## Opponents Silent At Hearing On Finance Bd. Bill

HARTFORD Not one word was uttered in opposition to a proposed bill revising the East Haven Board of Finance Act at a legislative hearing Tuesday afternoon.

Opponents of the bill were on hand, all right, since the hearing was well-attended by party officials on both sides of the fence. But when Representative Albert C. Snyder of Middletown, House chairman of the Joint Committee on Cities and Boroughs, asked for "those opposed" after hearing "those in favor," there was a pause. A fatal pause.

Bang! went the gavel. The hearing on House Bill No. 1265, sponsored by Representatives Adolph C. Mautie and Elizabeth Croumey of East Haven, was closed.

**Opposed Bill**

First Selectman Frank Clancy who, with other members of the East Haven Board of Finance, has opposed the bill, retreated to the corridor, chastened. With him were Fred Wolfe, Leslie Redfield and John Mulhern, of the finance board.

There they mullied over their objections to the proposed legislation which they unanimously condemned as placing the finance board at the mercy of the two-party town committees.

Mr. Mautie and Mrs. Croumey were the first to speak for the legislation. They told the legislative committee that the bill was drawn up at a conference of Republicans and Democrats and endorsed by both.

Before the pros and cons were invited, Richard Reilly, town councilor, stepped up to present a substitute bill which, he said, removed some of the dubious wording in the original bill.

In Section 4, he pointed to changes "making it impossible to give either party a majority" in changes "making it impossible to elect a majority" in the town committee.

With the Board of Finance having held numerous special sessions with the Elementary School Building Committee, the maximum allowance is used up about this time of the year, Mr. Clancy said.

If the act amendment is passed, the first selectman suggested, it would be easier on the new finance board members if they took office several months later. Other wise they will start out on duties which require a lot of know-how about town fiscal operations.

### Interim Appointments To Finance Bd. Seen Problem

Difficulties are anticipated in securing replacements for vacancies that may develop on the Board of Finance between now and next October when an entirely new board would be "elected" if a bill revising the board gets through the Legislature.

At least one vacancy will occur on or before July 30 when the present term of Leslie Redfield, a senior member of the board, ends. Mr. Redfield indicated Tuesday that he will be moving to Guilford and will not be eligible for re-appointment.

Yesterday Mr. Clancy revealed that Mr. Redfield had submitted a letter of resignation but that it was not being accepted "at this time."

**Budgeting Starts Aug. 1**

Work on the Town's annual budget must begin August 1, and with Mr. Redfield gone, a replacement must be obtained. Mr. Redfield, who has served on the board for about eight years, is considered an expert on the budget, and his leaving is considered a setback for the board.

Another member of the board, Peter Weber, has been ill and has been unable to attend meetings.

If the bill making the board effective goes through, any interim appointments will serve for a few months. They will have to serve without compensation since the \$15,000 now allowed has a \$500 limit per member.

**Mail To Mayor Overwhelmingly For Fluoridation**

Approximately 300 postal cards, the vast majority of them favoring fluoridation, have been received by the first selectman's office over the past several weeks.

Mr. Clancy said that with an occasional exception and several letters opposing fluoridation, all the correspondence has been for fluoridation. He is turning over the correspondence to Dr. Rocco Dove, Town health officer.

Dr. Dove is a member of a New Haven area committee of medical personnel impugning the advisability of fluoridating the public water supplies.

## Weinstein & Timm Named Again As Town Auditors

The auditing firm of Weinstein & Timm of 185 Church St., New Haven, was re-appointed as auditors of the Town by the Board of Finance at its meeting last week. This will be the 10th consecutive year in which the firm will serve in this capacity.

It was reported that the Board dismissed a newspaper editorial treating with the desirability of changing auditors. Arguments against re-appointing the firm were dismissed, it was said, particularly in view of future changes in the make-up of the Board of Finance.

## Frontage Reduction Asked For New Home Develop't In Foxon

Reports of a new housing development in the Foxon area around Thompson Street were confirmed this week by Jerome Grady, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Details on the development were not available but it would consist of possibly 100 homes on a plot of land of about 70 acres presently owned by Leo and Louis Charnes of Foxon Hill Rd. The plot falls within the R-4 section on the new zoning map and borders on Thompson St.

Mr. Grady also confirmed reports that the Zoning Commission has been asked to permit a twenty per cent reduction in the minimum lot frontage. Under the new zoning map, lot sizes must be a minimum average size of 25,000 square feet with a minimum average frontage of 125 feet.

Mr. Grady indicated that because of "hardship" claims on a part of the present owner, he is favorably disposed toward granting the 20 percent allowance in requirements permitted for roads and sidewalks.

Under this reduction the average size of lots would be 100 feet frontage with a minimum area of 20,000 square feet or "just under half an acre."

**No Other Concessions**

The zoning board chairman said that the reduction in the lot sizes will be the only change or concession permitted by the board.

"Absolutely no concessions regarding sidewalks, curbs, or roads or anything else will be made," Mr. Grady said.

The Zoning Commission may take the matter up at its next meeting on Wednesday evening. The board will have another petition for a reduction of requirements before it.

This latter is a petition by James J. Canna, local contractor, who is requesting a waiver of sidewalk and curb requirements in a development he is building in Foxon

## Benefits To Survivors Of Town Employees 'Woefully Inadequate'

Benefits to survivors of municipal employees who die before retirement age are woefully inadequate under the terms of the municipal retirement fund to which employees may subscribe.

That is the general feeling among Town Officials and at least some of the municipal employees, themselves. As a result the limitations of the retirement fund as a measure of security for survivors are expected to be reviewed by officials and personnel.

**Made Prominent By Death**

The problem of inadequate benefits became prominent following the recent death of Assistant Police Chief E. Wesley Stepp.

Under the terms of the retirement act his widow will receive only that amount which had been contributed by the late police officer to the retirement fund since the Town came under its provisions in 1951.

As a result Mrs. Stepp, who has suffered from serious eye ailments - she had a cataract removed from

one eye and is stated to undergo another similar and expensive operation in the near future - will receive an amount calculated to be less than one thousand dollars. Some estimates go as low as \$500 - \$700.

**Insecure Financially**

Mrs. Stepp, friends say, is in a very insecure financial position because of her need for medical aid and because of her poor health.

As an assistance the East Haven Police Benevolent Association recently voted to present the widow with a one hundred dollar check, according to Walter Heck, president. In addition, First Selectman Frank Clancy had the Board of Finance approve the payment of an extra semi-monthly paycheck to Mrs. Stepp.

Frank Backus, president of the local police union, said this week that the union was exploring means of assisting Mrs. Stepp. He said that it would welcome any

suggestions or assistance from outside groups.

The general thought is, he said, that a system of annual benefits should be provided for survivors of municipal employees.

The Board of Public Safety is expected, also, to take up the matter at a special meeting which will be held on Monday or Tuesday. The meeting is being held for other business, as well.

## To Protest Road Encroachment On Industrial Lots

Revisions in connector roads for the Greenwich-Killingly Expressway may deprive East Haven of a large portion of its best land available for industry, it is reported.

Town officials, headed by First Selectman Frank Clancy, will meet Monday morning in Hartford with Newnam Arraves, State Highway Commissioner, to lodge an official protest. The loss of potential tax revenues has been estimated as high as \$40,000.

The Town area in question lies on either side of the western end of Saltonstall Blvd. In this vicinity the Expressway will be connected with Route One as it runs into, and through, New Haven.

Alex Doran, chairman of the Redevelopment Agency and chairman of a Chamber of Commerce committee handling negotiations for securing more industry for East Haven, said that the highway changes posed a threat to one of his great industrial enterprises. The Town has had in a long time. Plans have been under way for the location of an "oil tank farm" on property north of the railroad tracks in an area designated for light industry. Mr. Doran said that the Highway Department's plans "definitely hindered" negotiations to secure the "tank farm," which would add a sizeable amount to the Town's tax base.

Mr. Doran will also attend the protest conference.

Another property owner, affected by the change is reported to be Frank P. Sullivan who owns property near the Canna Electric Company. Mr. Clancy said that the highway would cut into Mr. Sullivan's property, also reducing it in size and reducing its value for industrial purposes.

The first selectman pointed out that the properties affected by the highway were choice industrial lots because they are located close in Route One and to the railroad tracks.

While the properties are privately owned, their value to the Town would be greatly enhanced if used for industrial sites. The potential in tax revenues is considered to be a sizeable amount.

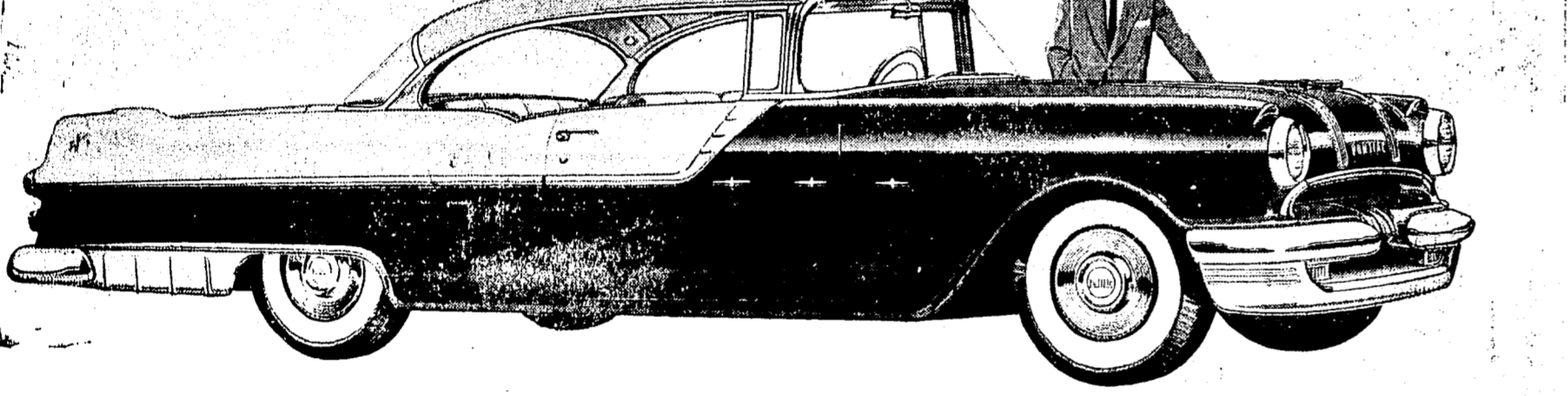

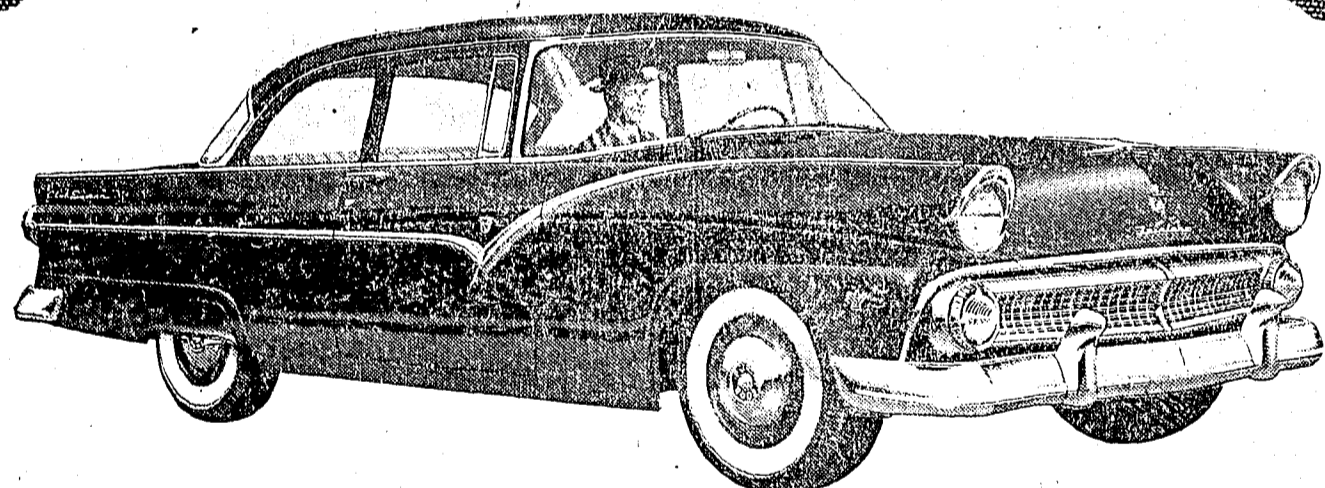

**Group Joins Drive To Build Giant Cross**

The East Haven Woman's Club is joining more than 5,000 other members of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in a drive to raise three million dollars to build a 500-foot cross atop Bald Knob mountain in southern Illinois.  
Mrs. Vincent J. Fasano, president of the local group, said that information on the drive will be available from her at her home, 26 Taylor Ave., HO 7-3372.  
The cross, which will be visible over a 7,500 square-mile area, is a project of the Bald Knob Christian Foundation, Inc., a non-denominational, non-profit, state-chartered group that has held Easter sunrise services on the mountain annually for the past two decades.  
The drive was launched earlier this month in Washington, D.C. where Mrs. Theodore S. Chapman, president of the Women's Federation, appealed to non-members to send their contribution directly to "THE CROSS, Cairo, Illinois."  
The construction will contain a central chapel and meditation rooms for all denominations. At its top will be a Forest Service lookout station and observation tower.  
The 187-acre tract on which it will be erected is owned by the foundation. Bald Knob is located in the Shawnee National Forest. When erected, the cross will, when illuminated, be visible in a four-state area.

Members of the town committees in making appointments to the Board of Finance.  
Mr. Anastasio reviewed briefly the proposed changes requiring notice of public hearing and open hearings by the Board. He said he accepted the substitute bill submitted by Town Counsel Reilly.  
Judge Vincent Fasano, one of those who helped draft the bill, stepped forward to urge a change in the bill wording to prevent exclusion of the public from the hearings on departmental budgets and to insure the public a voice in the hearings.  
However, a committee member pointed out that a change in the general statutes affecting all boards of finance was being made to guarantee public attendance and participation at budget hearings.  
Gatland Favors Bill  
James Cartland, Democratic Town Chairman, rose to speak also in favor of the bill. "We feel," he said, speaking of the two town committees, "that the bill will benefit the Town of East Haven."  
In apparent reference to a provision making someone other than the town clerk clerk of the board, Cartland said that the change was recommended so because "board records should be kept by persons whose sole responsibility it is to keep them." The records should be available in more than one place, he said.  
He said that a "majority of the Democratic Town Committee favor this bill right down the line."  
Democratic officials who disagreed with Mr. Cartland said afterwards that his supporting the bill made it awkward for them to speak out against it.  
At Hearing  
Also in attendance at the hearing were Leslie Redfield, Fred Wolfe, Jr., and John Mulhern, members of the Board of Finance; Alfred Holcombe; Walter Kane and Assessor George Miller; and Charles Copeland, John Simoni, Prosecuting Attorney Robert M. Taylor, Jr., Mrs. Charlotte Miller, in support of the bill.  
The committee in charge of the hearing seemed to be impressed by testimony of bipartisan agreement on local bills. In hearing out several bills from the Town of Plainville, the committee chairman asked pointedly several times, "And this bill has the approval of both the Democrats and Republicans?"
