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## Officials Express Regret On News Of Ematrudo's Death

Members of the East Haven Board of Education expressed their regret this week over the sudden passing of their colleague, James Ematrudo, on Tuesday. News of his death came with dramatic suddenness to the heads of an announcement that he would not accept renomination to the Board in October.

First Selectman Frank Barker, GOP town chairman Mathew Anastasio, Schools Supt. R. Vernon Hays, Democratic town Chairman James Garliand and John Corbett, head of the school maintenance department, also expressed their regret over Ematrudo's passing.

Mrs. Howard Doolittle said, "I am very sorry. Mr. Ematrudo was a very good member, faithful in attendance at meetings and conscientious in his work. We'll miss him."

Burton Reed, former chairman of the School Board was deeply shocked. "Jim Ematrudo and I have been friends and neighbors for years," he said. "I regret his passing exceedingly."

Charles Sizemore learned of his death with deep regret. "I am very, very shocked," Sizemore stated. "He was a wonderful man and I enjoyed every minute I worked with him. He was a conscientious, hard worker, faithful in attendance, and added a great deal of humor to Board meetings, often easing tension with a humorous remark."

Mrs. John Flanagan was at a loss for words. She had worked with him on the Board, and admired him. "I am terribly shocked," she said. "He was a fine man, and we'll miss him."

Harold Hall, who had worked with Ematrudo on the Committee on Buildings, stated, "My acquaintance with James Ematrudo dates back over 25 years. It has been a privilege to work on the Committee on Buildings with him. I found him to be very efficient and understanding."

George Letis felt that Ematrudo would be sorely missed. "He was a jolly fellow," Letis recalled, "Always ready with a joke to create a laugh in the group. He was a good, all round man, a man that tried his best to do the right thing."

Chairman of the Board Mrs. W. Oren Parker could not be reached for comment since she is vacationing in Michigan with her family. She had stated previously (Continued On Page Three)

## Services Today For James Ematrudo



James Ematrudo, 58, of 96 Saltonstall Pkwy. retired pharmacist who had been serving as a member of the Board of Education for the past two years, succumbed to a sudden heart attack early Tuesday morning in his home. Cause of the death was confirmed by Dr. Robert M. Taylor, medical examiner.

Prior to his retirement about 20 years ago he operated the Neighborhood Drug Store on East Grand Ave. in Fair Haven. Upon his retirement he moved to East Haven. He was elected to serve as a member of the Board of Education, his term beginning in 1950. He also served as a member of the Gillis School-Building committee after that group was enlarged at a town meeting during the Clancy administration.

Ematrudo, who had indicated to the Republican town committee last week that he would not seek reelection to the school board, was chairman of the board's committee on buildings. As chairman he was in charge of maintenance of the town school building plant and headed the negotiations for the rental of the coming Fall of four school rooms from the Old Stone Church.

Services were held this morning from the Cox, Smith and Crimmins Funeral Home in New Haven. A solemn high requiem mass was celebrated in St. Vincent de Paul's church. Burial was in St. Lawrence Cemetery, New Haven. (Continued On Page Three)

## Fire Companies Get Another False Alarm On Laurel St.

In a manner which has already set a pattern, pranksters or crack-pots brought out the Foxon and main Fire Departments yesterday afternoon at 12:55 in a false summons to the home of Alphonse Costello, 620 Laurel St.

Apparatus from both companies responded. It was the fourth such alarm in recent weeks, ironically coming in an area where the town's worst house fire occurred just last week.

Other alarms this week included a call Monday afternoon at 1:10 to the home of Mrs. John Scullin, 63 Henry St., where a chicken cooking unattended on the stove was burned. Damage was limited to the utensil. Engine 4 and Truck one responded.

Tuesday morning at 10:26, Engines one and six and Truck one were called to the home of A. H. Nitchke Jr., 4 Bartlett Rd., where a defective oil burner began to smoke. Quick action by Mrs. Nitchke in shutting off the electric power was credited with preventing any damage.

## Boys Caught After Break Into Drive-In Ants Get 'Loot'

Two East Haven youngsters who staged a bold daylight raid on the concessions stand in the Post Drive-In, Theater on the Saltonstall Pkwy. were caught with the goods by Police Officer Frank Konesky last week. The boys, one 13, the other, 14 years old, were turned over to juvenile authorities.

Konesky who made the "pinch" assisted by Officer Patrick Duffy reported he spotted the boys at about 11:15 a. m. cycling out of the theater entrance and out onto the highway. When he drove around the highway and turned down to return the boys high-tailed it, he reported, one abandoning his bicycle to hide in the high grass. The other began peddling off hastily with a sack of empty pop bottles.

Under questioning the boys admitted they had broken into the concessions stand and showed police a cache of \$16.70 worth of candy and popcorn that they had hidden by the adjoining railroad tracks. The "loot," however, had been taken over by a swarm of ants and was declared a total loss. The boys had gained entry by breaking a window.

Mrs. Mansfield, who is 32, and was until recently disabled by a neck and back injury sustained about seven years ago, has two boys, Bernie 13, and Joseph 9, and a daughter, Joan Ellen, aged 15.

Employees at the Municipal Golf Course where Mrs. Mansfield is employed part-time in addition to her full-time duties as a waitress presented her with a collection of about \$100 in the emergency, she said. She also received another \$33 from a collection taken up by Mrs. Thomas Webster.

The Red Cross has offered to buy clothes for the children when they enter school in the fall, the family "making do" with clothing donated by neighbors and friends.

Mrs. Mansfield said that her family was "manning fine" until the fire came along to wipe out all their possessions and leave them without a place to stay.

She had taken up temporary residence with relatives for a few days, but at present is staying with one of her two boys at a hotel. Finding a place to stay would permit the family to start rebuilding their home, she said, adding that she was working about 16 hours daily, when not ill, to get things reorganized.

Work on River St. bridge continues on schedule.

Work on the River St. bridge has been proceeding satisfactorily and workmen were scheduled today to start pouring concrete for the northern abutment according to First Selectman Frank Barker. Hired equipment has been kept busy excavating the site for the new bridge to cost approximately \$25,000.

Highway department crews have been busy patching town roads as part of an extended program. Rock outcroppings on Silver Sands Rd. were blasted out by crewmen in preparation for re-aligning the road.

## Remains Of Mansfield Home

## Continue Probe As Burned Out Family Tries To Recover

State and local officials are still probing the cause of a fire which gutted the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Mansfield, of 303 Laurel St., and destroyed all their possessions early Wednesday evening last week.

Fire Marshal Ernest Hanson reported that investigation has revealed so far that defective wiring was not the cause of the blaze as was suspected at first.

"The fire, which suddenly flared up shortly before 6:20 p. m., and was discovered by a passerby, left only a shell of the five room home. No one was home at the time. Mansfield, who is an employee of the Connecticut Bus Company, was in the hospital awaiting an operation while his wife was at work as a waitress at D'Andrea's Diner."

Need Place To Stay  
Mansfield, who is 39, and who was operated on for a malignant growth on his foot Tuesday, will be confined to the hospital for a few days more, and the burden of getting things back in order has fallen on his wife. She reported that the family's biggest problem is finding a place to stay. Quarters they have investigated have proved either too expensive or else did not allow children, she said.

## Son Of State Rep. A. C. Mautte In Marine OCS

Adelbert C. Mautte, Jr., son of State Rep. and Mrs. Adelbert C. Mautte, of 33 Austin Ave., is now in training as an officer candidate at the Marine Corps officer training schools in Quantico, Va. It was announced this week.

Young Mautte, who is a student at New York University, is one of 2,500 candidates who are receiving their training at the Marine Corps' Platoon Leaders Class. He will train for a period of six weeks during this summer returning to college in the Fall.

If a successful candidate he will be commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps Reserve upon graduation from college and will be assigned to two years of active service. He graduated from the local High School two years ago.

Members of the Platoon Leaders Class receive intensive training in military tactics, leadership and military organization, according to school officials. College students enrolling in the corps are trained only during their summer vacations. After they are commissioned they may elect to take advanced training in any one of the Marine Corps' specialist schools.

## New Haven Boy, 17 Faces Wet Driving Charges Here

A 17-year-old New Haven boy faces local charges of driving under the influence of liquor. He was arrested early last Thursday morning after the car he was driving ran off the road on Ora Ave. coming to rest in the meadow about 60 feet off the highway.

He is Joseph M. Capone, of 276 Kneeland Rd., New Haven, driver of a car registered in the name of Mary Capone, of the same address. He also faces charges in New Haven of causing about \$45 worth of damage on property in Morris Cove from which it is alleged that he took clothesline and several poles in an attempt to retrieve his car from among the high reeds in the meadow.

Officer William Mahoney who made the arrest reported that while on patrol and while driving south along Ora Ave. he came upon Capone alongside the road. When he stopped to investigate, he reported, the youth waved his arm in the direction of the road.

## East Haven Vet Promoted To Army Captaincy

Fort Dix, N. J.—An East Haven man who served with the Army in Korea and during World War II in several south Pacific campaigns has been promoted to captain to command the 70th Engineer Construction Company here.

He is Walter T. Kelly, Jr., formerly of 26 Hilltop Ave., East Haven, and a member of the Connecticut National Guard since 1936. Kelly entered active duty in 1941 and took part in the military campaigns in the Solomon Islands, in New Guinea and in the Philippines.

He received an honorable discharge in 1946 returning to active duty in September 1950 after which he was assigned to the 18th Engineer Battalion in Korea until he was transferred here in February, 1952. Among his decorations he wears the Bronze Star, the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Meritorious Unit Emblem, and the Distinguished Unit Emblem.

His wife, Dorothea, and his two daughters, Carolyn, five, and Janet, three, are living with him at Fort Dix.

## Confusion, Delay At Circus Reaps Crop Hard Feelings

East Haven merchants, who claim their business was ruined last Saturday by the appearance here of the King Brothers and Cristiani Circus, were still steaming this week over the developments which stemmed from the show sponsored solely by the New Haven Junior Chamber of Commerce.

It was bad enough when the circus parade was switched to East Haven's center after New Haven's police chief, Howard O. Young, refused to grant a permit for the parade in New Haven's business section on the grounds it would tie up traffic and ruin business there. But the "sail" came when the animals and circus contraption paraded through East Haven's center bearing large signs touting the wares of New Haven competitors.

The parade, which came about an hour after its scheduled time of 11:30 a. m., tied up traffic causing a jam far back into New Haven.

Not Limited To Merchants  
But the gripes were not limited to the merchants. A delay of three hours and 10 minutes in the opening of the first show at the West End Stadium on Main St. which was to start at one o'clock resulted in a restive crowd which grumbled at the long delay. The delay was attributed to a breakdown in a truck-bearing tent canvas from the circus' last stop in Worcester, Mass.

Those who finally got into the big top found that their tickets entitled them only to access to a few hundred seats which were quickly filled and were forced to shell out additional money in order to get seats. It's an old trick, it is said, but it never sets too well with the "suckers" as the great P. T. Barnum once dubbed his customers.

Another reported feature of the circus (this reporter was not present) was an animal tent which had a great big welcome sign at one end and a ticket booth at the other. Elwood Scoble, president of the East Haven Chamber of Commerce, which had kept aloof of the entire business, confirmed reports

## Only Two, Maybe Three, School Board Members May Seek Re-election

### Civil Defense Radios Are In Barker Reports

First Selectman Frank Barker acknowledged this week that his office had received five radio-transmitters from the department of Civil Defense to be used as part of the town's emergency set-up.

Barker referred with good humor to an item in the Town Topics column last week and said that it intimated that someone had "lifted" the radio sets and they were now gone. He assured this reporter that the equipment was in safe storage, and admitted that it had not been pressed into use.

The first Selectman said that installation of the equipment was held up by a delay in a radio serviceman getting his requisition to do the work. However, it appeared from his remarks that final plans were not set for usage of the equipment.

He thought that two of the sets might be used to replace the equipment used in the police cars and that the replaced equipment would be used in turn in Foxon and Riverside where it would get only part-time usage. He also supposed that the remaining three sets would be used on equipment at fire headquarters.

Barker was asked about a report that he planned to have one of the sets installed in his own car. He replied that he had contemplated doing that since, as head of the town, the first selectman would share with the local civil defense director the responsibility of taking command in the event that the town was hit with some catastrophe, military or otherwise.

The first selectman was asked whether the Board of Public Safety had not ordered the equipment for designated use in the fire and police departments. He replied that the equipment was ordered by his office to be used as deemed necessary.

He did not say whether use of such equipment was restricted to emergency situations and set-ups only.

### Doolittle And Letis Indicate Interest

The possibility that only two or three of the present members of the Board of Education will continue on what will be a largely new school body after October 5 loomed large on the political horizon here this week.

Republican town committee chairman Mathew Anastasio revealed that only two board members have indicated that they would be interested in renomination and that one other was still undecided. Anastasio reported that Mrs. Beatrice Doolittle, of Momaugan, and George Letis, of Foxon, have indicated that they would like to continue for a few more years on the school board.

He said that Harold Hall, also of Foxon, who was appointed for a short while to fill a vacancy on the board, has reserved his decision until later. He also reported that Mrs. W. Oren Parker, board chairman, and Burton Reed, former chairman, have not replied to the letters of inquiry which were sent to all Republican board members. Both are out of town for the month.

On the Democratic side, Town Chairman James Clancy reported that an entire set of six new people have already been nominated for the school body. He indicated that Mrs. John Flanagan, his sister, would not run for another term on the board. Mrs. Flanagan had indicated previously that, barring unusual circumstances, she would decline renomination.

Names of the board nominations would not be released until the entire slate was drawn up, Garliand said.

The other two Democratic members of the present board, are in the doghouse with the local party and stand only an outside chance of nomination in a fifty primary. Charles Sizemore was ousted from the Democratic town committee for refusing to back the party's choice for school superintendent. The other member John O'Dea, was named to the school board without the sanction of the town committee and is not a member of the inner party circle.

Town Chairman Garliand said he was interested to learn that the Republicans were having difficulty filling the school board because of the new four and six year terms for which members will be elected under a new law enacted by the state legislature. "We've had no trouble filling our nominations, at all," he said, stating that there was a great deal of interest in Democratic ranks and that interested candidates were numerous.

On the subject of nominations, Garliand took a "no comment" stand on a guess by his rival Anastasio, that Salvatore Longobardi, local funeral director, would be a candidate for the post of tax collector. Garliand answered that he wouldn't say whether he "would or would not be" nominated, stating that there were a lot of conditions for the various posts.

The Democratic chairman commented again on what he described as a great deal of enthusiasm in Democratic ranks and hopefully estimated "that it looks pretty good for us this year."

James Ematrudo, the remaining member of the present board, a Republican, just prior to his sudden death this week had informed the Republican town committee that he would not seek to run again for the board. His reason was given as not desiring to serve for the lengthier terms provided under the new law.

Chairman Anastasio said that interviews with interested candidates for the school board nominations would take place this week. Interviews would be by the nominating committee, he said, but did not indicate what the content or form of the interviews would take.

Despite recent developments, the likelihood still was that Selectman Frank Clancy would be paired off against First Selectman Frank Barker as their respective party's choices for the town's top post.

Consider Rezoning Main St. Home For Business  
Consideration of a change in zoning from residence to business of the former John Russell, home, at 245 Main St., will take place at a meeting of the Planning and Zoning Commission. The building was bought several months ago by James Milano who had considered plans at that time for converting it into an office building.

The home, located across the street from the Town Hall, has been designated as the central headquarters of the local Democratic Party.

## Retiring AFL Union Organizer Plans A Visit To His Native Italy

An East Haven man who has devoted 35 years of his life to work as an organizer for the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees, has finally earned the leisure of retirement in which he will be able to revisit his beloved native Italy. He is 65-year-old Matteo Pico, Grand Lodge representative of the union, who has resided at 124 Mansfield Rd. for the past 10 years.

Next Tuesday, Pico will board the Andrea Doria, of the Italian line, to return for a visit to Castellmare, in Naples which he left in 1914 to come to the United States. Pico was 26 years old, then, and left behind him a wife and two children whom he hoped later to bring with him to this country.

A short, stocky man, not more than five and a half feet tall, Pico, has a thick accent which disguises his long record as an American labor organizer. He has behind him a wealth of experience in union work and a proud record of serving uninterruptedly as a grand lodge representative under five different national presidents. Had it not been for a 19-day long walk-out on the Rutland Railway in Vermont last month, he would have been able to boast that his union never had to call a strike during the 35 years of his membership.

As a labor organizer he has moved about from railroad to railroad setting up locals or smoothing out organizational difficulties. To date he has helped organize 19 locals in his territory.

Came Here In 1914  
Pico's career as an organizer began shortly after he first came to this country to take a job as a stone mason with the Delaware Hudson Company. Like those many other immigrants who came to this country, he found it tough going and turned to the one type of organization which would defend his rights as a working

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

**A League Here?**

### Both political parties are now in the midst of lining up their candidates for town officers in the coming election. As a consequence, the nominations are being conducted within the semi-secret recesses of either party.

Now, political leaders generally are cognizant of the fact that they must command more support from the public than their opponents in order to win. They know that the programs and candidates they set forth must be accepted in some degree, to the sentiments and wishes of the voters. The extent that the politicians understand, and sympathize with these wishes determines their success not only in winning elections but in pro-

viding the leadership in government that is desired.

All this notwithstanding it has been a common plaint that the voter generally finds himself confronted with a choice which represents the lesser of two evils. Or, as sometimes happens, he is presented with a twofold choice and a twofold choice and doesn't care for either.

When the voter finds reason to complain about the program and candidates of either party, like as not, it is the result of his own failure to participate in the activities of the party of his preference. This has been a long-standing argument against the independent voter.

To be politically realistic, it must be acknowledged that such participation, if it is to be effective, takes time, interest, and organization, which many voters do not have.

The next best thing in the existence of groups outside the political parties which serve to keep a watch on the state of civic affairs and to apply to them a systematic and effective criticism.

The League of Women Voters is an excellent example of this type of organization. With a fine record of being able to examine the issues in a non-partisan manner, the League has served to promote intelligence in politics.

East Haven has a number of residents who are League members active in the New Haven organization. It would be a worthwhile thing if a local group were organized to focus its attention on town affairs. It would promote the best in both political parties and give a "clear conscience" to the voters. 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
