

Town To Go To Polls Monday

Annual Meeting Scheduled For October 11

Will Vote On Library Directors; State Aid Road Funds, etc.

The Annual Meeting of the Town of East Haven will be held on Monday, October 11, at 8 p. m., at which time the voters of the town will turn out, one and all, to vote on the following items:

1. To appoint three directors of the Public Library;
2. To take action on the following application for allotment of State Aid Road Funds under the general Revision of 1930, Sections 1484 to 1494. BE IT RESOLVED, THAT the Town of East Haven declares its intention to build or improve a section or sections of road or to build or improve a bridge or bridges under the provisions of the Statutes relating to State Aid Roads, and the sum of \$2,500.00 or so much thereof as may be required to pay the amount of the pro rata share of said Town of the cost of such construction or improvement under the provisions of the appropriation allotted to the Highway Commissioner, is appropriated for such purpose, and the Town Treasurer is authorized and directed to pay said amount to the State at the times and in the manner provided by law. RESOLVED; That the Selectmen are authorized and directed to make application to the Highway Commissioner, in the manner provided by Law, for an allotment of \$10,000.00 for the construction or improvement of roads or bridges in this Town under said laws and appropriation;
3. To take action on the report of the Board of Finance and the matter of laying a tax on the grand list of 1935;
4. To authorize the Selectmen to enter into such contracts and agreements as will enable them to carry out the recommendations of the Board of Finance;
5. To authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in the name of the Town in payment of current expenses and outstanding obligations of the town and to issue a note or notes or other general obligations therefor, and to renew notes or other obligations of the Town outstanding, on terms to be determined by the Selectmen. Said sum not to exceed \$100,000.00.

BUILDING PERMITS

According to Mr. William J. Hogan, Building Inspector here, building in East Haven has progressed a trifle. Permits have been issued to Mr. Theodore J. Emmons for a four-room house to be built in Lenox Street at a cost of \$2,700, and to Alva Bradley for a one-family house and garage to be constructed in Hunt Lane at \$3,350 and \$150, respectively. A permit has also been given to Mr. Israel Gordon, trustee, to demolish a house at 301 Main Street.

Town Reports On W. P. A. Projects

Many Projects Now In Works

With the aid of WPA funds, the town administration has completed the following projects since October, 1935.

Sidewalks, 65,754 square feet; curbs, 16,672 lineal feet; storm sewers, 9,835 lineal feet; drainage ditches, 15,477 lineal feet, and 14 miles of roads.

The town has constructed a Town Shed, 48 feet by 10 feet in dimension, and built of native granite. It is large enough to house all town equipment. The Police Garage, in the rear of the Town Hall was constructed of brick and its dimensions are 20 feet by 22 feet.

School Survey

A survey of the Elementary schools was made of all needed repairs by a local architect. Said reports have been completed.

A sewing project has been operated in the basement of the Town Hall for the past two years, giving employment to many women on relief. Clothes have been turned over to the relief department for

distribution among the needy.

Present Projects.

Among the many projects now in operation about the town are: a waterbound macadam pavement in Coe Avenue, being laid from Bradford Avenue to Silver Sands Road, a distance of one mile; storm sewers and new pavements in Boston and Russo Avenues; and jetties at Momauguin.

A survey is being made of all streets in the center of the town, and when completed a plan will be devised whereby all streets will be repaved with a permanent surface which will also include curbs on both sides of the streets.

FIRE HOUSE VOTED

It was unanimously voted at the Special Town Meeting, last Friday evening, to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$50,000 for the purpose of constructing a new fire house to be built on the site of Company No. 1, in Main Street, and also to purchase a new pumping engine for the department.

HOW TO VOTE

1st. Swing the Red Handle of the Curtain Lever around to the Right as far as it will go.

This will close the Curtain around you and unlock the Machine for voting.

2nd. Pull the Party Lever in front of the name of your political party until the Bell rings, and then let it go back. This will turn down all the Pointers in your party row. If you leave the Pointers down, it will vote a straight party ticket when you move the Curtain Lever to open the Curtain.

3rd. But, if you wish to split your ticket, turn UP the Pointer from over the name of the candidate you wish to cut out, and then turn DOWN a Pointer over the name of any other candidate you wish to vote for that office.

4. After arranging your ticket leaving the Pointers down over the names of the candidates you wish to vote for) swing the Red Handle of the Curtain Lever to the left as far as it will go, and leave it there. This will register your vote and return the Pointers to their unvoting position, after which it will open the Curtain.

Each candidate's Pointer is located just above his name; so be sure to turn down the Pointer above the name of each candidate you wish to vote for.

In the case of an office to which two (or more) candidates are to be elected, you can turn down the proper number of Pointers anywhere in that group, even though one be directly below the other.

The machine is so arranged that you cannot turn down more than the proper number of Pointers for have no fear of spoiling your ballot office. Therefore you need not vote for too many.

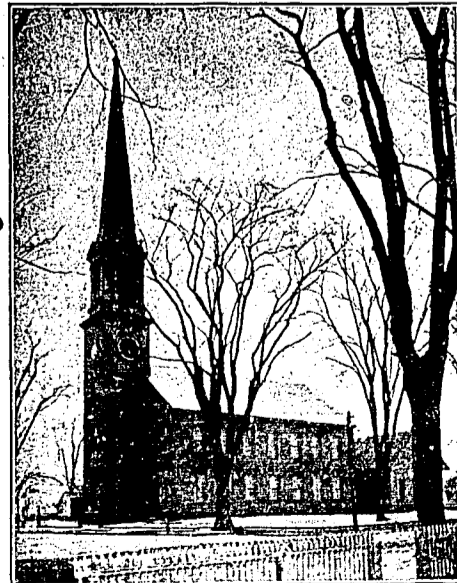
As no votes are registered until you move the Curtain Lever to

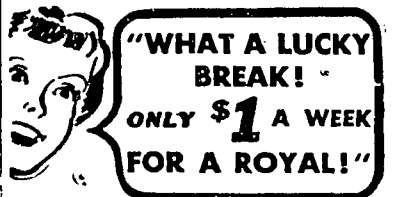

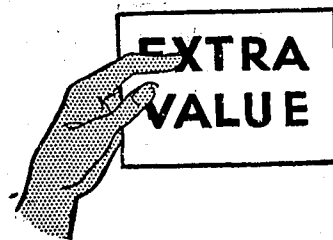
