






Phlox is a persistent perennlai which will fill a garden with color-ful beauty for nine weeks. Few plants are so dependable or satisfy-ing and they are easy to grow. Two summer types are available, Phlox Suffruitcosa, like Miss Lingard with glossy foliage and tresses of fragrant white blossoms, appear in June and continue to produce at in-tervals into October. Phlox De-cussata blooms in July and August cussata blooms in July and Augus and ranges from fifteen to forty inches tall. Confusion sometime:
