Universities Define Rights And List Responsibilities

The faculties of our universities must be guaranteed freedom of expression, and the reasons for the guarantee must be understood by the public, according to a report released today by the Association of American Universities.

Setting forth the nature and function of the university, the report says that, even in the face of popular disapproval, timidity should not lead a scholar or a teacher to stand silent when he must speak in matters of truth and conscience, particularly in his own special field of study. At the same time it emphasizes the responsibility of university faculties in appointments and promotions.

"Appointment to a university position and retention after appointment require not only professional competence but involve the affirmative obligation of being diligent and loyal in citizenship," the report states. "Above all, a scholar must have integrity and independence. This renders impossible adherence to such a regime as that of Russia and its satellites. No person who accepts or advocates such principles and methods has any place in a university. Since present membership in the Communist party requires the acceptance of these principles and methods, such membership extinguishes

Organized 53 years ago, the Association of American Universities consists of 37 leading American and Canadian universities and speaks for its members on policy matters of common interest. Its president is Dr. Harold W. Dodds, president of Princeton University. The report, entitled "The Rights and Responsibilities of Universities and Their Faculties" is being released after six months preparation.

The Association in defining the right to a university position, "academic freedom," says that free enterprise is as essential to intellectual as to economic progress. "A university must be hospitable to an infinite variety of skills and viewpoints, relying upon open competition among them as the surest safeguard of truth," the report states. "Its whole spirit requires investigation, criticism and presentation of ideas in an atmosphere of freedom and mutual confidence."

Academic freedom, therefore, must be guaranteed to faculty members, who must continue to

While asserting that professors are not entitled to special privileges, but are subject to the same penalties as other persons for violations of the law, the Association also counsels that they should not be subject to special discriminations such as special loyalty oaths that others are not obliged to take.

"The Association avows that it shares the 'profound concern' of the American people over an international conspiracy and 'police state' which would destroy all free institutions, including the universities.

"Communist seizure of power by thought control, propaganda based upon force, falsehood and deceit, and world-wide revolution, it adds, would create conditions under which 'no scholar could adequately disseminate knowledge or pursue investigation in the effort to make further progress toward truth.'

"The Association says that loyal citizenship, integrity and independence as well as professional competence are requisites for appointment and retention in a university position. It holds these first named qualities to be incompatible with membership in the Communist party or adherence to Soviet Russia or its satellites.

But outside of his special field, it says, a professor should remember he is only a layman and 'express himself accordingly. The report also points out that academic freedom does not include freedom from criticism and is not a 'shield' for those who break the law. It says there is a line where 'freedom' or 'privilege' begins to be qualified by legal 'duty' and 'obligation,' and the determination of that line is the function of the legislature and courts.

It says the professor owes his university and colleagues and the public 'complete candor and perfect integrity, precluding any kind of clandestine or conspiratorial activities.' University faculties as well as governing boards have public obligations, it points out, because of public benefits they enjoy, including support of state universities by public funds and aid to endowed universities by tax exemptions.

The report was drafted by a committee of five appointed by Dr. Dodds after it was authorized by the Association's annual meeting in Chicago last October. Dr. A. Whitney Griswold, president of Yale University, was committee chairman. Other members were Dr. Arthur H. Compton, Chancellor of Washington University; Dr. Franklin D. Murphy, Chancellor of the University of Kansas; Dr.

University of Nebraska; Chancellor Henry T. Heald, New York University; President Gordon Gray, University of North Carolina; Acting President William H. DuBarry, University of Pennsylvania; Chancellor James P. Hart, University of Texas; President Sidney E. Smith, University of Toronto; Chancellor Bennett Harvie Brunson, Vanderbilt University; President Colgate W. Darden, Jr., University of Virginia; President Edwin B. Fred, University of Wisconsin; and President Henry B. Schultz, University of Washington.

The final draft was approved by all Association members on Tuesday, March 24, 1953.
