If East Haven prohibits the bringing in of garbage and neigh-boring towns follow suit, this town will have to find some new means of disposing of its garbage. This would mean awarding the garbage removal contracts to loc geries or the obtaining of some other means of disposal.

One alternative be an incinerator. He cited a pre-liminary estimate of "between \$75,000 and \$1000,000" as the prob-\$75,000 and \$1000,000" as the probable cost of an incincrator plant capable of handling the Town's refuse.
