

In citing the law, Priest noted that the only use permitted was by those persons regularly making use of flares, warning signals or frearms for commercial or other legitimate purposes, Permits would not be granted for fireworks disdays by individuals, he said. He cited parts of the ordinance;

SECTION 1. The discharge, fir ng or use of all firegrackers. rockets, torpedoes, Roman candles, fire balloons or other fireworks or substances designed and intended for pyrotechnic display, and pistols, comes, connons or other dedees using blank cartridges or aps containing chlorate of potash mixture, is hereby prohibited in he Town of East Haven, except as reinafter provided.

SECTION 2. The sale at retail or wholesale of all such fireworks and devices and the storage and sion of the same is hereby

According to a letter from First, Selectman Frank Barker to lerome Grady, leading petitioner, he regulations may be adopted as part of a general town plan, now under consideration by town heads The requested ordinances would have regulated removal of soil from land and set a standard minlmum size to residential lots. They yould require contractors to con struct concrete road curbing and front walks and would regulate onstruction on filled ground.

In his letter to Grady, Barke spoke of plans to engage the servces of a technical engineering firm for the purpose of preparing n pilot plan which would provide 'much needed information" to the Planning and Zoning Commission

He said that present zoning re gulations are "admittedly obsolete and inadequate" and in need of study. Barker said he felt "it is very important that we do engage the services of technical planning engineers and it is my sincere wish give the program their full sup-

Passage of a modified Airport Zoning Bill minus a controversial section granting full powers of oning regulation to municipalities owning airports has been recom-mended by the Committee on Aviation and is pending before the state Senate.

Although the approved bill resembles closely the original measure submitted by Senator Leonard Levy (R) of New Haven, the bill has had the controversial para-graph (b) of Section 5 excised. This paragraph would have permitted an airport-owning municipality to zone for other towns bordering on the airport if they arefused to participate in a joint airport zoning board. Section Attacked

"stake" in the final form which the bill would take because of a long standing controversy over the planned-for expansion of the New Haven Municipal Airport. Without seeking to interfere with the operation of the airport, itself. many townspeople have resisted the idea that additional land would be transferred by sale, or otherwise, to expand the limits of the field. The argument, has been that the town is confronted with budgetary revenue problems and cannot afford to give up land that may be able to pay taxes in the future.

Another concern expressed was that the land that would be acquired consists, in part, of areas already zoned for badly-needed industry. Of immediate concern, however,

was that section of the bill which would have permitted the City of New Haven to zone property in East Haven which adjoined the airport. A committee headed by former state Senator William Jaspers was set up to study the entire matter. No reports have been made since a meeting took place with representatives of the airport several weeks ago.

Section 3 of the bill directs the Aeronautics Commission "to formulate and adopt, from time to time alroort approach blan for each publicly-owned airport in the state. Each such plan shall indicate the circumstances in which structures or trees or both are or would be airpotr hazards, the area within which measures for the protection of the airport's aerial approaches should be taken, and what the height limits and other objectives of such measures should be."
