## Dooley Completes Safety Plan For Schools

### Gillis To Propose Licensing Bicycles

It has been announced by Mr. Frank Dooley, Jr., that plans for the Safety Council in the public schools have been completed and will be carried out under the supervision of Mr. John Maher, Athletic Director of East Haven Schools, and a teacher advisor from each school.

The American Legion is doing their part in preparing a program of safety education in the home, for the sole purpose of "making East Haven a safer place to live."

This program was originally proposed by Mr. Dooley, which will help to further the safety of our school children and townspeople.


## Democrats To Hold Card Party, Dance

During the past four years, the Community Chest received goodly amounts from the local schools, which are as follows: 1933, \$163.69; 1934, \$256.62; 1935, \$249.39; 1936, \$241.54.

### Completed Projects For Towns Stated

#### 1937-8 Boasts 2,110 Pupils In Local Schools

#### Report Cards To Mark Characteristics

Complete enumeration of local school students was announced by Superintendent of Schools William E. Gillis during the past week.

The total number of pupils for the year 1937-8, as of September 14, 1937, has been set at 2,110. This includes pupils attending public and private schools and students not attending from 4-16 years of age.

Of the total number this year, 1947 are attending public schools, 41 private schools, 121 not attending as yet, and two of school age not attending.

Figures of past years for comparison are stated as follows: 1932-3, 2,173; 1933-4, 2,111; 1934-5, 1944; 1935-6, 2,174, 1936-7, 1929.

#### Report Cards

It was also stated by Mr. Gillis, that report cards this year for the elementary schools, will grade characteristics. Marks will be given for such items as courtesy, promptness, dependability, interest and care of school property as well as for subjects.

Grades 1 to 3 will be marked similar, but will not be as complicated as the upper grades.

#### HEALTH OFFICER

Dr. Paul H. Brown, former Health Officer here, has been appointed Health Officer of the city of Stamford, Connecticut. Dr. Brown was formerly with the State Health Department at Hartford.

Whether it be the repairing of school buildings, enlarging of present facilities, instructing classes of children and adults or giving occupational adjustment advice, the Works Progress Administration in Connecticut has made a lasting contribution to education, State Administrator V. J. Sullivan pointed out yesterday.

In connection with nation-wide observance this week of American Education Week, Mr. Sullivan and J. Sullivan pointed out yesterday, years the WPA has spent \$2,929,515 for education and recreation in this state alone. A few of them are: 55,907 pieces of school furniture repaired, 342 school buildings painted and repaired, 283 pieces of new furniture built for nursery schools, 52 parks improved and 11 new ones constructed, 22 playgrounds repaired and three new ones built, 17 school bleachers built, 201,917 library books catalogued, 139,577 library and school books renovated. Sewing projects throughout the state have made 37,195 boys' garments and 49,339 girls' garments, for distribution to school children of needy families.

#### Completed Projects

Completed projects tending to improve the state's educational system, by communities, are as follows:

East Haven: Eight schools repaired, five new athletic fields, 330 boys' and 304 girls' garments made.

Branford: One athletic field improved, 171 school books renovated, 222 boys' and 133 girls' garments made.

Guilford: One new stadium constructed, one new athletic field built, 200 pieces of school furniture repaired.


