Manager Plan in Small Communities

Five hundred of these, ranging downward from Cincinnati and Kansas City, are among the 2,000 communities of 5,000 population or less. The other 500 are under 5,000 population.

THE STORY OF HOLTON, KANSAS

Holton is a typical mid-western farming center with a population of 12,000. It is one of about 500 municipalities under 5,000 which have benefited by adoption of the council-manager plan. In 1919 the Bureau of Government Research of the University of Kansas made a careful inquiry into Holton's affairs and published its findings in its Citizens Pamphlet Series (No. 7).

Probate Judge Of North Branford To Be Elected Oct. 1

The annual Town Meeting in North Branford will have added significance for the voters of that area on October 1 for Governor Lodge. This week notified officials that a special election to fill the present vacancy of Probate Judge will take place on that date. It is also the date of the biennial town election. Gov. Lodge's action was taken on the recommendation of North Branford authorities.

The statute provides that the Governor shall issue a writ of election under such circumstances. The date of the election to fill the vacancy rests within the determination of the Governor.

Local authorities recommended to the Governor that the election of a Probate Judge be combined with the biennial town election if possible, to save the expense to the town of a separate election.

Governor Lodge transmitted to the Sheriff of New Haven County a writ of election, which was served on town officials.

Ruth J. Beers, clerk of the Probate Court for this district has cited in Judge Frederick R. Houston, Probate Judge of the adjoining district of Branford who will serve as acting judge until the election in October.

Mrs. Ewell also paid tribute to corresponding secretary; and Mrs. Leroy Champagne, treasurer.

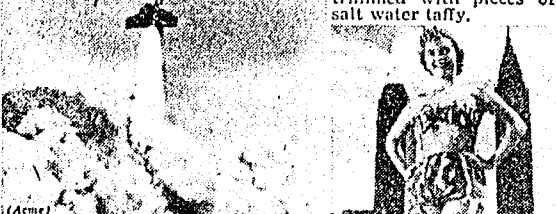
