Citizens' Committee Releases Answers By Political Candidates

Finance Board Only Group Who Fails To Reply

Group Says Selectmen Answers 'Remarkably' Similar On Issues

The Citizens' Committee of East Haven yesterday issued a press release on the results obtained through questionnaires sent out to political candidates of both parties.

Also, the Committee released answers supplied by George Letts and Elwood Scoble, Republican candidates for the Board of Education. Although the release mentions that Harry Morgan, a Democratic party candidate for the education board, replied to their queries, Morgan's answer was not included in the group presented to the NEWS.

This page will carry the editorial activities of the undergraduates' notes on the normal plus stories concerning extra-curricular activities by the student body, such as class dances, plays and various academic clubs.

The Citizens' Committee appreciates the consideration which its comparison of the various candidates' replies. These have all been released to the press and most of them have been adequately covered therein.

To date statements have been forthcoming from Frank Barker and John Vestuti, Dominick Ferrara and Jerome Grady, candidates for posts as Selectmen; and from Harry Morgan, Elwood Scoble, and George Letts, candidates for the Board of Educa-

tion. No reply has been received from Miss Elizabeth Chapkovich, candidate for the Board of Education. It is hoped that some response may be made available before election so that new residents in Town can acquaint themselves with this candidate's views.

One of the most instructive aspects of this project has been the complete failure of all candidates for the Board of Finance to grant the Committee even the courtesy of a reply. Here was an excellent opportunity for these would-be public servants to help acquaint the Town with the nature and responsibilities of this important body under the new legislative enactment governing it.

Instead of availing themselves of this opportunity all four candidates have been content to rest quietly in the assurance that they are "already in" and have no obligations to the democratic process. The Committee feels that they have by their conduct of their campaigns "taught" the Town at least one thing: Men who have been placed above the electoral process develop something resembling a disdain for public opinion.

The Citizens' Committee intends to make no point by its comparison of the various candidates' replies. These have all been released to the press and most of them have been adequately covered therein. The voter will be able to undertake his own analysis of their contents. The Committee does regret that it had no way of guaranteeing complete and identical coverage of all materials released.

The answers made by candidates for First and Second Selectmen from both Republican and Democratic Parties were remarkably similar on most of the points covered. They contained neither startlingly new insights nor obviously irresponsible promises.

The voters of East Haven must judge the sincerity of these statements and the relative ability of the various candidates to carry through on their proposals and promises.

Demmie And GOP Party Ranks Split As Result Of Feuds

Anastasio Opposed Barker Choice While Garland Ran Purge

With the first selectman's chair up for grabs, there has been a bitter fight between Frank A. Barker, incumbent Third Selectman, and GOP nominee to replace Frank S. Clancy, and Dominick H. Ferrara, present Second Selectman, and the Democratic choice to be the first selectman.

Despite the attempt of both these candidates to capture the spotlight, they have failed for two reasons: 1. Frank Clancy and 2. James F. Garland, the Democratic Town Chairman. Hovering in the background behind these two central figures is the shadow of a third person who has figured prominently but not as obtrusively as the first two, Matthew Anastasio, Republican Town Chairman.

Both town chairmen have tried to exert their influence in picking their party's candidates. Garland was successful, Anastasio failed.

What the outcome of Garland's victory will be hinges on the final tally Monday night. But one thing did result from the intra-party battle that saw the ousting of the incumbent in favor of his former running mate. That was the projecting of Clancy and Ferrara into the limelight, leaving Garland more or less in the shadows.

As for Anastasio's defeat (he was actually defeated twice, losing in the Town Committee fight and later in a primary battle), he stands to gain if Barker loses, or lose if Barker wins.

How the voter will react to the manipulations of the town chairman in picking and trying to pick, the candidate for first selectman, is anybody's guess.

How badly Anastasio split his party has not been made public. If it is a house divided as badly as the Democrats, each candidate's chances can be rated 50-50. If it isn't then Barker's chances must be conceded better than that of his opponent because a solid Republican party can decide the issue against the Democrats.

George H. Miller, town assessor, was named by Clancy to head the committee and to meet with Gov. Ribiuff yesterday afternoon.

Foxon Park Assn. Asks Ferrara Reply To Garbage Query

In a letter addressed to the NEWS, The Foxon Park Civic Association, has criticized Dominick H. Ferrara, Democratic candidate for First Selectman of East Haven, for failing to reply to a letter sent to him asking his stand on the importation of garbage into the town.

The association stated that it had sent a letter to both Ferrara and Frank A. Barker, the Republican candidate on this matter and that they had received a reply from Barker. What the reply was the association did not disclose.

The letter to the candidates asked if they were in favor of enacting an ordinance prohibiting the importation of garbage into East Haven for the purpose of feeding pigs. Barker has stated in the past that he favors such an ordinance and claims that he was the only member of the present Board of Selectmen who fought for such an enactment.

Ferrara has not made his stand clear on this matter. (Continued on Page Twelve)

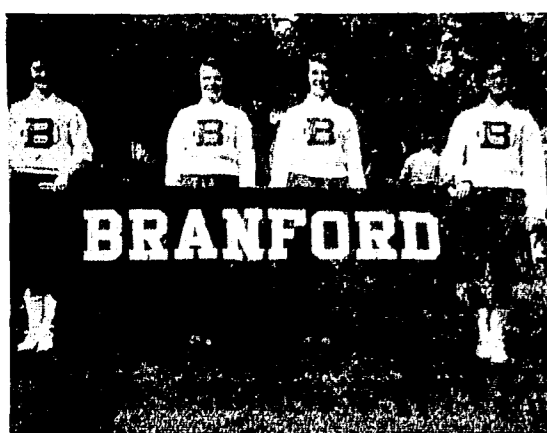

Home Canning, A Well-Used Method, Not Yet Outmoded By New Processes

The "peak" of the season for many of the family favorite foods is here. Current market reports indicate that the supply of peaches, apples, pears, plums, tomatoes and peppers are plentiful and cheap. This is a signal for Connecticut housewives to do their canning at this time. A "harvest" of home-canned foods can be real handy in the winter months when preparing nutritious meals for the family.

Preservation of foods by canning dates back to 18th century times. In 1795 a prize of 12,000 francs was offered by the French government to any person who developed a new and successful means for preserving food. Nicolas Appert, a confectioner, won the prize in 1809 for developing a canning method. Here in the United States, our first canning started operation in Boston in 1810. In 1874 steam pressure was used for the first time in processing canned foods. Progress in canning has increased steadily as a result of research in the fields of engineering, bacteriology and nutrition.

Although other methods of food preservation such as freezing are being used more and more by families these days, a recent survey made by the United States Department of Agriculture of some 4,000 farm families showed that more than 90 per cent of the farms would regularly preserve food for family use. Urban families may not can in such large quantities as their rural neighbors, but many still can fruits and vegetables from their small garden and use their favorite pickles, relishes, jellies, and jams from recipes handed down in their families.

After they have been gathered, the time-worn rule "a pound from the garden to the can" will mean a product that is tasty, better-tasting and one which will keep better. Before using the fruits or vegetables, check them carefully and remove any that show signs of decay. Soft but sound fruits may be used for jellies, jams or juices. Careful, thorough cleaning is essential.

1. Use the right method. All fruits and acid-vegetables, tomatoes, pickled beets) can be processed safely in a boiling water bath if the recommended time is followed. The pressure cooker should be used for canning corn, peas, beans and other common vegetables. Use recipes and timetables which you know are reliable and follow them to the letter.
2. Store properly. Allow the jars to cool overnight. The next day check for leaks, wipe clean and label contents and date. For best results, jars should be stored in a cool dry place below 70°F.

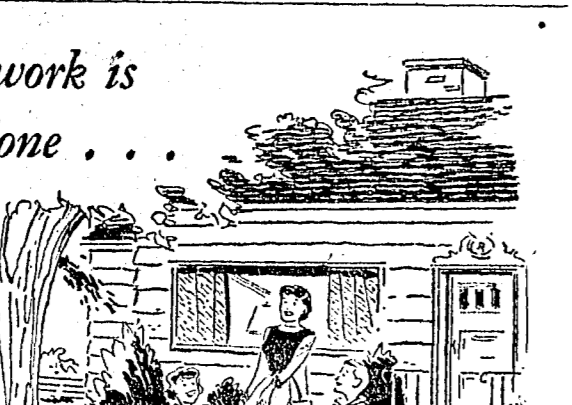

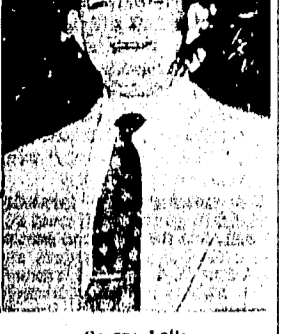

Citizen's Committee East Haven Connecticut Dear Members,

It is certainly heartening to have a group in our town willing to involve itself to find out how candidates really stand on important issues. I am happy to answer the questions you are according to my knowledge or feeling on the subject.

The major problem confronting the East Haven school system today is twofold; the continuing growth of our population and inadequate finances. These two factors produce many problems that are in themselves very important. While the Board is trying to solve these problems, the lack of seats with new schools, it must constantly be reevaluating future school building needs. The topographical nature of our town poses a terrific transportation problem in our school system on availability of funds. Likewise, minimum facilities, supplies and equipment as well as maintaining the present level of teaching, equipment and supplies in view of a probable shortage of available money is a constant problem that the Board has to face. Many of the things now being done or which are not being done in our school system are the direct result of lack of money.

It has always been my contention that since the public pays for town owned property, the only way maximum return for this expenditure can be realized is by making full use of the buildings. Therefore, I am in favor of the use of school buildings for other than school purposes in general benefit to the community. However, since such use of school buildings would require a custodial care, supervision, insurance and increased maintenance costs, I feel that although full control of all activities carried on in these buildings or grounds should be entirely approved by the Board of Education, a separate appropriation to cover expenses resulting from such usage should be incorporated in the town budget. This would prevent these costs from interfering in any way with money allotted for the regular school program.

Your question in regard to an expanded program for adult education can only be answered one way as far as it concerns Board members. The local school board does not control operation of adult educational programs. It is operated directly under state laws and rules of the State Board of Education. According to these regulations the Adult Program must be expanded by the required number of citizens register interest in any certain subject. In matters that come within the local board's jurisdiction in regard to adult education, I favor any encouragement that can give this program. In fact I oppose strenuously against eliminating it at the time of last year's budget dispute.

The delicate question of why I qualify for re-election over my opponent, I hope can be answered by my past performance as a board member and by the record of my stand on important issues faced by the Board in the last three years.

Win or lose, I would be glad to meet with your group to try to answer any other questions you may be interested in regarding our school situation.

Why Do Our Opponents Promise so Much in Their Platform When They Have Done Nothing During the Past Two Years When They Were in Office?

ANSWER WE HAVE NO ANSWER FOR THIS ONE. Perhaps our opponents can give an acceptable reason.

How Did the Ferrara Garage Get Possession of the Two Police Cars That Were Traded in to Another Company?

ANSWER We do not know. We are not trying to smear Ferrara on this. We sincerely believe that there is probably some pretty good and legal method by which his garage got possession of them. We use this sort of thing here only to show the type of campaign that the Democrats have depended upon as their only reason for being elected to control of East Haven for two more years, - and to show that we could have used it also. Such things are not used by ethical people or political parties.

Why Is Some Form of Tax Reduction the Only Practical Idea so Far Advanced As A Means of Bringing Industry to East Haven?

ANSWER Because all other means so far tried have failed. The Chamber of Commerce has had an excellent Committee made up of leading citizens working on this problem for a long time. Frank Barker's suggestion that new industries be excused from paying taxes on stock and machinery for a short period of years, but would be required to pay taxes on buildings, is the only real incentive so far offered to industry as a reason for choosing East Haven in preference to some other community. Democratic opponents have suggested that private homes and land be condemned to make way for industry. This suggestion is not only illegal but would be an invasion of human rights to home and property. It is an indication of Democratic thinking.

Why Should Frank Barker, John Vestuti, and the Entire Republican Ticket Be Elected on Monday?

ANSWER If for no other reason these fine men and women should be elected to office because they are free from politics of the wrong kind. It is no secret that the Democratic Party is boss controlled. It is also no secret that no person could expect to receive a Democratic nomination without bowing to one man or to one very small group. This of course does not apply to Republican Margaret Tucker who was endorsed by the Democrats to give their ticket the strength that Margaret and her long excellent service carry.

Vestuti Replies To Democrats On Political Background; GOP Candidate Charges "Smear"

The Republican candidate for second selectman in East Haven, in a statement issued yesterday, lashed out at what he said were attempts to attack his standing in the community by the opposition party.

John A. Vestuti, who is Frank Barker's running mate on the GOP ticket, handed the recent edition of the East Haven Democratic News, as a "smear sheet" that attacked "everyone in town" not associated with the "clown knitt Garland" group.

Vestuti was the subject of an article in the Democratic campaign paper, which asked who was Vestuti? How long had he lived in East Haven? How long had he been a Republican?

In his reply to the Democratic charges, the GOP candidate presented his answers to these queries.

"The 1955 edition of the Democratic News," Vestuti says, "has at last been released after weeks of complete silence from the Garland party."

"It is a smear sheet without one single constructive word about Democratic intentions," the Republican continued. "Apparently it attacks everyone in town, except the close knitt Garland Gang that has managed to strangle the Democratic Party this year. Among other things, they have asked who am I? What have I done? What are my qualifications. Allow me to compare myself and my record with my Democratic opponent, Jerry Grady."

"I have lived in East Haven longer than Grady has. Through meeting hundreds of people daily I believe that I am more widely known than is Mr. Grady. I have attended every Town Meeting since I have lived in East Haven except for one when there was illness in the family. I particularly remember the Town Meeting when Mr. Grady was one of those who led the meeting into confusion and by doing so helped to set the school building program back by a year or more."

"The Democratic smear sheet also asked when I decided that I was a Republican. This is one question they never should have asked because I have an answer for them. Both my family and I were Republicans for many, many years before Domenick Ferrara decided to turn Democrat, and for many years before Mr. Grady was anything. My family was one of the first Italian-American Republican families in the city of New Haven."

My father was one of the charter members of the American Club, one of the oldest Italian-American Republican Clubs in the United States. I was born, raised, and always have been a Republican. Democratic Boss Garland is well aware of this because he was raised in the Grand Avenue neighborhood where this club and my family were prominent in Republican affairs."

rid the party of Clancy as candidate it will evolve on whether Garland should have let the voters denounce Clancy by renominating him in order that Clancy could have been defeated at the polls; or whether Garland denied the voters the candidate they preferred; or that he made the proper move by putting Ferrara in the top spot to prevent a possible defeat that would knock the party out of office.

Meanwhile, with the Democrats airing their soiled linen, Anastasio has retained a sphinx-like attitude regarding Barker. That Anastasio fought against Barker twice and got clobbered twice is no secret. However, Anastasio has made no moves since the August primary to widen or heal the split in the party. Neither has he made any moves to promote Barker's campaign.

If he has worked against Barker, he has done so quietly, his only gesture of defiance to the Barker faction was his attendance at the testimonial for Garland Tuesday night. This is in itself a political rarity even

to have happened during the off-campaign season.

Anastasio is on the Republican ticket, but he can't lose — since he is up for registrar of voters which he will get regardless of the outcome of the election.

Antipathy, or even an underground anti-Barker campaign, on Anastasio's part can hurt the Republican ticket and decide the issue in favor of Ferrara. On the other hand, such actions could rile those who at first sympathized with Mally, but now would revolt against his anti-party attitude.

One tip — if you are going to bet as to who will win any particular office — mortgage the homestead and place the cash on Margaret Tucker — it's sure thing.

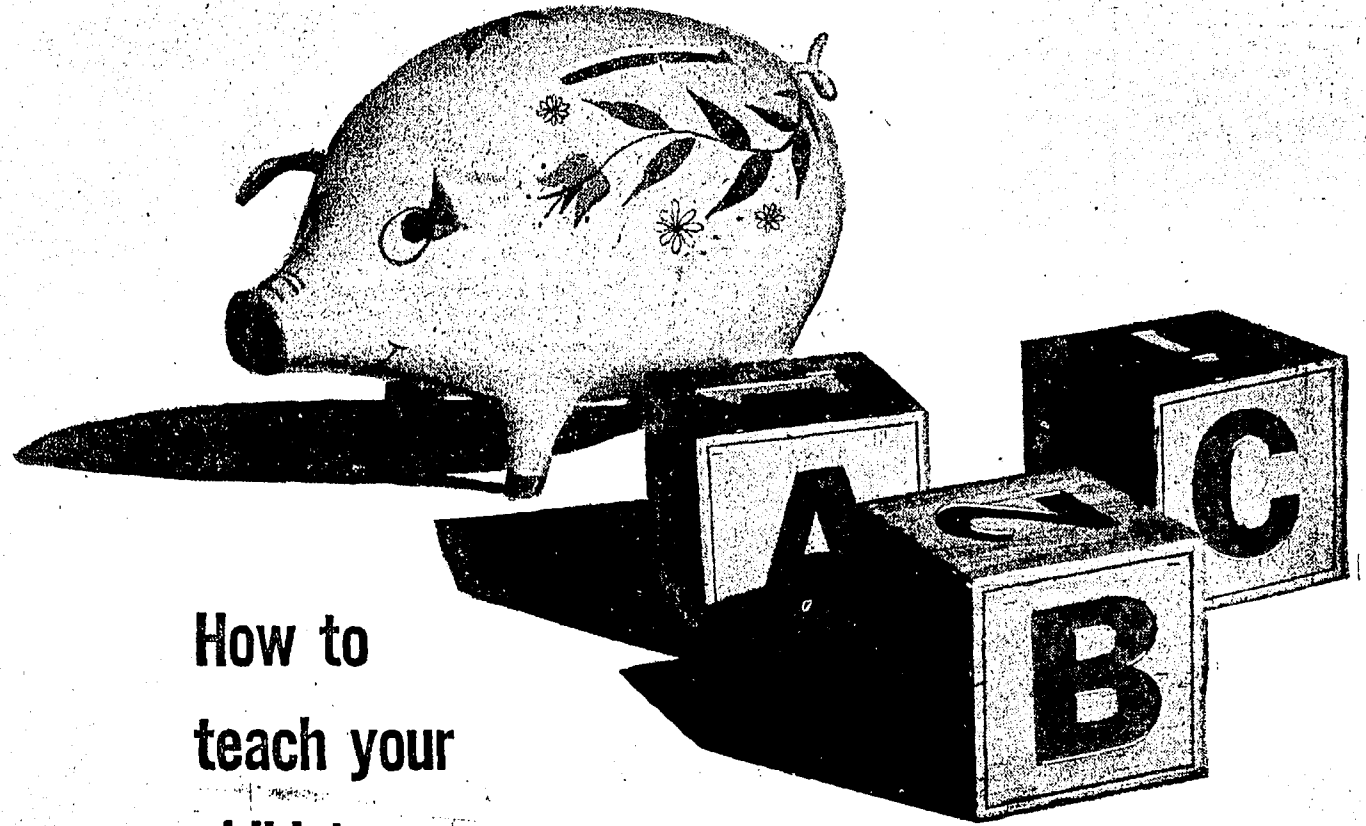

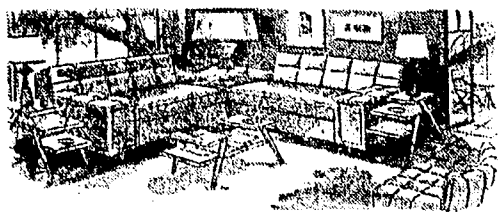
