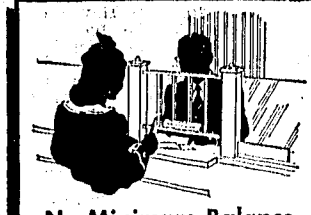

Protection of Native Plants in Connecticut. In 1938 the State of Connecticut first recognized the need to protect a native plant when the Legislature passed a law which made it a crime to take any of the species of plants known as Lygodium palmatum or Creeping Fern growing and being thereon, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Seven Dollars or imprisonment in county jail not exceeding thirty days or by such fine and imprisonment both as in the discretion of the court. Liberty Bell Bond Campaign Recalls Story

When on May 11, shortly before 11 P. M. EST, in Independence Hall at Philadelphia, the Secretary of the Treasury tapped the Liberty Bell, it signified the opening of the U. S. Savings Bonds Independence Drive, of which the Bell is the national symbol. 25 million copies are now circulating some 2,000 cities, so that the original looks like and hear what it must have sounded like in 1776. Thus the Liberty Bell long our most cherished patriotic relic still serves the nation whose birth it proclaimed in the cause of personal independence through strife.

The highlights of its fascinating history, verified from original sources and separating fact from legend, follow:

LARKS STILL FLY

"It was an idle day Wednesday and talk was cheap. Words tumbled over each other in haste to join other discussions. Ideas for conversation were as haphazard as the weather. But with each lull, eyes directed to the street, still shining in the water were the faces of Lark and Education. Politics were mentioned but never discussed. Education was a theme. Baseball made its pitch for favor and lastly Father's day seeped into the chatter group.

There was a moment of silence as each party groped for words to express his own patriotism and in a national way thoughts reverted to Fathers of Sport such as Freddie Fitzsimmons, Connie Mack, and others. The Branford scene was recalled and Old Grampa Kelly, of Lake Shore, and Chet Pratt and his quartet of children—and finally, Clarence I. Bradley.

"It wasn't the fact of his recent death which left every body speechless. It was the realization that truly there was a father to everybody and one who could live a life of peace."

The son of one of Branford's foremost merchants, Clarence and Arthur learned of dry goods and shoes almost before they could walk. Their young life was spent in the fashion of the times, hunting and fishing, a sport which Arthur still fancies when not attending to his own curtain shop.

The latter left school early to assist his father in the Main Street business which for years has been conducted by a huge elm tree with a horse-drawn mule upon its trunk where the first limb crocheted into the main portion.

The long porch completed the comfort of the Main Street picture. It was on the outside bench that arm-wearers shoppers waited for a few minutes to relieve the ledum of foot walking.

Clarence, a boy who managed to receive brilliant marks while in school, went on to Yale University where he combined good scholarship with a fine literary disposition.

It was the latter characteristic which sent him to war earlier than America's entry in 1918. With a group of Yale friends he joined a Yale ambulance unit attached to the French Army. Like all others who made it, he survived and his adventures were numerous and like most others his courage was high.

He suffered many of war's discomforts and bore one brush with death in the graveyards. He never received a wound, but he was characterized as a man who talked about it where it could be avoided.

When the United States entered the service he transferred to the U. S. Army and finished out the conflict under the fighting banner of the red, white and blue.

And from the day that he first joined he carried that ensign first in his mind and first in his heart. His eyes, beneath an inscrutable gaze, had the sparkle of forty-eight stars and the stripe which made his backbones the red and white stripes of the independence spirit of the thirteen original colonies.

The low figure of his serial number was mute evidence of his patriotic tendencies.

And when the war ended and a new veteran's organization was being formed even as the G.A.R. and the Spanish-American Veterans had organized, earlier, enough of his spirit flamed that he joined the American Legion, Post 83, in his own home town.

There was work to be done there. Even in the small towns hundreds of vets needed counseling—as today. But there was no veteran's administration, instead each doughboy and sky-boy and gog looked to himself for the help needed in his time of need or to assist in his right. Swedish Visitor Returns Home After Tour

Mr. Nils Schagerstrom of Malmo, Sweden, who as a representative of the Swedish Chamber of Commerce, has just completed a six weeks survey of the woolen textiles industry, both in the United States and in Canada, returned by air plane on Friday, June ninth, to Sweden. He went via Denmark, to Copenhagen, and then by ferry

across the eighteen mile strait between southern Sweden and Denmark. Mr. Schagerstrom cuts down his time in the air by six hours, by this route, making the crossing in twelve hours.
