Barker Criticizes Dropping Stores To Remain Of McManus From Zoning Bd For Late Shoppers

Announcement of the appointment of Jerome Grady, of 12 Rivor St., to the Planning and Zoning Commission came late yester-day following a vote of the Board of Selectmen on Tuesday

Grady was appointed on the vote of the Democratic members of the Board of Selectmen, while minority member Frank Barker voted for the re-appointment of George T. McManus, whom Grady will succeed.

In a brief statement, Barker criticized the failure of the Dem-ocrats to re-appoint McManus who, he said, had served faithfully and whose experience was needed when the commission was bringing to a conclusion its work in adopting a pilot plan for the

A public hearing on the new zoning regulations and the plan are scheduled for 7:30 and 8 p. m. in the Town Hall next Tuesday

"Mr. McManus has served the Town well over the years as a member of the Planning and Zon-Commission", sald Barker, "I believe that those persons in the Democratic party who are responsible for his replacement by an inexperienced person at this critical moment ought to be a-

"Particularly, since it is done a bare week before the Commis-sion is to take action on the pilot plan on which Mr. McManus and the other Republican members of the commission have worked so diligently.

"I think it is to the credit of the Republican party," he added, that both the pilot man and the sewer survey were undertaken when they were in contol of the Town administration."

Barker sald his objection was not so much against the appointment of Grady as it was to the dropping of McManus in the light of the latter's experience as two term member of the board.

First Selectman Frank Clancy stated earlier this week that he was concerned about the impression given in prior news stories that Grady had actually been appointed. "Such appointment doesn't take place until the Board of Selectmen actually vote on it. merely stated my own cholec." he said of last week's announce

Most Services Kept Under 35 Mill Tax Rate

What were the final conse of a 35-mill ceiling decreed by voters at town meeting? Examination of the official revealed that vital services were unaffected, although a number of prominent (and some import, ant) Items had to be deleted.

At the same time, the Admin istration had undertaken menures to raise its estimated indirec (non-tax) revenues from a total of \$272,231.27 as originally timated to \$278,951.27. In large part this was accomplished by raising permit fees in the Building Department and the Town Clerk's office.

According to the zoning regulations a specified user of the light industry districts may"ereate no objectionable noise, dust, smell, vibrations, smoke or gas which is noticeable outside the LI District in which it is focated."

The regulations provide penal-ties ranging up to \$250 dollars and/or fall sentences of ten days for each day of wilful violation and lesser fines for unwilful violations. They are designed to pro-teet residential areas from nul-

Among the uses permitted in the light industry sections care-fully definenced in the new zon-ing map are the following re-tall lumber, fuel, and building maturnoci, uci, and sulfating ma-ferini yards and contractor's ca-iling or dycing works! nanufac-ture, processing or picksigns of toods, non-alcoholic, boverages, toods, non-alcoholic byerages, pharmaceuticals, etc.; mint, wood-working, sheet metal, blacksmith or machine shops, but oxcluding drop huminers; storage warehouse; storage of petrolelum products.

Commercial Districts There are three classes of com-nercial districts set forth in the regulations. Uses, pemilted in the "CA" districts include, refall, and professional establishments, restaurants not sorving liquor, private hospitals service stations and professional areas.

Chamber Favors Reserving Town Lots For Industries

The East Haven Chamber of Commerce went on record Monday night as favoring retention by the Town of all municipally-owned properties which lie within areas zoned for light industry and the reservation of such property for direct sale to interested firms under an organized plan of promo-

A letter presenting these views and couched in general terms is to be sent to First Selectman Frank Clancy, who has already expressed his own intention to oppose the sale of such properties except for industrial use.

Alexander Doran, chairman of he Chamber's Committee on Industrial Development and Planing, announced at the meeting that plans for promoting the growth of light industry in East llaven are "showing progress."
