HAZARD ELIMINATOR PROGRAM

We are informed by the New Haven Safety Council covering the Greater New Haven Area that the Hazard Eliminator Award Program being currently conducted is receiving strong support throughout the area served by the Council. Supt. of Schools William E. Gillis of East Haven school system has given this endorsement: "We are exerting every effort this year to advance the safety program among our pupils so there will be less hazards, both in school and in the homes. It is necessary to have some kind of an incentive so that pupils will be reminded forcibly of the need for safety measures. In looking over your plan for distribution of Hazard Eliminator Award folders, I feel that interest will be aroused and maintained. This project fits into our educational program and we shall be glad to cooperate to make it a success." Already three candidates from the East Haven student body have filed reports and are eligible for the Hazard Eliminator Pins.

Because home accidents are the second largest cause of death and injury throughout the nation and in Greater New Haven they led all other sources of injury with 44 such home accident fatalities, it is reassuring to learn that an educational project is underway and that it is being given the active support of the educational leaders. We have perused the Hazard Eliminator pamphlet and are in hearty accord with its aims and objectives.

This program as well as that currently underway for bicycle safety sponsored by the Harry R. Bartlett Post and the State Motor Vehicle department are deserving of the support of everyone.

A CITIZEN OF LONG AGO

We received recently a four page pamphlet dated November, 1878, which was in the form of a "Complimentary" to Grove J. Tuttle Esquire. It was a reprint from an editorial which appeared in the Branford Gleaner, a weekly newspaper of that time. Because it deals with a well known citizen of East Haven of long ago whose name is memorialized in the present Grove J. Tuttle School and the Memorial gateway at Green Lawn, we are glad to pass on some of the information it contains, believing it will interest residents of today who did not know Judge Tuttle. The "Complimentary" was published on the occasion of Mr. Tuttle's election as representative from East Haven in the General Assembly.

It tells that he was born in Wallingford near the Hamden Town line on April 2, 1851 and when a few weeks old his parents moved to East Haven. In 1873 he was admitted to the practice of law in Tennessee and the same year became a member of the Connecticut Bar. In 1877 he was elected a member of the Board of Education of East Haven and at the time of the "Complimentary" had been justice of the peace four years a Grand Jurymen, secretary of the regular and able East Haven correspondent of the Branford Gleaner.

His law office was on Chapel street in New Haven which he shared with his brother, Dwight W. Tuttle, the latter a Republican "on the opposite side of the house in politics." To quote more from the pamphlet we find that Mr. Tuttle "possesses a clear and penetrating mind, a strong and sound judgment, calmness and temper for deliberation, with invincible firmness, perseverance in resolutions maturely formed—with incorruptible integrity—all of which mark him as a man designed, in all events, which may distinguish the era of his life, to stand conspicuous and prominent. It is not necessary to say that Mr. Tuttle is a Democrat. Possibly, the many readers of the Gleaner will be deeply interested to know that Mr. Tuttle is a bachelor. This may seem inexplicable but it is a fact. It is believed that he has not yet made a CONTRACT, or commenced seriously a SUIT, with any of the fair sex. His connubial ATTACHMENTS have been of a BRIEF nature."

With all of those puns the editor of the Gleaner turned to a concluding paragraph which predicted that the young East Haven lawyer would prove a power toward "the encouragement of the advancement of education, agriculture, manufactures and science."

In the years that followed, this citizen of long ago did make a name which means much, still, in East Haven. Although a life-long member of the minority party, the Democrats, that did not keep him from being justice of the peace, a presiding judge here for many years, an often-elected representative to the General Assembly, and chairman for many years of the Board of Education. Many of the progressive advances which were made by East Haven during the years of his benevolent influence can be laid directly to his doorstep. East Haven today would be better off with more men of the calibre of this local citizen of long ago.

Christ Episcopal Church To Join In Radio Service



On Sunday, Feb. 29, substantially every member of the Episcopal church will sit in their pews and at exactly 11:32 1/2 A. M. the presiding Bishop's voice will be heard, telling of the needs of war-devastated countries in Europe and Asia, and urging Episcopal church members everywhere to accept their plain duty as a privilege of helping these suffering millions. The same scene and the same message will be repeated in thousands of Episcopal churches all over America, at exactly the same time.

The Episcopal Church gave more than a million dollars in 1947 through its Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, and it intends to raise the same amount or more in 1948. The entirely new use of radio opens what is expected to be a very brief and highly successful campaign.

At the Sunday service February 29, when Bishop Sherrill's ten-minute address ends, the rector of Christ Church the Rev. Alfred Clark will tell the people how they may have a part in this program of aid for the distressed, through the Presiding Bishop's Fund. Then the opportunity will be given for both immediate gifts and short-time pledges. At national Church headquarters in New York City it was stated recently that "Our 1,600,000 people can raise \$1,000,000 for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief IN ONE DAY if each parish and mission will do its share."

This is the first time radio has been used by any Church in such a way, to convey a message to its whole constituency at one time. E. G. Curry of the East Haven Radio Company is arranging to place a radio with amplifier in the church for this special occasion. The public is also invited to share the impressive service.

Paying The Minister Easy In Old Days

All Villagers Did Then Was Set A Tax And Everybody Had To Pitch In And Help Raise The Money.

According to Miss Sarah Hughes History of East Haven there was unhappily, a chasm in the East Haven Village records from April, 1685, to December 23, 1703, and therefore her book gives little details about East Haven's second clergyman, Mr. John Harriman who was called in November 1683, following the brief pastorate of Mr. James Ailing. It is clear however that paying a minister in those days was a simple matter because immediately after his employment the village raised by tax of all citizens fifty pounds. "current money with the merchants" for his support.

The villagers also voted at that time to proceed immediately to build a house for the minister, and to finish it in a year. This they attempted to do by subscription but the money apparently came harder than that from taxes because the house was not finished.

The records disclose the names of thirteen East Haven land owners who subscribed toward the ministers house and the fencing of the home lot ranging from 20 pounds subscribed for by three of the gentlemen down to a single pound by one individual. Two others de-

clined to pledge worldly goods but promised to "do what they can". Another pledged 25 rods of half fence about the ministers home lot.

According to the plans the house was to have been set on the side of the Village Green. The plans were rather elaborate and called for a dwelling 36 feet long and two stories high.

The ideas proved too elaborate probably for the little village. At least it is known that the ministers house was not completed until a rather long time afterward. The break in the village records apparently meant that a separate parish and a separate village were for awhile abandoned. There is mention in a land record of 1688 that the East Haven families had returned to their former conception with New Haven. Therefore from 1685 until nearly a decade later the East Haven people whether by choice or because of disagreement were satisfied to undergo the hardships they endured in prior years, the long, tedious, dangerous journey across the marshes and wooded hills and the harbor to the meeting house on the New Haven Green.

But in the very end of the year 1703 new courage seemed to revive in the village on the East Side and at a meeting the inhabitants voted

to again take up their village grant and so informed the officials of New Haven who represented, of course, both church and town. Then at a General Assembly, at Hartford in May 1704 on petition of Capt. Ailing Ball and John Potter, "inhabitants on the East side of the East River in the Township of New Haven" it was voted to renew the former rights that "they should be a distinct society, and have liberty to call and settle a Minister among them. When they should be able to maintain the ordinance of God in a suitable manner."

With this affirmative action behind them the East Haven families looked about for a minister. Their attention turned to a 20 year old young man, Jacob Hemingway, born in the village, who had the year before graduated at the college at Saybrook (now Yale University, under the presidency of the Rev. Abraham Pierson.

At a village meeting Nov. 20, 1704 they commissioned John Potter, Caleb Chidsey and Ebenezer Chedsey, "to treat with Sir Hemingway, to get him, if they could, to give them a taste of his gifts in preaching the Word."

Sir Hemingway remained as pastor a full fifty years.
