Supt. William Gillis Will Resign Position

Superintendent of Schools William E. Gillis Intends to resign his position in the East Haven school system upon the termination of his current three year contract.

termination of his current three year contract. The superinitendent announc-ed bis intention last Monday night at the public hearing on teachers' salaries at East Haven High School, He has held that position in town since 1930 and has been largely responsible for the build-up of the present school system. Lauding the teachers on the present staff, Gillis said that only eight teachers have left the East Haven elementary school system to teach elsewhere point-ing to that as a significant fact attesting to the interest and loyalty displayed by the East Haven teachers. Gillis urged citizens of East Haven to start to consider the matter of his successor at once. He also urged taking steps to-ward a salary commensurate with the position. Also advocat-ed by Gillis is the establishment of a schedule which will bring East Haven into line with com-parative school systems in Connecticut.

It claims that such a meeting was never sought after they had presented a budget increase as of \$15,000 compared to the Board of Education's budget re-quest of \$47,300.

Monday's meeting lasted nearly an hour and a half and was called mainly to get public reaction on the natter.
