Report card dates will be November 6, January 7, March 4, May 7 and June 10. Class night will be held June 9th and high school graduation June 11th, 1953.

The board also voted to award the contract for coke for the local schools to East Haven Coal & Oil Company, who were the lowest bidder with \$16.90 a ton. The contract for backhaul coal went to Sealhart Coal Co., with the bid of \$13.74.
