East Haven Faces Shelton Under The Lights Friday P. M.

Rugged Valley II Undeclared In 3 Contests To Date

Game Will Indicate Locals Potential To Finish Undeclared

In the first night game to be held in East Haven in the past several years the Blue and Gold clad charges of Coach Frank Crisafi will meet the Shelton Gaels under the lights at the high school field Friday night.

The two teams, both undeclared, will go all out for victory. In this contest which should tax the strength and ability of the two elevens.

"Hunk" Crisafi, who has scouted the Gaels against Ansonia, Seymour and Wilby (Waterbury), says of the opponents: "They are a good team. They didn't show much fast Saturday, as they didn't have to, however they opened up against Ansonia and Seymour and displayed a good attack."

"It's a team that takes advantage of the breaks, and any team that can capitalize on the breaks in a game is a good team."

Crisafi said he hopes to have his squad up to full strength for Friday night's game, but has several doubtful starters because of injuries suffered during this week's scrimmage. The coach stated that the boys have been really going at each other during the afternoon sessions in preparing to meet the Gaels.

Among the players, whose injuries have caused furrows in Hunk's brow are Harry Lage, left halfback, who has contusions of the right hip; Al "Butch" Mellilo, right guard, who is troubled by a twisted cartilage in his knee and Ralph Paolillo, right half back, who is bruised about the legs.

However, Frank is hopeful he will have the use of these first stringers by Friday. Lage and Paolillo are speedy, and will be needed to scout through any gaps opened in the Shelton line. As for those gaps, Butch Mellilo is needed to provide them.

In Shelton, Crisafi says, the local outfit has to keep an eye on Rose, the quarterback, who operates from the split-T formation.

"He is a quarterback who can pass, and is a definite threat on the option play, for he likes to run. In passing his favorite receiver is Don Taylor, the right end."

In their three games to date the Shelton Gaels have overrun their opponents by horrendous scores, having yet to be stopped with less than 30 points per game. Last week they crushed (Continued On Page Three)

United Fund Up To \$272,293 Total At First Report

The United Fund-Red Cross campaign entered its most active period this week. Tuesday night volunteer workers in all 11 Key Drive divisions gathered in New Haven's Jewish Community Center for the first report meeting of the campaign. \$272,293 was announced in gifts and pledges towards the goal of \$1,377,682.

During the month a small army of 3,000 volunteers will call on prospective contributors in factories, offices and homes to put this year's United Fund campaign over the top. The next report meeting, a luncheon, is scheduled for Oct. 11. Two more dutch-treat luncheon meetings are set for Oct. 19 and Oct. 24. The final report dinner will be held on Oct. 27.

The United Fund raises money for the operation of 43 separate health, welfare and recreation agencies that serve the people of Greater New Haven. Although only one United Fund agency, the Hamden Public Health and Visiting Nurse Association, is actually located within the boundaries of Hamden, most of the other Key Drive agencies, including the Scouts, the Y's, the hospitals and clinics, the family agencies and the Red Cross, serve proportionately as many people in Hamden as they do in New Haven or any of the other Key Drive towns.

In some Hamden factories a pay-roll deduction system of giving is used. A contributor can budget his pledge by specifying an amount he wishes to have deducted automatically from his paycheck. In this way he can spread his contribution over a 12 month period.

United Fund leadership has defined three major problems related to the appeal. Member agencies face a serious financial problem. They are asked to provide more needed services, at the request of the community, if the community has been willing to pay for through past United Fund campaigns.

In order to meet demands for services many agencies have had to cut dangerous financial corners on their operating budgets. They have let building and equipment run down, operated on less staff than was really needed, or used up the capital of endowment funds that were invested to bring in additional operating income.

Therefore raising the goal of \$1,377,682 is vitally necessary. Fund leaders say, just to keep the gap between services rendered and services paid for from widening any more, and endangering the very existence of some of the agencies.

Fund officials are sure that the goal can be met and even surpassed this year. General chairman Edward L. Flahives, Hamden resident, has expressed full confidence that a successful effort is in the making. "If everyone gives his fair share, we're bound to go over the top this year," he said.

East Haven To Observe Fire Prevention Week Starting Sun.; Firemen To Give School Lectures

East Haven residents are asked to help in the observance of Fire Prevention week, which will begin Sunday and last through Saturday, Oct. 15.

The program, which is jointly sponsored by the Hartford Fire Insurance Company and the Connecticut Fire Departments, will feature such events as prizes for the best posters and essays on fire prevention; the commissioning of junior fire marshals among the elementary school pupils; the giving of lectures throughout the East Haven School system by members of the Fire Department on preventive measures to be used around the house and at play and the awarding of a pennant to the classroom that has the highest number of answered questionnaires that will be distributed through the pupils.

Chief Thomas Hayes, of the local department, said that this year the awarding of junior fire marshal badges to school children is a new promotional feature sponsored by the William Hotelikis Agency, area agents for the Hartford Fire Insurance Co.

Too, the pupils will be given a questionnaire, or a list of items to be checked at home and returned to the teacher. The classroom with the highest number of returns will be awarded a pennant in recognition of the cooperation by the pupils in the fire prevention program.

Also, the East Haven Exchange Club is sponsoring a poster and essay contest for high school students, with prizes to be awarded to the winning artist and author.

Republicans Win In Center And Momaquin Democrats Take Foxon And The West End By Big Margin Victor's Winning Vote More Than 200 Less Than Majority In 1953; Barker And Clancy Congratulate New Town Head

It's over, and for the first time in six years East Haven has for a First Selectman someone other than Frank S. Clancy or Frank A. Barker.

Dominick H. Ferrara, Second Selectman under ousted Clancy in his first try for the top spot in the town government, won over his Republican rival by 383 votes.

This was considerably less than the majority plied up by Clancy two years ago, but this fact can be attributed to the breach within the Democratic party ranks.

In an election that saw both parties split over their standard bearers, Ferrara polled 3311 to Barker's 2,028, while his running mate Jerry Grady, outran his rival John Vestuti 3,306 to 2,919.

The only Republican to gain victory, other than Miss Margaret Tucker who ran for Town Clerk on both tickets, was George Letis, who polled one more vote than Elwood Scoble to win a seat on the Board of Education.

Garden Notes

Letter to the Country Cousins
How is it in the country paths now that October's dust? Are they still with silver rain? Or, tell me frank and true— Are all the leaves turned crimson?

Unless something is done about the lawn and the crabgrass soon, there is little hope of a decent green covering next year. Fall is the time for action as far as the lawn goes. Not just the experts but anyone who has ever sown any grass seed in the past agrees that this is the best of the four seasons. Whether the lawn area is old or new, there is much to be done, before seed can be sown confidently. But the seed need not be sown now; it can be sown anytime until the snow flies.

No matter what the temperature reading might be, autumn is in the air. This is as true on the west coast, where leaves are starting to fall, as it is in the east, where, so far, only a few scarlet leaves can be seen on an occasional red maple tree. Autumn's approach is not a matter of color alone, but also of scent and, more tangibly, of a bounty of fruit and vegetables and flowers. So beautiful are they, in fact, that many a garden has the unkempt look that comes with the harvest at the end of the season. But, for real gardeners, autumn cannot be the end. Although Fall's arrival will pass unnoticed by almost everyone save astronomers and weather people, it ushers in one of the two best seasons of the year for gardening. And while the waiting to see the results of Fall planting is longer than that of Spring planting, autumn is a season that has special compensations for gardeners. These compensations are more noticeable to the suburban than to the city gardeners.

The most important chore in the city, as well as in the suburbs and in the country, is the planting of bulbs this fall for bloom next Spring. It tulips, daffodils, hyacinths or crocus are to spread their color through the Spring months, they must be planted within the next six weeks. Before the suburban gardener can progress to such a client task as planting the bulbs that will flower next Spring, he must face the ravages of summer, the drought and the rains, the weeds and the insects. The late summer, particularly, throughout the East has been one of the most trying for the gardener and one of the best in years for the growth of crabgrass.

Death Of Alexander McKernan Is Mourned In North Branford

The death of Alexander McKernan on Sept. 17 in New Haven was mourned by a large number of townspeople in North Branford who had known him during his years with the New Haven Trap Rock Company. Mr. McKernan was born in Montreal, Canada, 37 years ago. He was in charge of the North Branford Quarry from 1914 to 1946. His first assignment was the supervision of the construction of the quarry and mill, the Branford Quarry Railroad and the dock at Pine Orchard. In 1918 he became superintendent. During the 30 years which he spent as superintendent at the quarry, it is reported that more than 14 million tons of trap rock were quarried, crushed and shipped.

He is survived by several nieces and nephews in Canada and Michigan, and by one nephew, John McKernan of Durham Road, Wallingford. A solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated on Tuesday morning at St. Mary's Church in New Haven and interment was in St. Lawrence Cemetery.

Always interested in youth, and filled with belief in young people, his influence on many lives will always be felt. It was through his generosity that the North Branford File and Drum Corps was able to compete in local, state and national competition. The formation of the corps was one of his philanthropic activities. Through his interest and influence, the North Branford Athletic Association had the use of a club house and a field where some of the best shore line games were played some years ago. Many members of the club are now active in the Little League organization.

The North Branford Civic Association, the North Branford Centenary Committee, local schools and churches were also interested in him. Although taking no executive parts in these organizations, he gave them his full support.

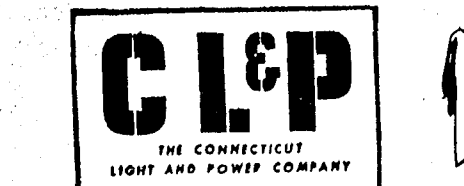

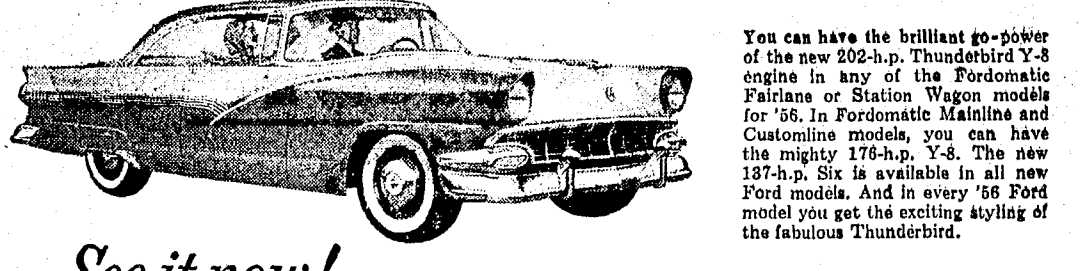

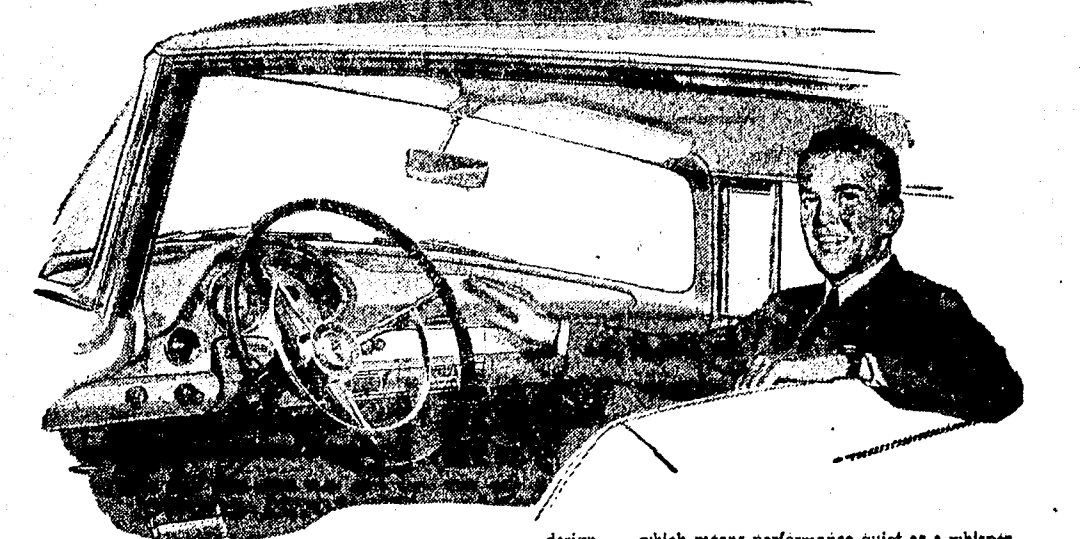

Col. Clarke was accompanied to the local post by Major John Anderson and Capt. C. McCluskey of the New Haven Filter Center. I am extremely proud of my upside down tuberous begonias. Though I planted them wrong end up, early this year, they managed to grow down, around and up, in time for a quick bloom before being brought into the house.

Tuberous begonias came into my life one morning last winter as I typed another woman's column. Until that day, I was acquainted only with the term "begonia" and not too accurate about what I applied that to. But in the space between the gardener's handwriting and my type sheets, the personality of the plant blossomed—especially its hardihood. Before the last page reached the typesetter, I had dreamed up a series of glass shelves, banked against a window, with various members of these now-familiar tuberous joys in continual lush array.

As though by fate, the next day, I ran across a very fair offer of 12 tuberous begonias for \$1 in a newspaper ad, for which I sent post haste. Great was my surprise when my project starters, arrived in due season in a small cardboard box—looking for all the world like 12 old, brown, dried-up and long-forgotten garlic bulbs.

Notice that I was, I had to assume this was the proper aspect for my embryonic bank of blossoms. But it was plain I would have to follow directions exactly and carefully to make anything out of them.

All went well—in preparation of soil, weather conditions, depth of bulb, etc.—until, upon carefully lowering the first brown beauty to its growing place, I discovered I did not know which end was up. Neither did the directions — or, at least, they weren't telling.

I knew I would never have another afternoon with both the time and spirit for all that begonia preparation, so I flipped a bulb, and planted the other 11 as it had landed. All or nothing for me!

A couple of months and many inquiries later, I found someone who actually knew how tuberous begonia bulbs should rest in their beds, found luck had played me a foul trick, and promptly stopped weeding what I had fondly been calling my begonia bed up until that moment.

No blue ribbon winner could have been more surprised and pleased than I was yesterday when I saw something bright red in the tangled weed bed and discovered a full-fledged plant in bloom. I prefer to think it was the hardiness of the begonias—not rank neglect—that produced the four stalwart characters now reposing on my kitchen window sill. It's true they don't really look very strong, and the single blossom is somewhat smaller than what I had in mind, but then, they had to come up the
