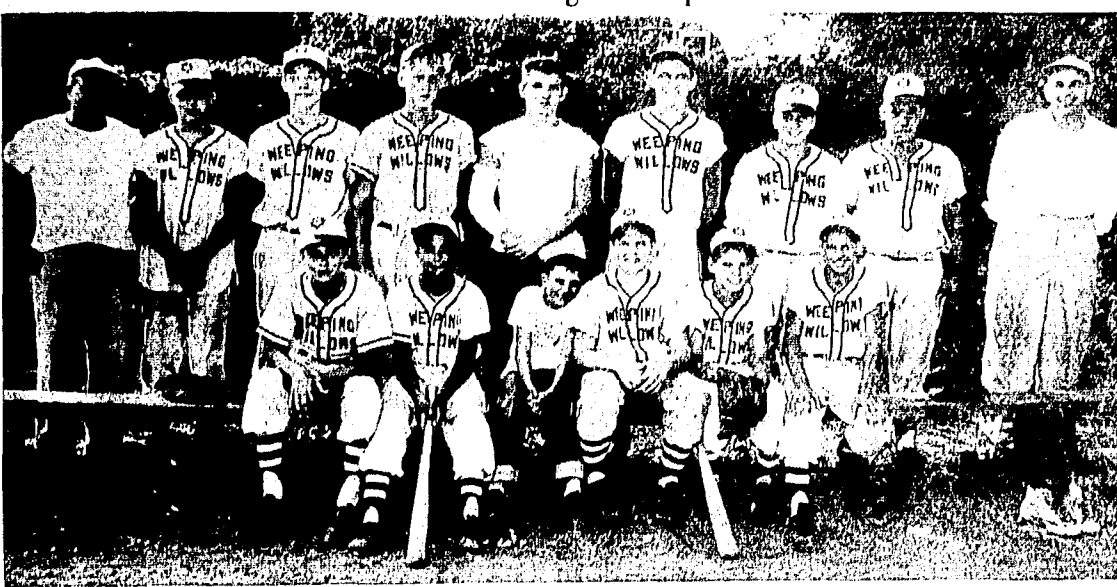

**Fall Clearance**  
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More Than 300 Local Scouts Benefit From Community Fund Help Supplied Each October

"Boy Scouts to the rescue" is the dramatic phase of steady service to the community which is the point and program of Scouting. Once in a while, Scouts have the opportunity of performing the dramatic kind of service, too. Each year in October, the community has the opportunity of supporting the Boy Scouts through contributions to the Branford Community Fund.

More than 300 Local Scouts Benefit From Community Fund Help Supplied Each October. The One day early this spring, the Branford police were notified a woman who was ill was missing from her home. From what was known, it was indicated that she might be somewhere in the woods or shore marshes in the area. Neighbors and friends volunteered help to make the foot-by-foot search that was necessary. Volunteers were alerted to the search. The New Haven Trap Rock Co. sent men and the Bethany State Police joined in the search. Still more people were needed to completely comb the area.

Chief Morsewell thought of the Boy Scouts. One half hour after he had notified their Scoutmaster, 15 of the older Scouts were in the field assisting with the pouring rain.

It is rare that the service of the Scouts to a community is so clearly pointed. Training toward being responsible citizens is a long slow process with few highlights. The program is maintained throughout the nation.

Nine percent of the Branford Community Fund will go to the Quinipiac Council which serves the greater New Haven area of which Branford is a part. This amount represents national membership in the program of the Boy Scouts of America for 175 Boy Scouts, 128 Cub Scouts, 24 Explorer Scouts and 239 adult leaders of Scouts in Branford.

This high number of adult leaders in Branford who give their time and effort to one of the highest tributes to the value of the Boy Scout program. These people serve on Pack, Troop and Explorer Committees; as Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, Scoutmaster Advisors; as Den Mothers; as representatives of each organization which sponsors a Scout group; and as members of local councils and district committees. The service of all these residents

of Branford is given without charge to the community. The national program, training, organization and facilities which make it possible for all these leaders to build toward one goal, is the business of Quinipiac Council. The cost to Branford of supporting the work of the Council is about \$200 a year for each Scout.

The Council provides training for volunteer leaders, activities with other units, camping facilities and program, a program of advancement in recognition of achievement by national standards and professional help and guidance by trained executives. Rather than spend time and money to conduct a drive of their own in Branford, the Quinipiac Council of the Boy Scouts of America joined as one of the participating agencies of the Branford Community Fund.

It might be a good thing, when thinking of a contribution to the Boy Scouts through the Branford Community Fund, to think of all the people in Branford who are giving in service to the Scouts all through the year.

**Plans Being Completed For Branford Schools' Opening Next Wednesday**

The Branford public schools will reopen Wednesday, Sept. 7, at the regular hours. All parents have been requested to start children off right for the year by seeing to it that they get to school the very first day of school on time.

Parents of children attending kindergarten or grade one are asked to write the child's full name, his address and telephone number on a piece of paper and pin this to the clothing of the child with a safety pin every-day for the first week of school to insure that no child gets lost. Parents of kindergarten and grade one children can best help children adjust to school by leaving them in the care of the teacher and departing instead of remaining in sight of the child during the school session. Schools will remain in session for the full year.

So many new children have registered during the summer to attend schools in the fall that a serious transportation problem has resulted. Many buses are at

the stage now where they will be overloaded if more children enroll, as is expected to be the case. Therefore, parents are advised to be patient if a bus child does not arrive home from school as early as expected during the first week of school.

Every parent of a child who did not attend a Branford school last year should have registered the child during the summer round-ups by the V.N.A. held in May, June, and July. Those who failed to enroll children must enroll them at the school serving their district between the hours of 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 6.

Parents of pupils who have moved to Branford since schools closed in June and who live in transportation zones are asked to phone the office of the Board of Education (HU 8-2551) to be assigned to buses. Parents of pupils in grades 7-12 who will be attending school in Branford for the first time this September are asked to call at the school and arrange the pupil's schedule with the principal concerned.

The faculty of the Branford schools will be on duty on Tuesday, Sept. 6, to prepare for opening. The following faculty meetings are scheduled:

1. All teachers meet in the high school auditorium for a short General Teachers' meeting at 9 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 6.
2. Teachers in all elementary schools meet in respective schools at 10:30 a.m. for a teachers' meeting with their principal.
3. Junior - senior high teachers meet with Mr. Infield and/or Mr. Brewer at 11 a.m.
4. Mrs. Maloney, Miss Frischkorn and Mr. Roswell meet with Mr. Pinkham in his office at 1 p.m.
5. All teachers are on duty in classrooms from 1 o'clock until 3:30 p.m. to enroll new pupils.

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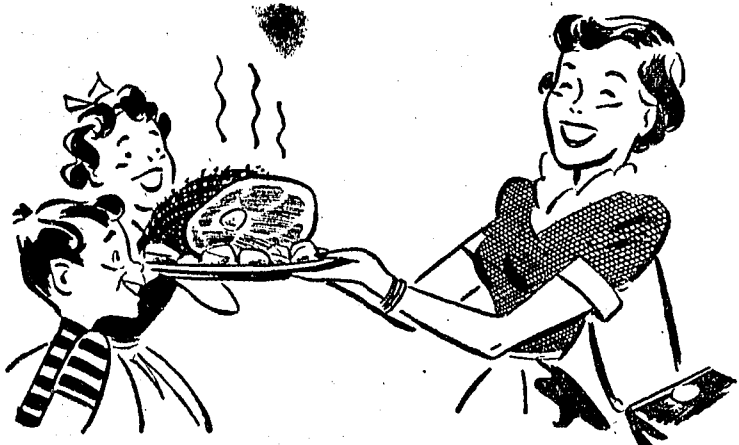

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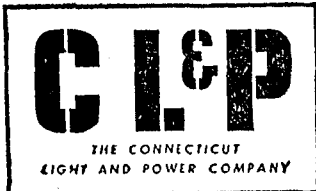

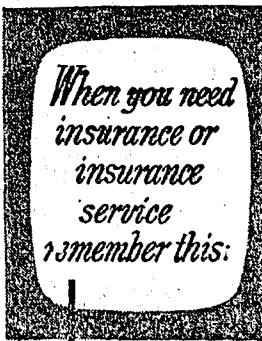
