

Follies Beauties Barred As Wash-day "Mechanics"

Fine Monday Calisthenics Foe of Youth and Loveliness, Flo Ziegfeld Warned

"Glorifier of the American Girl", the late Florenz Ziegfeld was perhaps the world's outstanding authority on feminine beauty and charm.

His annual musical revue "Ziegfeld Follies" has been the mecca for lovely girls for more than 25 years, and the stepping stone to fame for many celebrated feminine stars of the stage and screen. Marion Davies, Ann Pennington, Ruth Etting, Lilyan Tashman, Dolores Costello, Helen Morgan, Irene Dunne and a host of other favorites were once Ziegfeld proteges. Consequently whatever Ziegfeld had to say on the subject of charm and beauty is of keen interest to every woman. In an interview shortly before his death, the creator of the "Follies" discussed some of the things he had observed in his quarter-century of evolving spectacular, glamorous stage productions.

An ironclad rule for all his actresses, even to the humblest chorus girl, according to Ziegfeld, expressly prohibited their indulging in any form of strenuous physical activity. "Light housework such as sweeping, dusting and bed making is fine for limbering the muscles and keeping the body fit", he declared. "But I positively forbid my girls doing heavier forms of housework, especially washing and ironing clothes. These forms of drudging labor take toll of even the healthiest physique, stealing away suppleness and buoyancy, and causing the lines of the figure to droop and sag. No woman who wants to keep herself fresh and youthful in appearance should make a drudge of herself in the home. If it were merely a matter of looks it wouldn't be so important" Ziegfeld continued. "But I am convinced after years of observation that a woman's appearance has a great deal to do with her inner happiness. The woman who looks attractive, radiant, charming, seems to possess certain harmony with the world that enables her to get more out of living. By her personal vivacity and spirit, too, she inspires happiness in those around her. I am think particularly of the wife and mother, with a husband and children who look to her for companionship and inspiration. I have always felt that this phrase of homemaking was far more important than many women, who insist upon doing their own laundry work realize. Cosmetics, marcel, smart clothes, all add to a woman's life beauty, but she must feel right to look right. And no woman can feel up to par after an exhausting day with the family washing. All the powder, rouge in the world won't cover up the lines of strain and weariness reflected in her face from aching muscles."

Project To Cost \$12,324

Employment Service Organizes At High School

School To Aid Students In Acquiring Positions

A placement (employment) service for all students is in process of organization at East Haven High School under the direction of Daniel B. Fitts, head of the commercial department. This service is to extend the usefulness of the school to the community.

Full time and part time work is sought for graduates and underclass students of working age.

This placement service has two chief functions. First, giving notice of such service to those in a position to use it, such as employment manager and general employers, and second, the recommending of qualified students to fill positions when employers seek beginning workers.

To Earn Reputation

It is hoped that such a placement service will help the students in wanting to earn a reputation in their school work for honesty, dependability, industriousness, and enthusiasm as it will be the policy of the service to recommend only those students who are considered able to hold a job. If a student cannot hold a job for which he is recommended, the school will lose the confidence and repeat calls from employers.

To the end, that students may be prepared for actual working conditions in the clerical field, the commercial department is surveying the requirements of employers and the duties of beginning workers on the job in the New Haven area so that what is taught in the classroom is in line with the requirements of business itself.

To further this end, men experienced in hiring and placing workers have been invited to speak to the seniors to demonstrate the problems of getting and holding a job.

Stone Church To Sponsor Xmas Bazaar

It has been learned through W. P. A. headquarters at New Haven, that work on a new project, the widening and grading of Clintonville Road, will be started on or about December 9.

Clintonville Road, extending from Thompson Street, Foxon, to the North Haven Town Line will be made into an improved cinder sub-grade roadway for a distance of one mile and one-half. Other work includes a cut-off, oiling of shoulders and surfaces and covered with trap-rock screenings and a culvert. The road was previously a back road 12 feet in width and very muddy and will be widened to 26 feet.

To Cost \$12,324

The cost of construction is estimated at \$12,324, \$8,506 of which will be federal aid (69%) and \$3,818 will come from town funds (31%).

Work will be started with twelve on the job, following the completion of the Highland School and Leonard Street projects.

THE PEARL OF THE EAST

The tales that could be told about the Filipinos many struggles for freedom, could fill quite a large library.

I have previously mentioned the historic five insurrections against the abuses of the church. Their final insurrection, that against the government of the United States, was like that of the South turning against the North, due to a misunderstanding and against the best form of government man has devised.

Let us come to the time of the American occupation after the putting down of the Insurrection. A lot of the higher officers of the Filipino army were sent as prisoners of war to the island of Guam in the Mariamo Islands. I saw them there and talked with them. They were a splendid appearing group of intelligent men. I may remark, in passing, that I had a narrow escape from the clutches of an octopus on a coral reef on Guam. I almost escaped from a huge shark there while swimming in the harbor of San Luis D'Apra.

What's What In BUILDING CONSTRUCTION

An open forum for the discussion and explanation of construction and material problems

SUPERVISING SMALL HOME CONSTRUCTION
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Insulation comes in many different forms of construction. Floors over porches and where there is no cellar and similar conditions require insulation of some sort. There is some quilt to be used underneath or between the top floors and loose fibre, bats and roll fibre for placing between the joists, also loose fibre which can be blown into inaccessible places.

The same materials apply for insulating between studs, etc., for sidewalls and for placing between rafters and attic floor joists. Roofs and sidewalls may also be insulated from the outside by the use of the many insulating boards which are placed on top of roof boards and sidewall sheathing or which take the place of such. As many thicknesses as are required to attain the objective desired may be used, one on top of the other.

Selection should be made according to requirements and the pocket-book and according to the objective as outlined by the heating or air-conditioning Engineer. To be explicit, the layout made by the Engineer for the proper heating or air-conditioning is based on certain air changes, heat loss, etc., and he must know the kind of insulation to be used and to what extent, in order to have basic information to work with. Or, conversely, the Engineer may base his figures on certain requirements for insulation and leave it to the owner to apply it according to the setup as outlined.

Oratorical, humorous and dramatic selections will be presented.

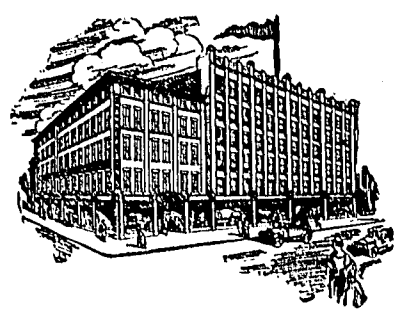

Prizes will be presented to the three best contestants.

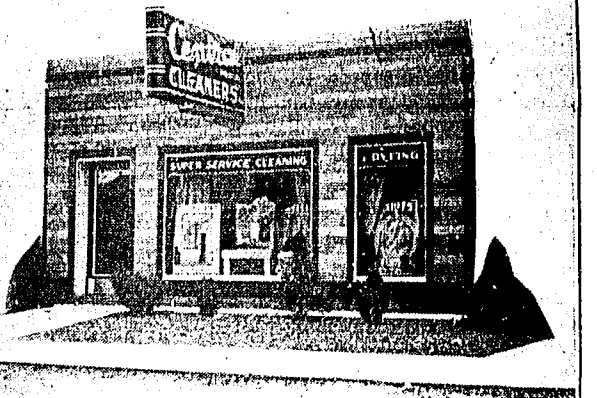

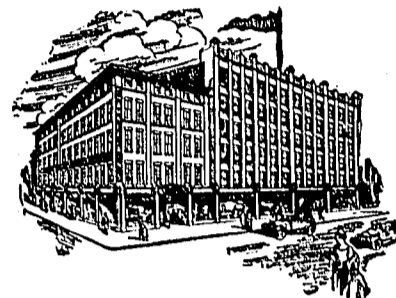
