THE PROBATE ELECTION

On Tuesday the voters of East Haven will join the voters of the other towns of the New Haven Probate District in cleeting a Judge of Probate to succeed the late Judge John L. Gilson. We have long held to the idea that judges of our courts, state, county and local, should be chosen on a basis of their judicial qualifications. For many years the New Haven District Probate Judgeship has been removed from politics only because the two major parties have seen fit to nominate and endorse the same candidate. The law providing for election of the probate judge at the polls dates back to the founding days and can be changed, as can the probate fee system, only by leg-islative enactment by the General Assembly. This year we are filling a vacancy which has been brought about because of the death of the incumbent, Three candidates have entered the field and are bidding for the votes of the electors of this district.

We have long known the three men nominated, Clifford B. Stur-ges, Republican; Vincent P. Dooley, Democrat; and Michael Quinn, Independent. Each is competent, all have good records at the bar,

Independent. Each is competent, all nave good records at the our, and each has a host of friends. One of these candidates, Judge Sturges, is a fellow townsman. The fact that he is a neighbor, whose career all of us are familiar with, gives our community an even greater interest in this election than we might otherwise have. We know Judge Sturges as a humane index of our flow. Course a position he has he had with haver and abiljudge of our Town Court, a position he has held with honor and abil ity since the court was established. We also know him as an experi enced lawyer, as a civic-minded citizen, and as a gentleman of wide interests and understanding. Naturally these qualities would place him high in any political contest.

But were the judgeship to be determined solely upon merit and experience, we venture to say that the fact that Judge Sturges has served as clerk of the Probate Court under the late Judge Gilson and more recently under Judge Ellsworth Foote, for nearly two decades, would undoubtedly weigh heavilly in his behalf. During his long service for the people of the towns making up the New Haven Pro bate District he has gained a most thorough understanding of the Probate Court's peculiarly specialized requirements. This district can ill-afford to lose qualified service.
