For Jackie Pierce, everything changed the summer of 1979, when she spent three months of infinite freedom at her bohemian uncle's sprawling estate on the California coast. Jackie and her cousin Willa fell into a fast friendship, until the summer abruptly ended in tragedy and Willa silently slipped away into the night. Jackie must discover if the dark secret she's kept ever since is even the truth at all.

Sisters Dara and Marie have been dancers for as long as they can remember, first under the tutelage of their mother and eventually continuing her legacy in running the Durant School of Dance. But when a suspicious accident occurs, just at the onset of the school's annual performance of *The Nutcracker*—a season of competition, anxiety, and exhilaration—an interloper arrives and threatens the sisters' delicate balance.

WHITEHEAD Harlem Shuffle's ingenious story plays out in a beautifully recreated New York City of the early 1960s. It's a family saga masquerading as a crime novel, a hilarious morality play, a social novel about race and power, and ultimately a love letter to Harlem-but mostly, it's a joy to read, another dazzling novel from the Pulitzer Prize and National Book Awardwinning Colson Whitehead.




