ABOVE: An extremely rare 1943 COPPER penny: The 1943 copper cent is one of the notable rarities of the Lincoln cent series. Due to war-time needs of copper for use in ammunition and other military equipment during World War II, in 1943 the U.S. Mint replaced the then-standard bronze alloy (copper-tin), so the one-cent coin was minted in zinc-coated steel. This alloy caused the new coins to be magnetic and 13% lighter. Why the copper coins?

An estimated 40 examples of 1943 copper pennies are believed to have been struck, with 12 confirmed to exist. The error occurred when copper planchets were left in the press hopper and press machines during the changeover from copper to steel blanks. Examples were discovered after the War, with the first two in 1947, and another in 1958. An example was first sold in 1958 for \$40,000; one mint condition specimen sold for over \$200,000 in 2004!
